
















This year we approached the organization of THE BUFFALO differently — we tried to build around the theme of Milligan, and the places that are Milligan, and, of course, the people who are Milligan.




CONVOCATION





A strong team will be returning next season and Coach Stout and all Buff baseball fans can look forward to another successful winning season no doubt.





Men's tennis this year was highlighted by a lack of highlights, unless you consider injuries, which plagued the team all year, to be highlights.



recruits.


















Women's Tennis



Administration Building


