FROM THE PRESIDENT

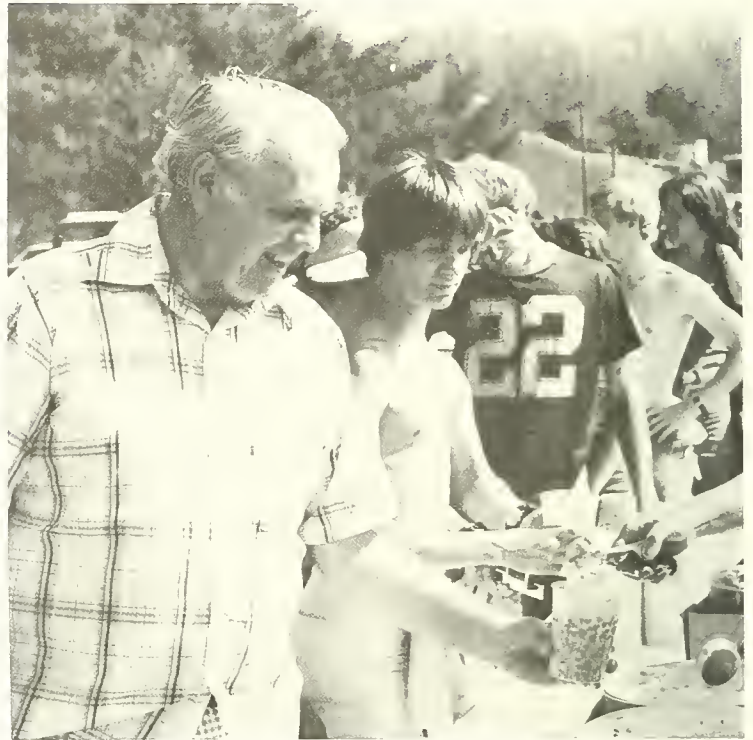

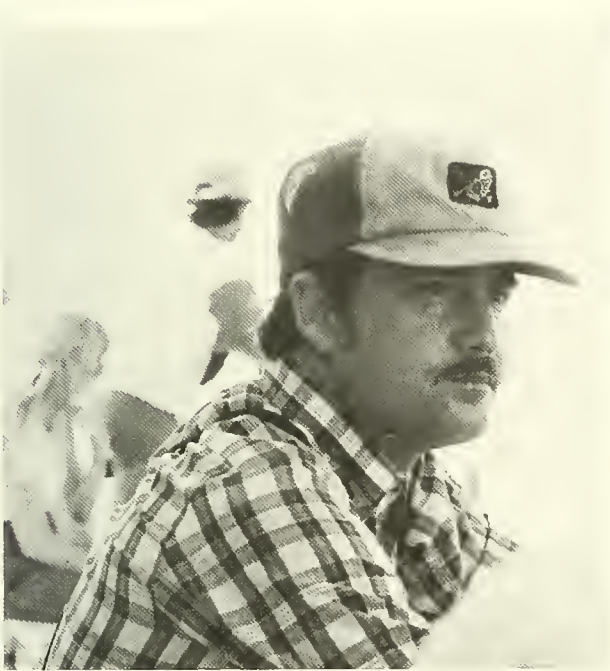

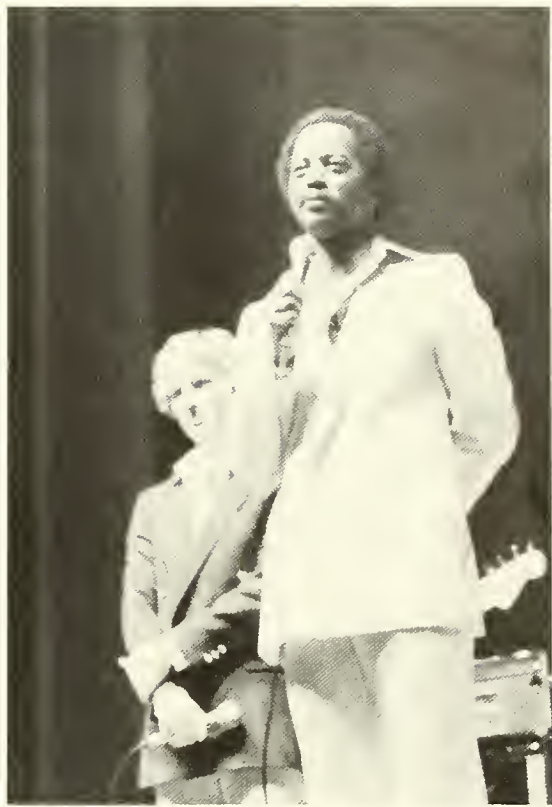


ANDRUS-BLACKWOOD AND COMPANY

