# Milligan volunteers remove graffiti in downtown Johnson City

MILLIGAN COLLEGE—A group of 80 Milligan College students and volunteers made a positive mark on downtown Johnson City last Saturday by removing graffiti and cleaning up trash.

“Since the inception of the Keep Johnson City Beautiful program, this is the largest group of volunteers ever to clean the downtown area,” said Eva Hunter, coordinator of Keep Johnson City Beautiful.
