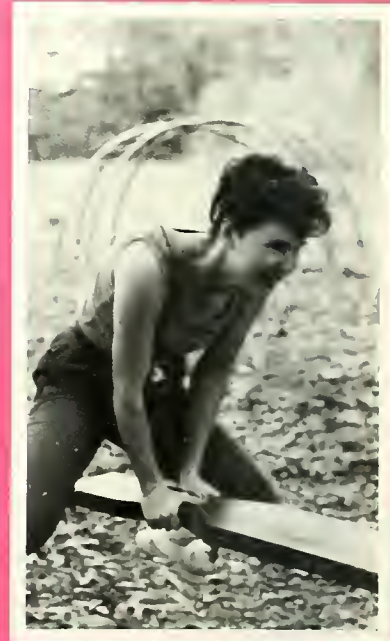

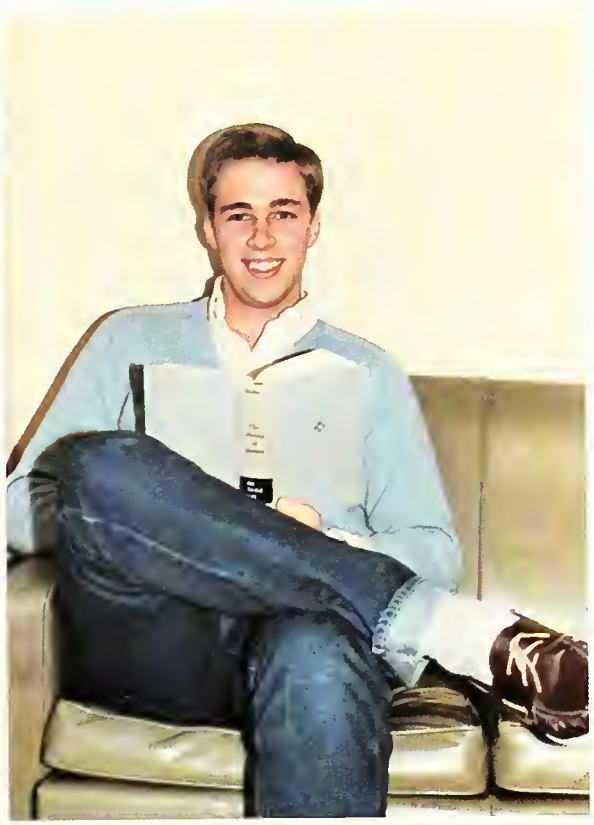
EVERLASTING FRIENDSHIPS

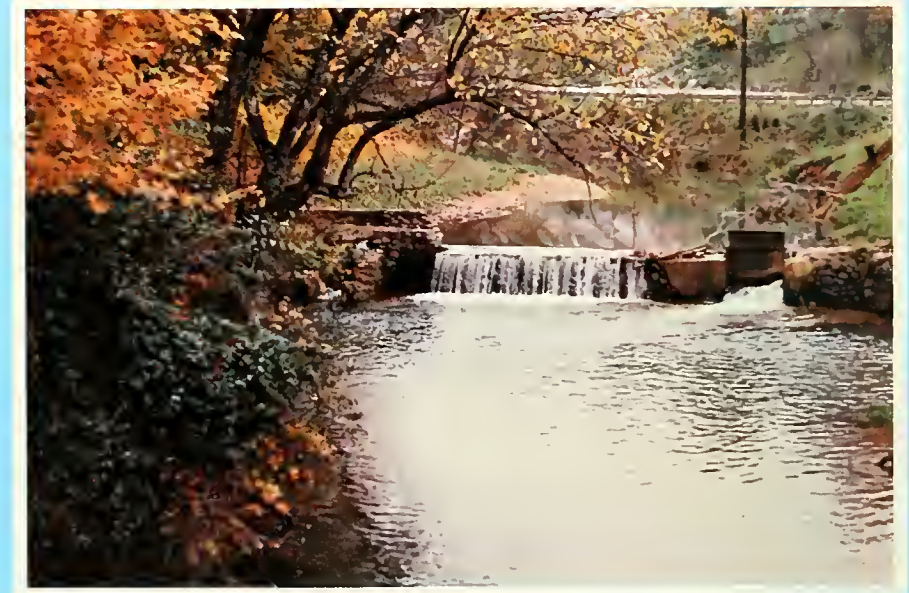
EXPERIENCED EDUCATORS SHOW GREAT DEDICATION

