

Founder's Day 1962 pays honor to the founders of Milligan College, Dr. and Mrs. Josephus Hopwood. The Hopwoods came to East Tennessee in 1875 to take over the leadership of Buffalo Institute.

In 1881 Buffalo Institute was elevated to the level of a four-year arts college and named Milligan College.

President Hopwood served Milligan as the first president from 1881 to 1903. He returned to the Presidency for the second time in 1915 and continued until 1917.

Mrs. Hopwood (Sarah LaRue Hopwood) served the College as Dean of Women and a competent teacher of English.

The Hopwood concept of Christian education — Christian scholarship and Christian gentility — continues to dominate the Milligan College of today.

After eighty-one years Milligan continues to be a quality, resident, Christian liberal arts college. The charts shown here emphasize the growth and advancement of the College in recent years.

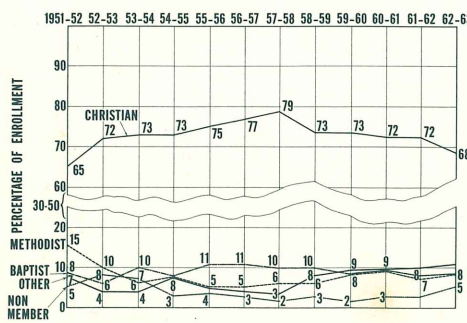

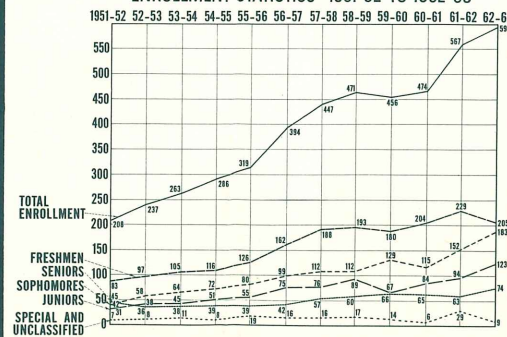

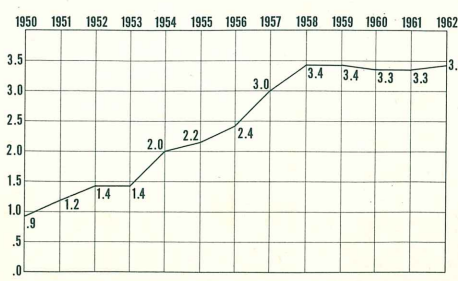
MILLIGAN COLLEGE ENROLLMENT STATISTICS 1962-1963



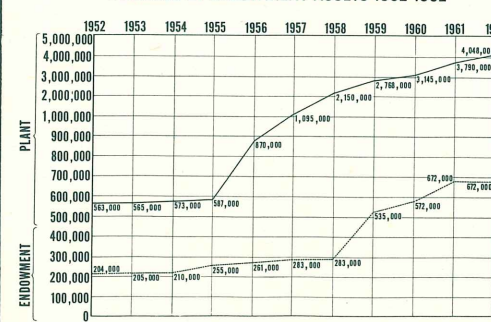
MILLIGAN COLLEGE ENROLLMENT STATISTICS 1951-52 TO 1962-63



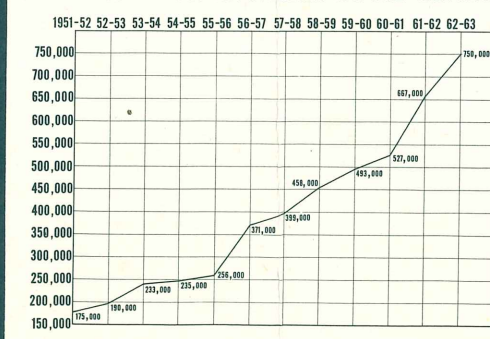
