









During the past 23 years, Stout has built the baseball program at Milligan into an admirable one. As athletic director Stout has developed 10 teams for intercollegiate competition.

In the time that he has been the coach of the team, they have participated in the Conference Championship 13 times, the District Championship 11 times, and the Area Championship once. His 1972 team won the league title and the 1980 team captured the District 24 NAIA Championship. His overall record is 467-256.



This year's team included only two returning runners and this along with the fact that many invitationals were run, held back the overall record.


Junior Rick Gray was the team captain and last year's MVP. Gray had a very successful season, ending with a 3rd place finish in the district finals.






Paul Sutherland on the start for the Medley Relay.

## Phil Worrell Leaves Milligan



Editor's note: This dedication to Coach Worrell owes much factual data to the article in June 1982 edition of the Mill-Agenda. Special thanks to Mr. Mark Richardson, associate editor, for permission to edit and reprint..

In late spring of 1982, Phil Worrell, appointed to succeed Dr. Harold Stout as Athletic Director, announced his resignation as head coach of Milligan's baskethall program. He has served the college for thirteen years of excellent coaching, and he leaves to accept a position with ETSU as one of the top assistants to baskethall coach Barry Dowd. Mixed feelings accompany the decision, of course, but Worrell sees this opportunity as a crossroads in his career of coaching.

Worrell himself graduated from Milligan in 1959 after involvement in the basketball, baseball and track programs here. He received his M.S. from Indiana State University in 1965. Until 1969, he held the post of a high school basketball coach in Ohio, and then he found himself back in Tennessee, the head coach of his college alma mater's basketball program.

Within two years the Buffaloes established a name in the conference, and for the next eight years the wins averaged 21 per season. This year Worrell was named Volunteer State Athletic Conference Coach of the Year for the fourth time in his short coaching career. His record stands at 230 victories and 150 losses during the 13 years at Milligan.

Milligan appreciates Coach Worrell's faithful service to the athletic program, and each of us recognize him as an excellent coach. We offer special thanks to him for his dedication and hid him farewell as he prepares for this move to East Tennessee State University.





## 100 Years As A College



Milligan's First President and his wife-Mr. & Mrs. Josephus Hopwood

Editor's Note: The following article is an excerpt from an address delivered by Dr. Henry Webb (Chairman, Area of Biblical Learning) at the Founder's Day Ceremony during Alumni Weekend on November 14.

Buffalo Male and Female Institute was opened in 1867 by W.T. Barker. It would serve young people of the Valley by providing basic education for more than two decades until public education became reliably established in the area.

In the same year a young man who had served in the Illinois armies of the Union entered Abingdon Col;ege, a fore-runner of Eureka College. Four years later, in 1873, he graduated, married, and undertook to find a place where he could invest his life in service to mankind in Christ's name. In August of 1875 he came to Johnson City, made arrangements to operate Buffalo Institute, and opened school the next month. The single building was situated on a one-acre tract owned by Joshua Williams. Mr.

Hopwood purchased a small house and one acre adjacent to the school property, thus doubling the campus. Additions to the property came bit by bit and with difficulty.

Mr. Hopwood initiated a policy of seeking out promising students. An early circular stated that the Institute sought to "educate the student for real life" and endeavored to elevate the students character. Lodging and meals could be obtained for \$1.50 to \$1.75 per week.

Hopwood gained the reputation of a good school man. The Institute grew. Meanwhile, public attention was centering on the need for schools and Hopwood saw clearly the opportunity to supplement Buffalo Institute with higher level education. Plans were made to establish a college. In the summer of 1880, 150,000 handmade bricks were burned on the school grounds. In April of 1881 the cornerstone was laid for the college building and the announcement made that the college would be named for Robert Milligan, President of Kentucky University. Milligan was a

mathematician, theologian, and, according to Hopwood, "the purest and best man I have known." A century ago in September the first students were admitted and 100 years ago in May the first degrees were granted to ten aualified students.

Today, with 100 years of history behind us, Milligan College faces a challenging future. That is nothing new here. Milligan has always demonstrated courage and commitment in confronting its future. To the men and women of the past century, whose vision, and sacrifices, and labor are embodied in this campus and breathed into our tradition, we say: We commit ourselves to the perpetuation of the heritage you have bequeathed to us. During the past 100 years the programs and the products of this community of Christian scholarship have given real meaning to the slogan: Christian Education—The Hope of the World. We enter our second century as a college proud of our heritage and determined to project it into the