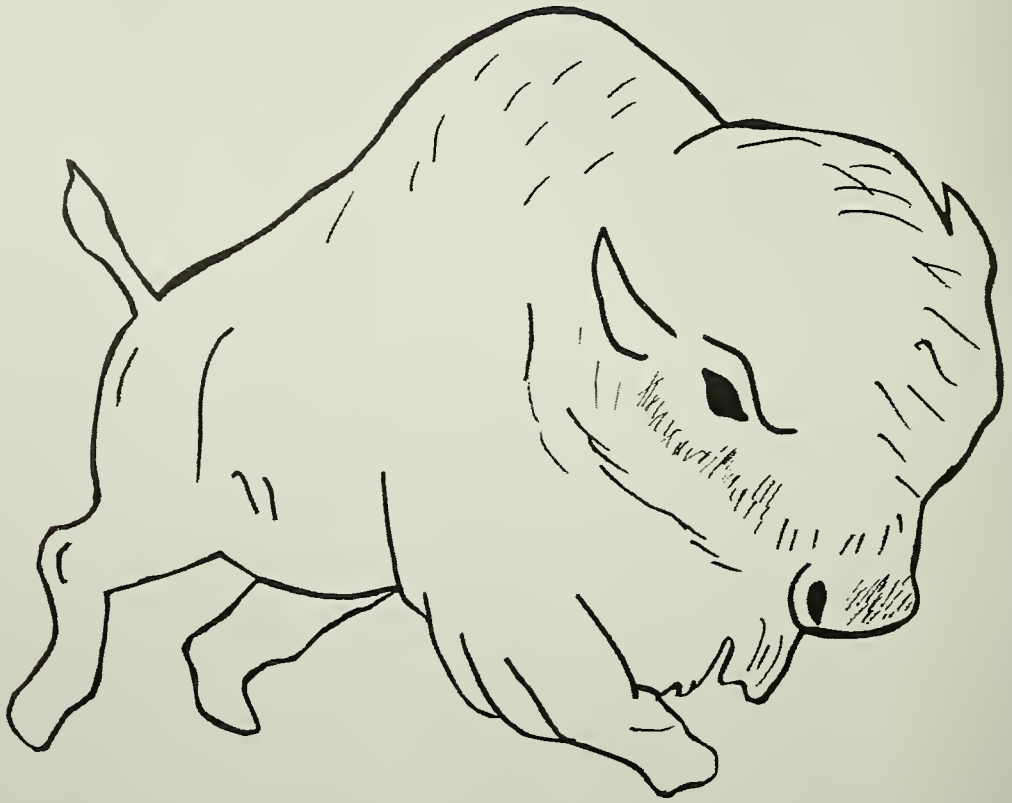
A CHRISTIAN LIBERAL ARTS COLLEGE

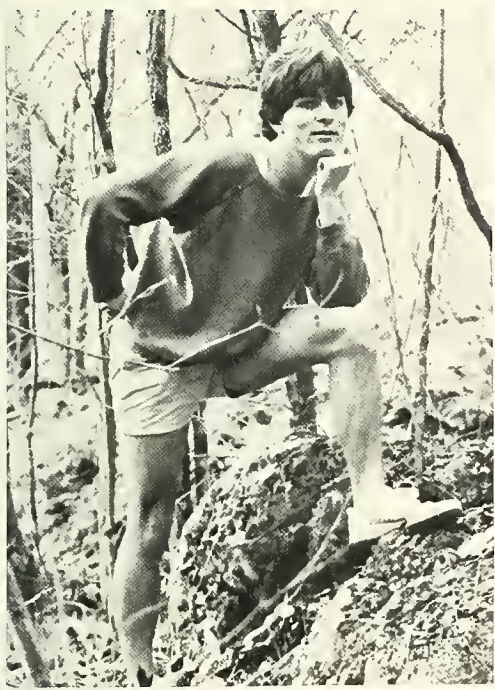
As Sophomores, we must continue in our excellent ways: devoted, self-disciplined, humanities lecture attending, having good eating habits, studying before socializing . . .

Does the social life at Milligan bore you?

