

HYPOCRITES—REAL OR ALLEGED

T UST recently we met a person whose explanation of his non-participation in the worship and work J of any congregation of Christians was, "I am no hypocrite." He expressed the assertion in such a way as to indicate that it was his serious conclusion. reached by observation of his fellowmen. It was not, however, a new declaration: we have heard it periodically. Sometimes we have respected the sincerity of men and women whose interpretation of dealings with church members has embittered them against Christians as a visible group in society. But here as elsewhere one may be sincere yet incorrect in his deductions. The man to whose utterance we have referred in our first sentence was arriving at conclusions by false data and insufficient knowledge of human motives.

Jesus repeatedly referred to them, and Matthew in his record of the Sermon on the Mount and of the denunciations of false teachers by our Lord has given us the Savior's attitude toward these pernicious foes of true piety. Mark and Luke were likewise impressed by this form of iniquity. The Scribes and Pharisees of Jesus' day were "shot through" with hypocrisy: they wore the garb of leaders in religion, mouthed the precepts of the laws of conduct pleasing to God, laid burdens on the shoulders of others and "put on a show' of the tenets of Judaism. They were actors, interpreters, presenters of the traditions and customs of the rites expressive of the faith of their people. But having acted the part, they laid aside the character. A hypocrite is one who represents a cult or a faith or a group of convictions without accepting its obligations or conforming his own personal conduct to its teachings.

Hypocrites are found in the church of today; its power and opportunity are of sufficient value to make assumption of its customs and contacts of value to a class of sycophants who seize upon easy ways to get what they want. But the number of such "actors" is never great. The worst feature of them is not their prevalence but the excuse they offer to critics and to folk of weak minds. These latter make no distinction between the small class who pose as Christians for self advantages and the great mass of us who must constantly confess to faults of performance. We are not hypocrites because of our inability to fulfill all the requirements of our faith. Jesus did not so title the publican who beat upon his breast and said, "Lord, have mercy upon me, a sinner." In the model prayer we ask daily for forgive-Of course, there are hypocrites: indeed we get ness for our trespasses. Paul confessed to his inability to render null and void the thrusts of temptation to evil from within him.

The charge that the church is full of hypocrites usually comes from those who content themselves with a very low standard of conduct. Many of them are satisfied to have good intentions and small determination to live up to them. They make no allowtemptations which recur again and again. They demand that the professors of religion, the folk who go regularly to services in the church, should be perfect in all their actions. They tell what they would do if they made the confession of faith in Christ, which all believers make. But that "if" serves them as an excuse to refuse any serious effort to live as Christians try to conduct them-

Such accusations of hypocrisy have not the approval of our Lord. He referred to quite another class when He denounced the Scribes and Pharisees of His day.

Endure Hardness



It has always been a bit of a puzzle to many people as to why the Lord Jesus Christ when here upon earth said so little about human rights and the economic conditions under which the world labored. Indeed, upon one occasion when some man wanted Him to intervene with his brother to divide a certain inheritance with him which was his "right", he received a rather sharp rebuke. "Man, who made me a judge or a divider over you?"

2. By the Spontaneous Approach

Be a Christian wherever you are: by Christian example, consistent Christian life, joyful contagious outlook, tolerant of eccentricities. Be what you say you are. Let people know by your life that you belong to Christ.

3. By Ministering to the Children

By Christian atmosphere in the home and family devotions. By being concerned with Christian school teachers, seeking to win parents through the children. By foster-home care. By being tolerant to neighborhood children.

4. By Courage to Speak for Jesus Christ

Tell what Christ and His Church mean to you. Give a specific witness. Avoid generalities. Do not be afraid to speak for Christ. Let people know that it is not our Church, but Christ's Church.

5. By Inviting Others

This "friendly invitation" method is stressed with the accent on specific invitations.

6. By Prayer and Intercession

cede is emphasized very strongly.

7. By Christian Love

Love your neighbor as yourself. Show the concern and compassion of Christ.

8. By Christian Service

Be a good samaritan. Help those in need. Be doers of the Word, not hearers only.

9. By Recognition

See the worth of a person. Recognize your opportunities. How do you look upon your milkman, your grocer, and others? See the sin of discrimination. Recognize your own needs, and the needs of others. Recognize the talents of your neighbors, and seek to use them.

10. By Sharing

Share information about your church. Share your faith and beliefs. Share Christian literature. Use social gatherings for purposes of sharing. Share your Christian experiences. Share what you find in the

11. By Christian Hope and Expectations

Expect to be used of God. Expect to find opportunities for sharing and witnessing. Plan to follow through on contacts. Expect people, including Roman Catholics, to respond to your witness. Challenge and expect members to work in the church, and to witness. Look for new ways to witness and to serve. Have a spirit of optimism, confidence and trust. Have confidence in the Word of God, in your Church and its program.

12. By Special Community Service

By serving in civic groups. By influencing community programs. By giving of time, talents and of self to community interests. By visiting hospitals and other institutions.
