Clarinet Swing Kings, will be

Martin pops concert with the

Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

This ainual tribute to Martin will be held at the newly renovated Mary B. Martin Auditorium at Seeger Chapel, Milligan College. Following the concert there will be a reception for the audience in the lower part of the hall.

Bennett is a self-taught musician who began age 10 playing a clarinet given to him by his grandfather. He learned to play Goodman music by ear, listening to his records. He began touring all over the country at age 14 on the "traditional jazz" circuit with a Saginaw, Mich-based Dixieland band.

At 17, he won a competition over 600 entrants to solo with the Count Basie Orchestra. Pete Fountain, upon hearing a tape of Bennett, made an unsolicited call to the teenager encouraging him that "you are on the right track."

He gives fresh and creative treatments to such classics as "Nightmare," "Stranger on the Shore," "Where or When" and "Begin the Beguine." Bennett and his touring band have performed at jazz festivals in San Diego, Elkhart, Ind., Detroit and at a number of leading jazz nightclubs.

His musical abilities aren't limited to jazz and swing. Bennett is passionate about rockabilly, pop, country and American roots music, and even composes his own material.

He has led his septet for concerts in 30 states and has performed with more than 20 orchestras in the U.S. and Canada. Reviews include "Audiences completely blown away ... a remarkable talent of genius proportions," by Thomas Wilkins, music director, Omaha (Neb.) Symphony, and resident conductor of the Detroit Symphony; and from Andrew Lane, principal Pops Conductor, Orlando (Fla.) Phillharmonic: "Dave Bennett is one of the finest performers I have had the pleasure of working with. There is no doubt he is one of the greatest clarinetists of our time."

The concert will be conducted by JCSO assistant concertmaster Kellie Brown, filling in for conductor and music director Rob Seebacher, who is recovering from surgery. Tickets for the concert are