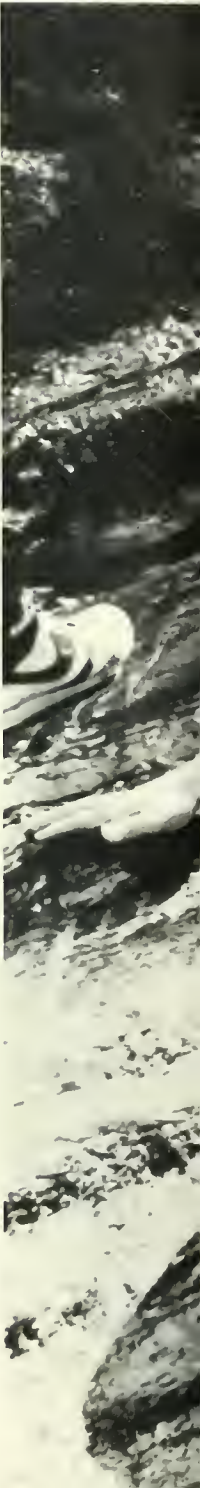

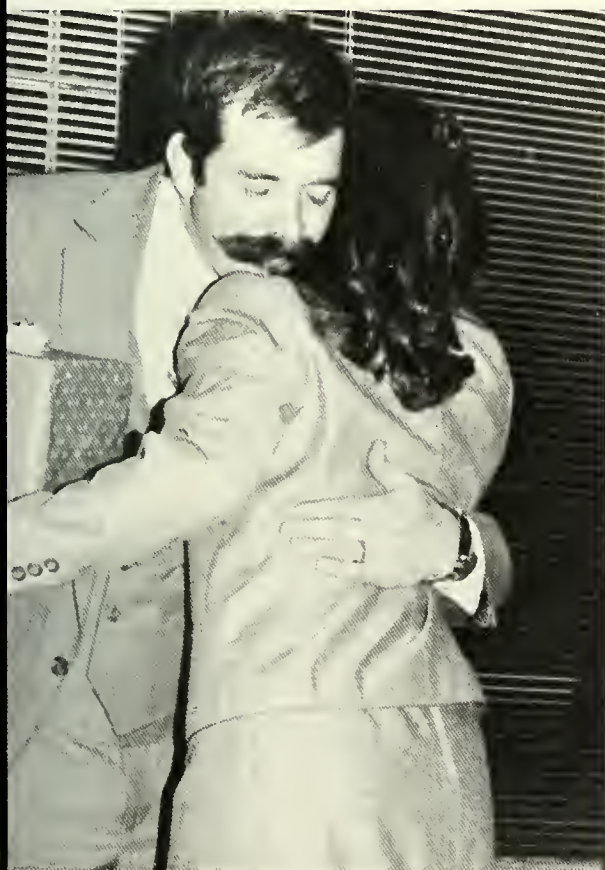
Who is the sweetest person at Milligan?