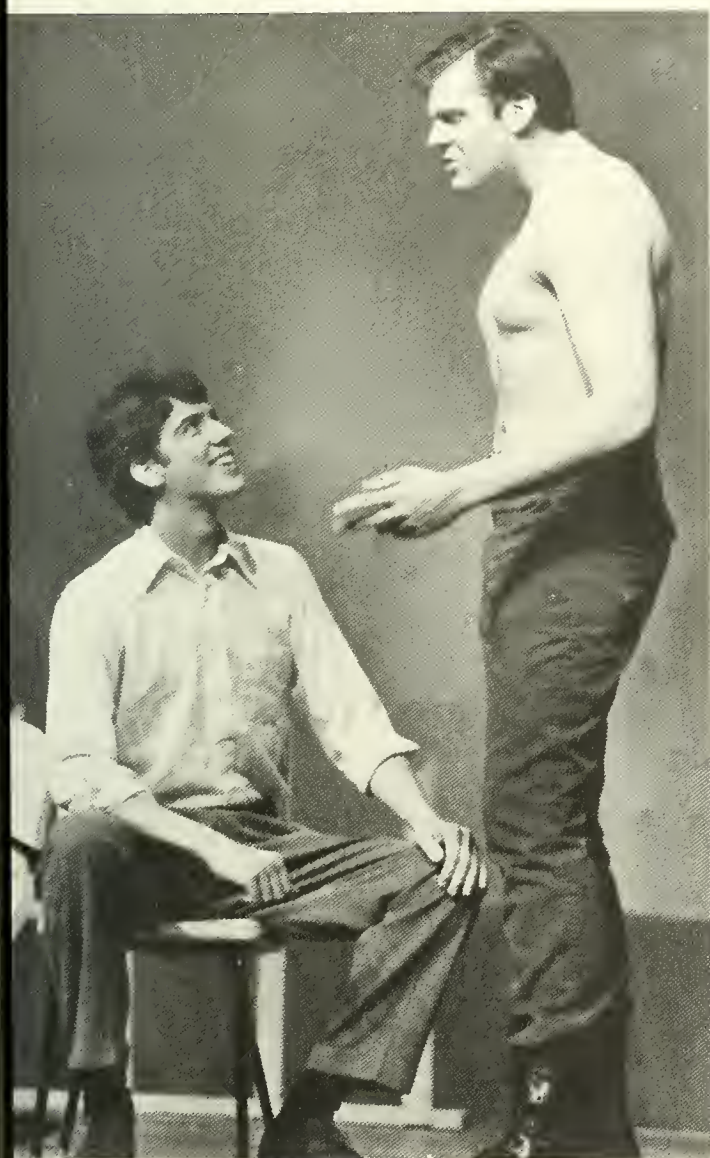

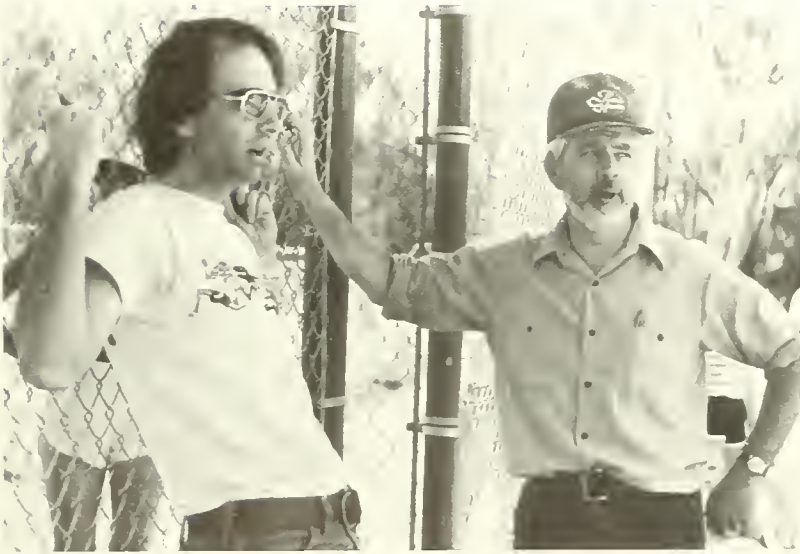

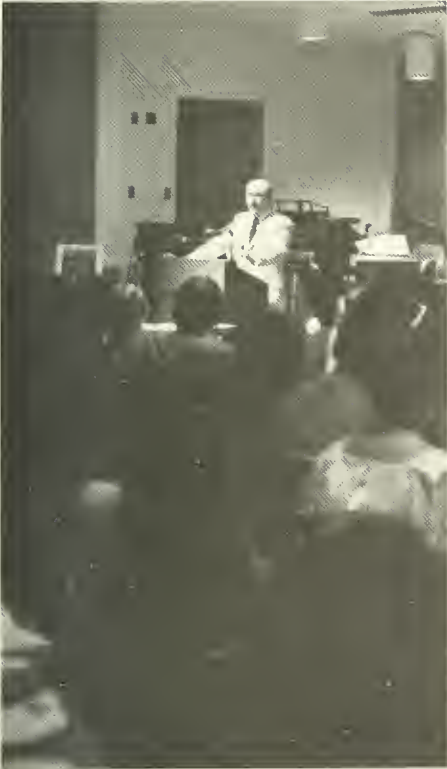


JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET

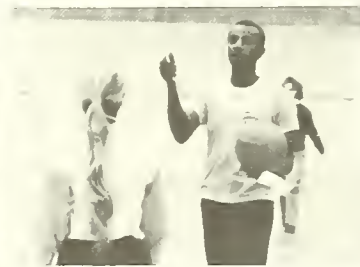

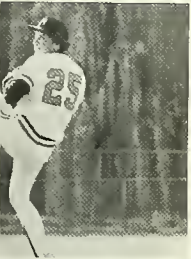

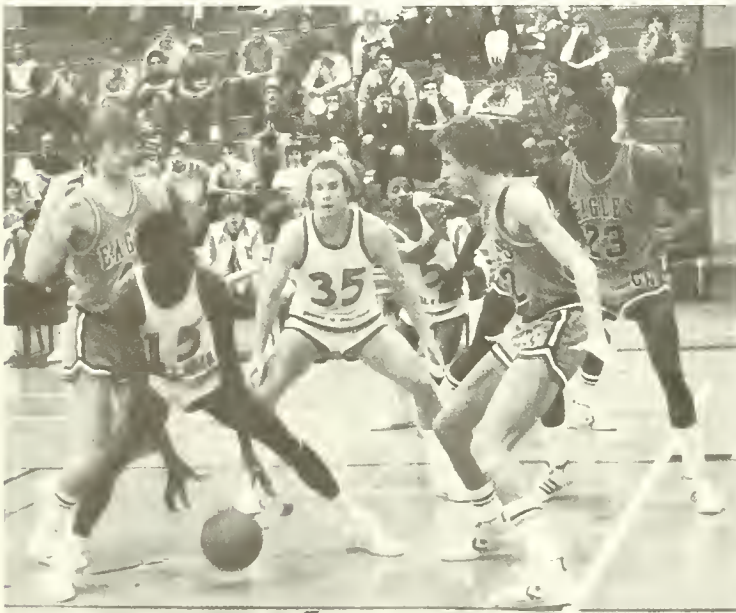

