




A Weakness For Fun



lumni weekend proved to be one of the most memorable weekends of the year. There was alumni football, the f-K road race, "Oedipus Rex", and most importantly - Tim Taft paid the campus a visit!!

The festivities began Friday night, October 27, at 8:00 with a presentation of "Oedipus Rex" in Derthick Theatre. This unique and innovative Milligan production featured incredible performances by Jeff Johnson, Karin Gurley, and many others. Chuck Davis, founder of the North Carolina based African-American Dance Ensemble. provided the choreography, and Richard Major, professor of Theatre at Milligan directed. The Friday night performance, the first of several over the weekend, was an enormous success (although the controversy over the pronunciation of the word "oedipus" took the campus, if not the nation, by storm).

Saturday morning at 8:00, registration for the weekend began in Sutton Hall lobby. Thirty minutes later, the 5-K road race began at the fieldhouse. Over 100 men and women participated in the race and Milligan students helped out at relief stations, with registration, etc.

At 10:00, a seminar was given by Chuck Davis in Derthick Theatre. Players in the alumni football game began warming up at Anglin field. Also, Circle K helped out during this time by providing child care at the Children's Resource Center.

By 10:30 Brunch was being served in the cafeteria, and the alumni football game was underway! From 11:30 until 2:00 in the afternoon, the classes of 79, 54, 64, and 84, met in various places around the campus. At 2:00 pm, the class of 69 met in the Hughes room, while a matinee performance of "Oedipus" took place at Derthick Theatre. For the next several hours, all of the reunion pictures were taken. Also during this time there was an open house at the home of President Leggett.

The classes of 59, 74, and 49 met at around 3:00, and at 4:00 a dance movement workshop was offered at the fieldhouse. At 6:00 the class of 88 met in lower Seeger. History Happens Before Our Eyes

s college students, so many world events pass us by.
But this year was a historical year of change in our world.

No one can forget the courage of the Chinese students, and the tragedy of Tiananmen Square in Beijing, China. Everyone was shocked when the earthquake shook San Francisco and the bridge over I-880 collapsed. A little closer to home, Hurricane Hugo destroyed parts of the Caribbean and the east coast of South Carolina. President Bush declared war on drugs, especially

on Manuel Noriega. The US government took action against Noriega in Panama where he was finally arrested and charged with drug trafficking.

Most importantly, this year we saw several eastern European nations call for reform. From the dramatic changes in Romania and Czechoslovakia to the monumental moment when the Berlin Wall was destroyed, we saw the iron curtain begin to rise. Hungary also, under the pressure of popular will, changed its status from Communist to an independent republic. In Poland, members of the Solidarity trade union which was previously outlawed began to run the government as a result of free elections. Even the Soviet Union, under the leadership of Mikhail Gorbachev, allowed new press and religious freedoms. Ethnic unrest gripped many of the outlying Soviet republics, namely Lithuania, which called for territorial sovereignty. And remarkably, East and West Germany called for unification.

We watched as all these incredible events changed our world. History took place right before our eyes.

illigan College Theatre experienced growth this year with several ambitious undertakings. The fall semester was devoted to a cross-cultural interpretation of the Sophoclean classic, Oedipus Rex. Thanks to the penmanship and perseverance of Ms. Iles and Mr. Major, the college received grants totalling nearly \$9,000 to fund a project entitled Oedipus Revisited: From Ancient Rite to Modern Meaning. The Project involved several humanities scholars and artists from our region who wrote essays and study guides, lectured, and discussed the significance of the play from their varied disciplines. The play, Oedipus Rex, served as the centerpiece for the

project and under the leadership of Mr. Major, brought together the talents of Chuck Davis, choreographer, Karen Brewster, costume designer and mask- maker, Dennis Wyatt, scenic designer, and student Pam McConnell, lighting designer. The ritual, dance, rhythmic drums and colorful West African stetting all provided an original stamp to the play.

In the winter, Mr. Major's Theatre Workshop class began researching and developing another original idea. The class developed a play for young audiences on the environmental issue of how each of us can make a difference through recycling. Thus, The Recycling Play was born, and the group received a \$1,000 grant from the Tennessee Arts Commission for their

pilot production. The show toured a dozen schools and participated in the 20th anniversary of Earth Day activities.

In the spring, the musical Godspell was produced and directed by Mr. Major with musical leadership provided by Dr. Williams. This colorful and energetic show, originally produced at Milligan in 1975, returned to the Milligan stage this year with as much enthusiasm and success as the original Milligan production.






March



The Buffs win TVAC

The Milligan College Men's Basketball team made it two consecutive years with 20 or more wins by running up a record of 27-9. The Buffs also won the Tennessee-Virginia Athletic Conference championship giving them their 1st regular-season conference championship since 1939. The Buffs also won the NCCAA District 5 Championship and participated in the NCCAA National tournament for the first time.

The team was led by Sr. forward Dino Allen. Dino was ranked tenth in rebounding in the nation for NAIA and was fourth in fieldgoal percentage for the NAIA. Dino was selected the TVAC player of the year, All District 24, and NCCAA team All-American. Along with Allen was the outside scoring

threat of Jr. guard Tom Musick. Tom led the team in scoring by averaging 23.11 points per game. Tom also became Milligan's third all-time scorer with 1,835 points. Musick was also named first team All-TVAC. Freshman Jeff Click was named TVAC Co-Freshman of the year and Freshman Shane Turley was named to the TVAC All-Academic team.

The team as a whole did well averaging 95.6 points per game to rank ninth in the NAIA for the Nation and they were ranked twelfth in the NAIA for rebounding percentage with 56.3% of the rebounds per game.

The Buffs had an exciting year. Not only winning the TVAC and going to the NCCAA Nationals, but they

travelled to the Christian Classic, which was held in St. Louis, Missouri and was a very eventful trip. One of the most exciting things of the year was receiving a new assistant coach, Sylvester Clay. Coach Clay brought the finishing touches of coaching expertise to round out the team. Finally none of this could have been possible without the coaching and leadership of Coach Tony Wallingford. Coach Wallingford has produced two twenty plus winning teams in his three years here at Milligan. Coach Wallingford was named TVAC Coach of the Year and has a career record of 204-66 which ranks him sixth nationally among active NAIA coaches.











The Drill Team performed during halftime at the basket-ball games with dance routines to many different types of music. The team's captains were Ericka Hernandez and Teresa Lang.


