



The evening centered around ueen Elizabeth (Caitlin Reaves) dher twelve royal guests. Durg the dinner, the guests were tertained by singing, acting, acing, a lively jester, and an strumental consort. Dr. Dennis

Williams, director, claimed that "the enjoyment of the evening is based upon the fact that the dinner guests are not the audience, but they are the participants."

The dinner guests were encouraged to sing Christmas carols, clap their hands in rhythym to a vigorous Spanish carol led by Sir Francis Drake (Richard Harrison), and even partake in a spontaneous play which incorporated the talents of five dinner guests each night.

Since this madrigal dinner marked the 25th feast in Milligan's history, Williams was challenged to create something new." Besides the addition of new music, fresh dialogue and a trio of dancing minstrels, Williams acknowledges "the most striking addition was the applica-

tion of a company of actors called the Nottingham Players." Fueled by the humor of Mike Stanley, Erika Pierson and Mike Beverly, the Players were directed by Richard Major, professor of drama. Thomas Townsend who has played the role of the High Chamberlain for the past two years said, "I think it was a great experience for the music and the theatre departments to work together in such a cooperative way."

"There's an educational aspect to the madrigal performances that I think a lot of people miss at first glance," said Amy Bishop who portrayed Lady Elizabeth Raliegh. For example, Scott Greaser portrayed scientist/inventor Sir Francis Bacon, Doug Hartley played the role of the famous poet Ben Jonson.

The task of constructing the madrigal event was very complex. Besides the twelve chamber singers who began rehearsing in September, Bobbie Macek created six new costumes, Doris Schmidt coordinated the dancing, 15 theatre work study students helped build the set, and some 40 kitchen workers assisted in the meal. The jester, Kip Lines, spent up to an hour and a half preparing his make-up, costume, and undergoing necessary mental preparations each night. "It was a lot of work... [yet] it was really an enjoyable experience to make people laugh," said Lines. Lady Sarah Morely, played by Beth Zimmerman, agreed that it was hard work. "But the friendships made it all worth it."



Continent (Europe, of course).


Carrying their belongings in backpacks they traveled through the cities and scenery of Europe. This required good health.


Later in the evening, everyone drove out to the State Line Driveln to watch the second greatest show on earth, "Wayne's World."







When away from Milligan, she spends time doing housework, tending to her yard, and helping out with local historical and geneological organizations. She also volunteers some of her time in


the library at First Christian Church in Johnson City.



leans offered were the Cafe du Monde, Preservation Hall (where jazz began), and the River Town Theater (which was showing "Steel Magnolias").


One added bonus was that the Convention was being held at the same time the French Quarter Festival was being held.












Overall, the team batting average held at .371 for the year.
