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




Servant Leaders Return to Milligan a Week Early to





The missions work of New Life, Inc. has grown tremendously since the summer of 1989 when 14 Milligan College students first traveled to Piedras. Mexico. 



"Class Act"...A Play as Flexible as Life







pitcher. Oiler has moved on to the Minnesota Twins' organization. Higle was 4-3 last year with a 4.50 earnedrun-average.









"Rescue those being led away to death;

hold back those staggering toward slaughter. If you say, 'But we knew nothing about this,'

does not he who weighs the heart perceive it? Does not he who guards your life know it?

Will he not repay each person according to what he has done?"

—Proverbs 24:11-12.

In a way, this may be the most pro-life thing that you have ever read; it is a direct command from God to protect the innocent. "Prolife," of course, means many different things to different people. For some, it means a call to the missions field to help those in other nations whose lives are threatened. For others, it means a desire to help the homeless who are in jeopardy here. For a group of Milligan students this year, "pro-life" meant founding a new organization, Milligan Students for Life (MSL), whose purpose is to be salt in the world by helping to protect unborn children.

Our most memorable activity this year was definitely the March For Life in Washington, D.C. Through an incredible string of events, MSL was not only able to attend, but in fact we were able to lead the March of nearly 100,000 people.

Included in that one hundred thousand were approximately twenty students from Milligan and three from King College, who also joined us. Because we led the March, Milligan students were seen on network television and in newspapers and magazines all across the country as positive models of the prolife movement.

We also had a number of other activities, and although they were less "glamorous", they were even more important. These included sponsoring a convocation in which a woman came and spoke on the way that abortion has hurt her; getting students involved on the front-line at a local crisis

pregnancy clinic named Abortion Alternatives Christian Services; attending a local life chain with another thirty students; writing to our congressmen and congresswomen; and spending a good amount of time in prayer.

Our officers included Dave Chapman, Angela Kelly and John Kasler, and we were sponsored by Rebecca Sapp and Tommy Oaks. However, there were a number of others who also contributed to the group in invaluable ways.

The seventieth volume of the Milligan College *Buffalo* was printed by the printing and publishing division of Herff Jones, 2800 Selma Highway, Montgomery, Alabama 36108. The *Buffalo* is printed on 80lb. bordeaux gloss enamel with a press run of 669 copies. The cover board is 120pt. binders board with a base material of smokey blue leather text with a crush grain. A gold foil and maroon and black silkscreened paints were applied. The book was smyth sewn, round and back, with a trim size of 8 1/2 x 11. The endsheets, different front and back, were printed on natural paper with applied black and maroon inks. Pages were designed using Aldus Pagemaker v4.01 on the Herff Jones Pagemaster template.

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
