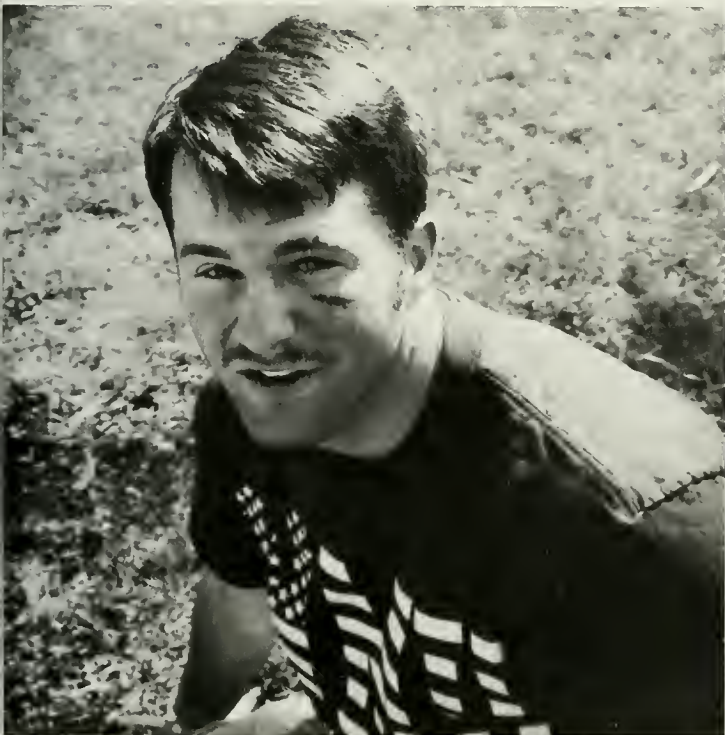

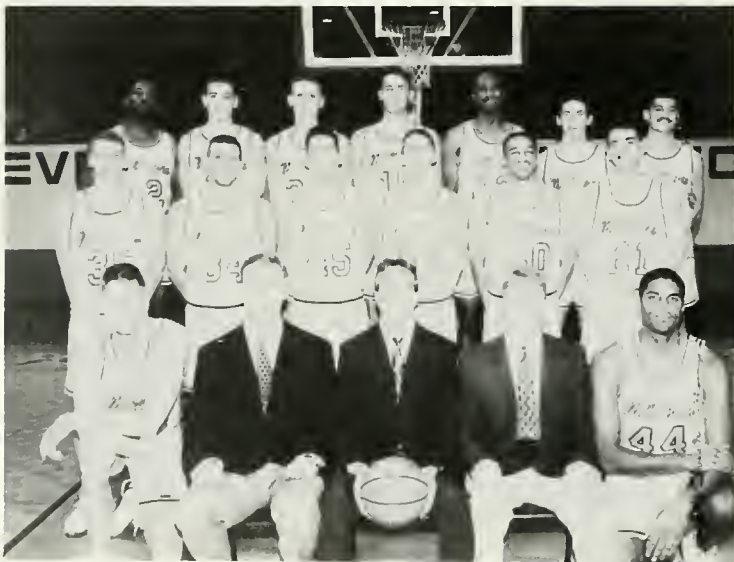

