The season was capped by the Milligan Buffaloes tucking the Smoky Mountain Conference championship under their belts for the second consecutive year; thereby being invited to the annual Burley Bowl game in Johnson City.

September 21, the Buffaloes opened the season with a 20 to 0 win over Emory and Henry. Emory and Henry had a scrapping outfit, but could not cope with its heavier opponents. The Buffaloes gained ground with ease. Holsclaw, Goddard and Miller led the offensive parade, while Harmon, Spraker and Stallard were outstanding on the defense for the Buffaloes.

September 28, playing before a home crowd at Johnson City, the Milligan College Buffaloes met defeat at the hands of High Point College. The Buffaloes got off to a bad start and could not overcome the much heavier and stronger reserve forces of High Point. The final scole was 19 to 6.

October 3, the next game on the schedule saw the Buffaloes traveling to Murfreesboro to tangle with Middle Tennessee State. On numerous occasions the Buffaloes threatened but the State squad was able to hold off the aggressive Milligan team. The score ended 0 to 0. The game started the Buffaloes on the road to an injured and crippled season of football.

October 12, before a Homecoming crowd at Elizabethton, the Buffaloes met the Tusculum College Pioneers. A cold and muddy field slowed both teams down, but the Buffaloes came out on top, 12 to 0. Short, consistent runs by Carrier, Goddard and Holsclaw kept the Buffaloes on the offense the major part of the game. Fine, Harmon and Caldwell were outstanding in stopping the Tusculum backs.

October 18, the student body followed the football squad to Cullowhee, N. C., where the Buffaloes played Western Carolina Teachers. Both teams threatened numrous times, but Milligan eked out a 6 to 0 victory. Rose and Goddard spelled bad luck for the Teachers, while Stallard, Harmon and Caldwell were effective in stopping the Teachers when needed.





The BURLEY BOWL

October 16, playing at Greensboro, N. C., against a powerful Guilford eleven, the Milligan College Buffaloes met their second and last defeat in the regular season. The highly favored Guilford team opened with the most devastating running attack the Buffaloes had faced. Milligan lost 19 to 6, but he Buffs were the first team to cross the opponents' goal line this season.

November 22, the traditional Milligan-Carson-Newman game was played at Kingsport. The Buffaloes got off to a slow start but continually improved and the final score was 20 to 7 with Milligan on the long end. Showalter and Walker were consistently hitting the Baptist line and Holsclaw's passes were hitting the receivers. In the line, Elliott, Harmon, Caldwell and Spraker played a bang-up game.

November 8, Coach Brown's gridsters squeezed out an unimpressive 12 to 7 win over the less powerful Tennessee Wesleyan Junior College. With 20 seconds to play, Holsclaw hit Goddard with the winning pass. Goddard was constantly bowling over the Wesleyan tacklers but was unable to cross the goal line. The power in the Buff line could not be stopped.

November 16, for the first time since the beginning of the season the Buffaloes were at their full strength. The Milligan College Herd upset a highly favored Appalachian State Teachers football team 6 to 0. Holsclaw's pass to Stevens in the second period was sufficient to win. Pardue played his best ball game of the season. Stallard intercepted a pass to set up the touchdown play. Spraker, Starnes and Stallard led in bottling the visitors' offense.

November 28, the Milligan College Buffaloes ended the toughest schedule in years and proved themselves to be the best college football team in this area by completing the season with six wins, two losses and one tie. This was convincing enough for them to receive and accept an invitation to play in the Burley Bowl classic Thanksgiving Day in Johnson City., The Buffaloes met a Southeastern Louisiana College team that was rated six touchdowns over Milligan. The hard-driving Buffaloes, being at their best, almost upset the superior Southeastern Louisiana team. The game was highlighted by Goddard's 65-yard runback of a punt and in the fourth period Duard Walker streaked 80 yards on a pass interception. Stallard, Spraker and Pardue turned in their best games of their college coreers. Although losing, little Milligan College amazed Louisiana College to a score of 21 to 13.
