


raderie and friendship. Whether it was cheering at a ball game, metting in prayer groups, or studying for exams, Milligan students made the most of their years in college.





Nancy Bowen and Kim Lake pose as Milligan security. They could have probably done just as good of job.





Barkes were hilarious, especially when they announced that everyone's favorite professor was "Dr. Street!"







In recent years it was difficult to determine the single largest news event of the year. Such was not the case for the past school year. Without doubt, the events in the Persian Gulf dominated news coverage in print and over the airwaves. People around the world anxiously prayed for peace, but when peace no longer existed, they prayed for a rapid resolution to the conflict with a minimal amount of bloodshed. What these people received was a major Allied victory which sent Iraq's military reeling and placed Saddam Hussein's position of power in jeopardy.

In August 1990, Iraq invaded the small oil-rich country of Kuwait. The United States, in



By the time war broke out, the U.N. had passed 13 resolutions condemning Iraq and ordering her withdrawal from Kuwait, and the U.S. had established a potent counter-threat in the region of over 500,000 men and women of our armed forces. Shortly after the begining of the spring semester, hostilities reached their peak with the initiation of a six-week air offensive against strategic targets deep within Iraq. This was followed by a brief grand offensive to defeat Iraq's most powerful weapon, Hussein's Republican Guard. Allied technology proved unbeatable. Shortly arfter the beginning of the ground war, Iraq finally accepted the U.N. resolutions and withdrew from Kuwait.

Other events have also been extremely newsworthy. During the winter, Germany again unified into one country after 45 years of division. The political unrest which caused the crumbling of the Berlin Wall and the end to Communism in much of Eastern Europe became evident in the Soviet Union with the succession of the Latvia, Lithuania, and Georgia republics. As a result of the war in the Middle East, the relief effort on behalf of the Kurdish refugees became the leading news story.

The members of our military found the hot desert in Saudi Arabia difficult to live in.





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
That Just Doesn't



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


General education requirements are completed before, during, or after the program. OMP students demonstrate great determination to earn a B.S. while juggling family, school, and work obligations.



Your Memory Will Live Oftellet

Milligan College sadly regrets the loss of a dear friend, Mr. Joe McCormick. He, a Milligan graduate himself went on to serve our college for thirty-four years, and died this year at the age of ninety-one.

After he graduated, Mr. McCormick went on to become the manager of the Johnson City Laundry, all the while being an active fundraiser for the First Christian Church of Johnson City. Milligan asked Joe McCormick for his help when the school began to have financial difficulties. They knew that Mr. McCormick was the one man that would be able to raise the money that was needed. Mr. McCormick agreed to come help Milligan out and ended up working full-time.

During his years here, Mr.

McCormick drove an estimated 25,000 miles a year traveling to collect money for Milligan. He himself estimated that he had raised about 15 million dollars for our college by keeping records of donors, and returning to see them annually to ask for money for our school. Mr. McCormick's services to Milligan included being a trustee, the chairman of the trustees, and assistant to many of the college's presidents.

Joe McCormick loved Milligan and worked a very selfless job in an effort to keep Milligan runinng smoothly financially. His life contributed many things to Milligan College, and he will be greatly missed.














Women's Soccer





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
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