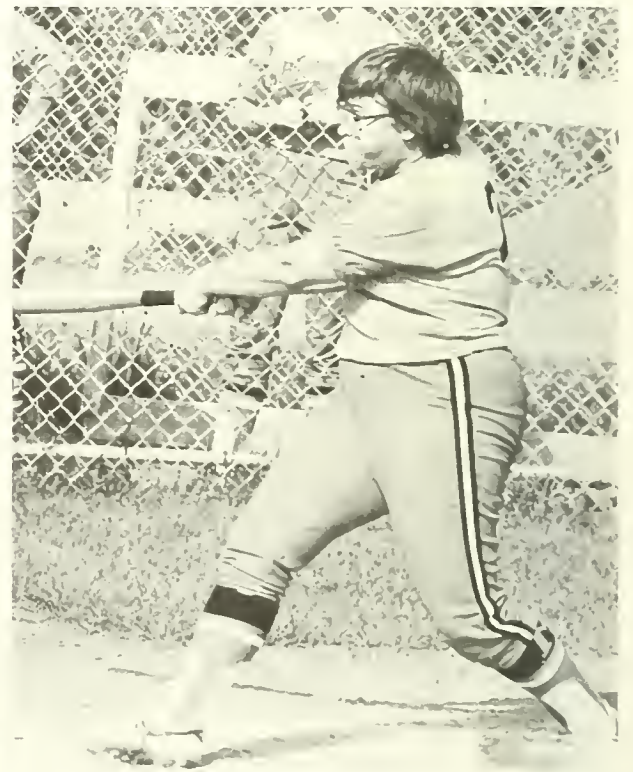

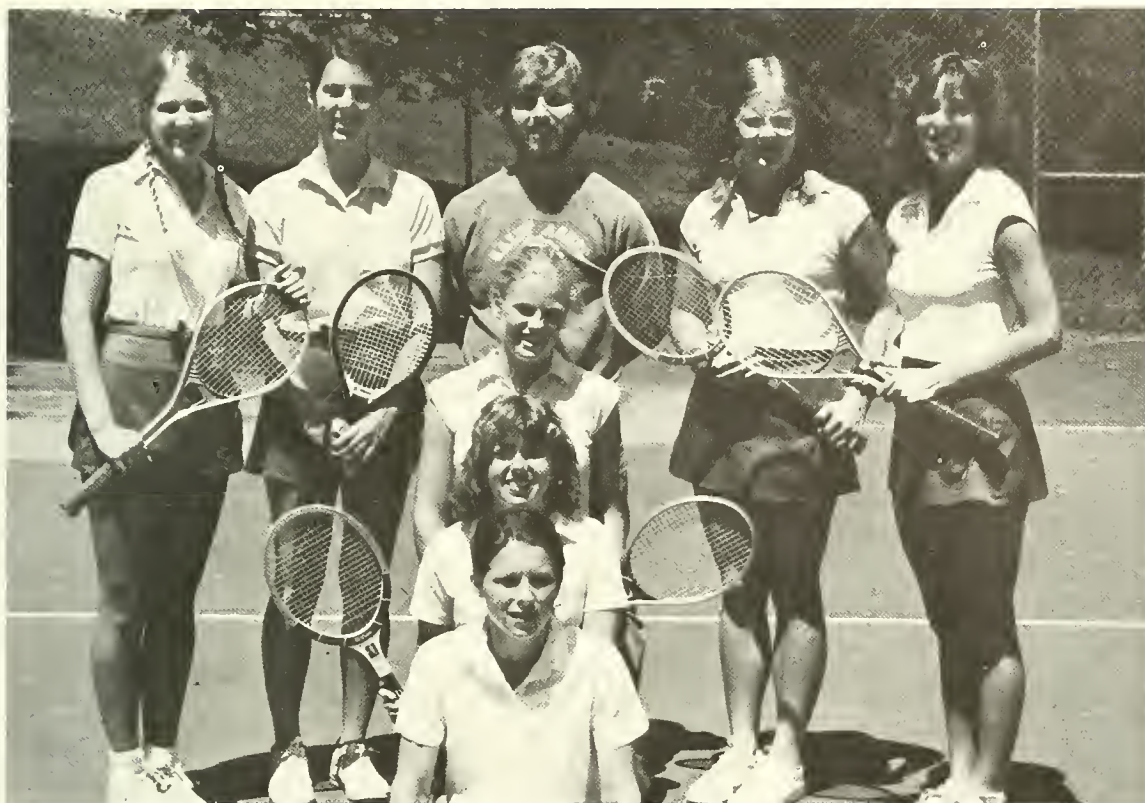

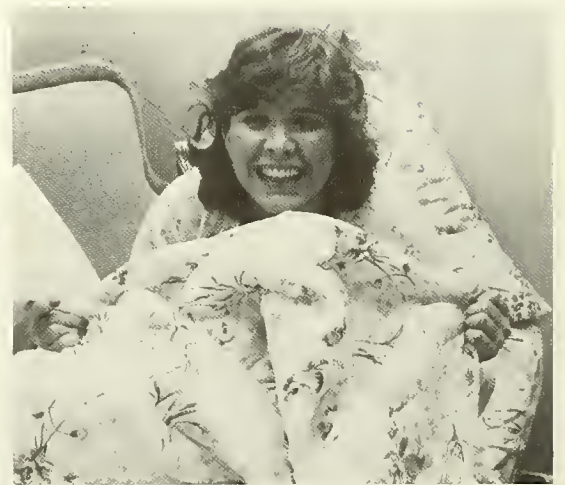

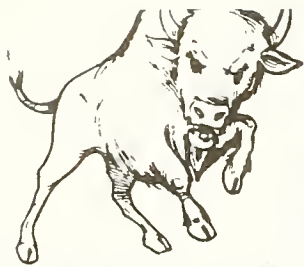