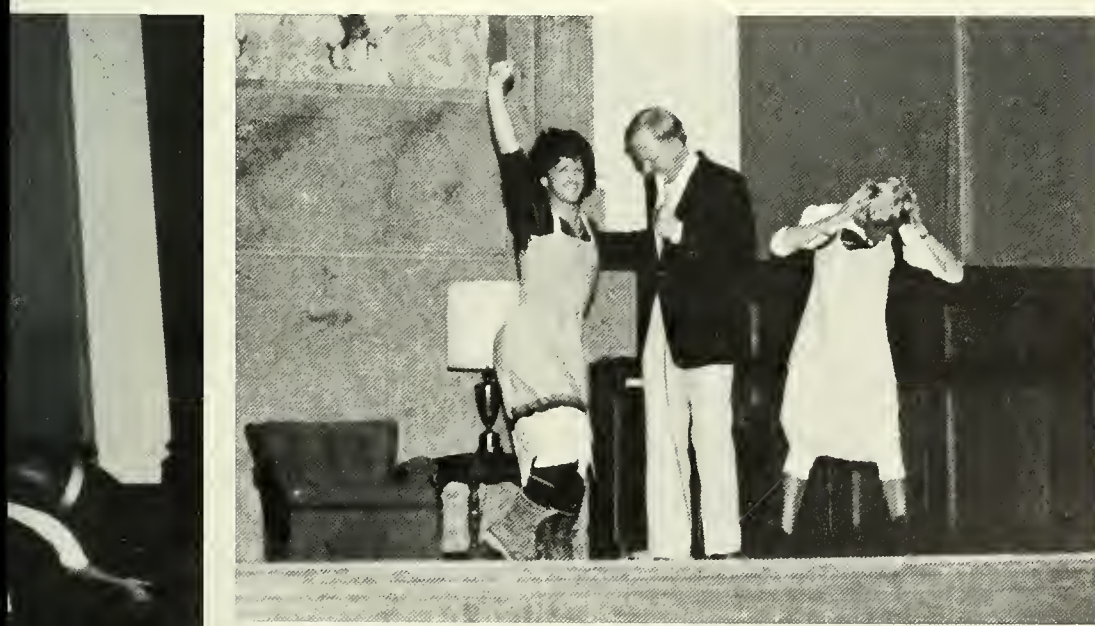

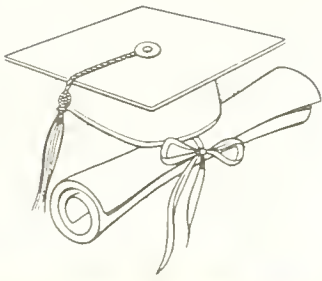
It's Here . . . Wonderful Wednesday!!

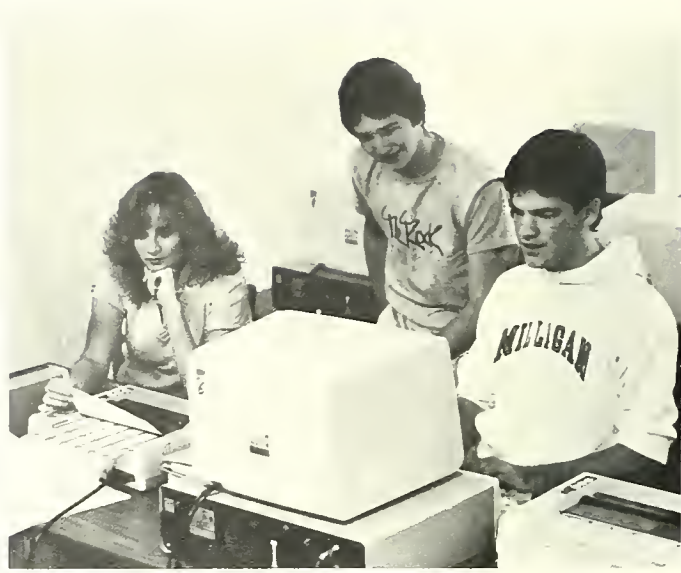

MORE THAN MEETS THE EYE

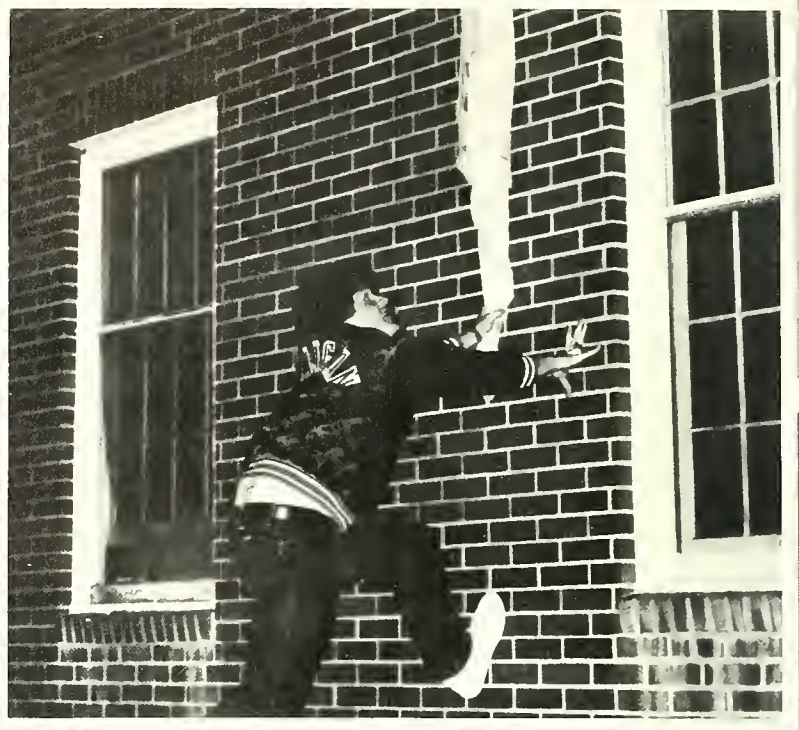

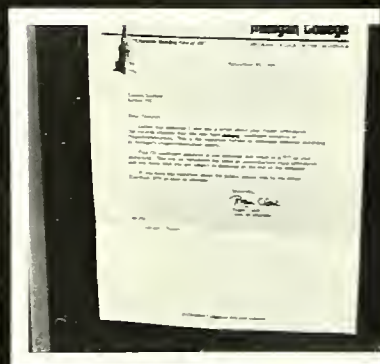
