

With these changes come improvement and a better Milligan for all of us.







In the past, the Milligan Arts Council has brought a variety of educational and entertaining artists to the campus, and the 1992-1993 season was no exception. On October 1, the Arts Council welcomed native American story teller Joe Bruchac to Milligan. Bruchac, who is a noted storyteller and writer, drew on his heritage to delight and enthrall his audiences in Convo as well as during his open workshop and evening performance in Derthick Theatre.

During Alumni Weekend in late October, Milligan alumnus Dan Foote returned to campus to display his nationally syndicated political cartoons in the Milligan Invitational VI. In December, the Friendship and Thankful Baptist church choirs combined their efforts in a gospel choir benefit concert, and donations of food were collected to help feed the needy in the area.

Early in the spring semester on January 18th, the Arts Council brought the National Opera Company which performed "Cosi Fan Tutte" (School for Sweethearts). This opera was a delightfully humorous story put to music by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and was sung in English.

In February, jazz musicians Plunky Branch and Oneness, his seven piece ensemble, captivated the Milligan audience with several African folk numbers and numerous jazz pieces. The band also took requests during intermission and played a variety of contemporary hits.

The Milligan Arts Council was also fortunate to have nationally renouned pianist George Winston give a solo piano concert in Seeger. The Arts Council concluded its season by bringing the Repertory Dance Theatre of Utah in May. I hope as our lives continue we will all look back with fond memories of our Junior year. May God be with you and bless you in all the things you do. I have been honored by the privilege of being your president.




So to our beloved Humanities faculty we bid thee adieu. As for my lack of documentation here, forgive me for I am an underling. Again remember little children to love one another. I am...




Seniors Craig