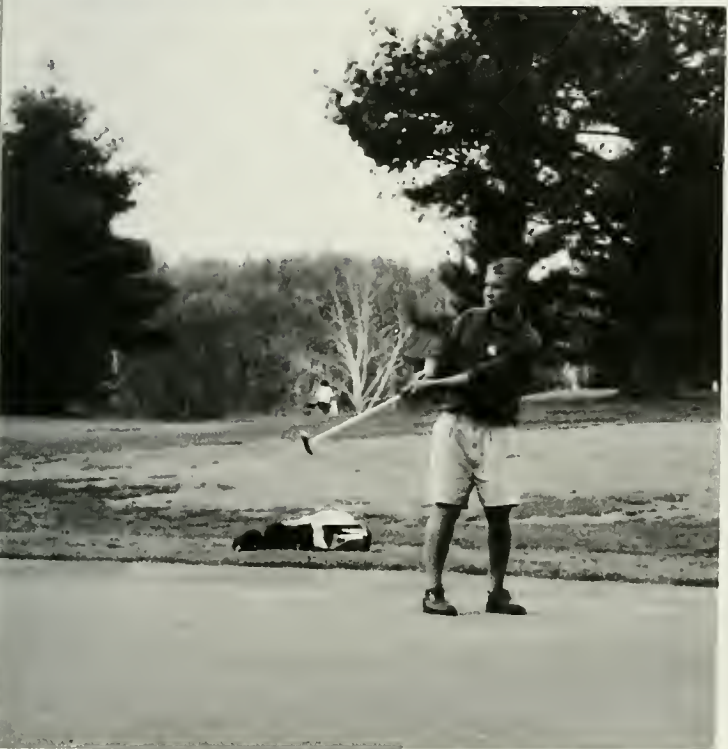

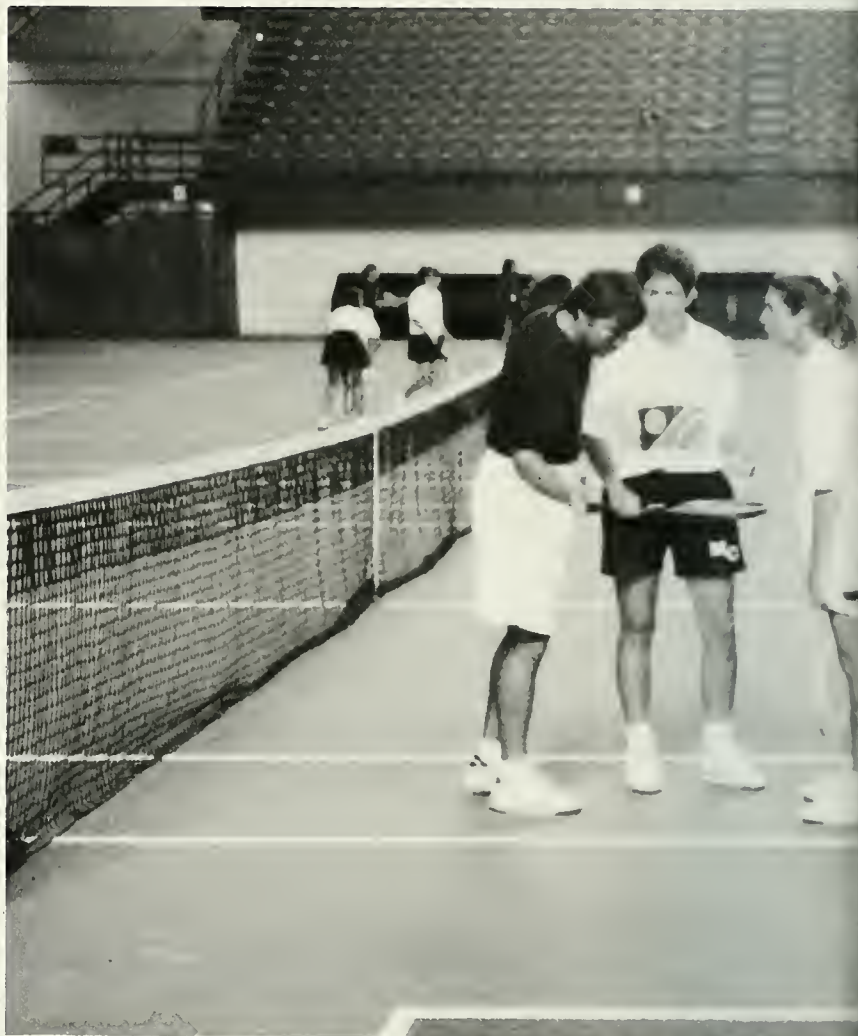

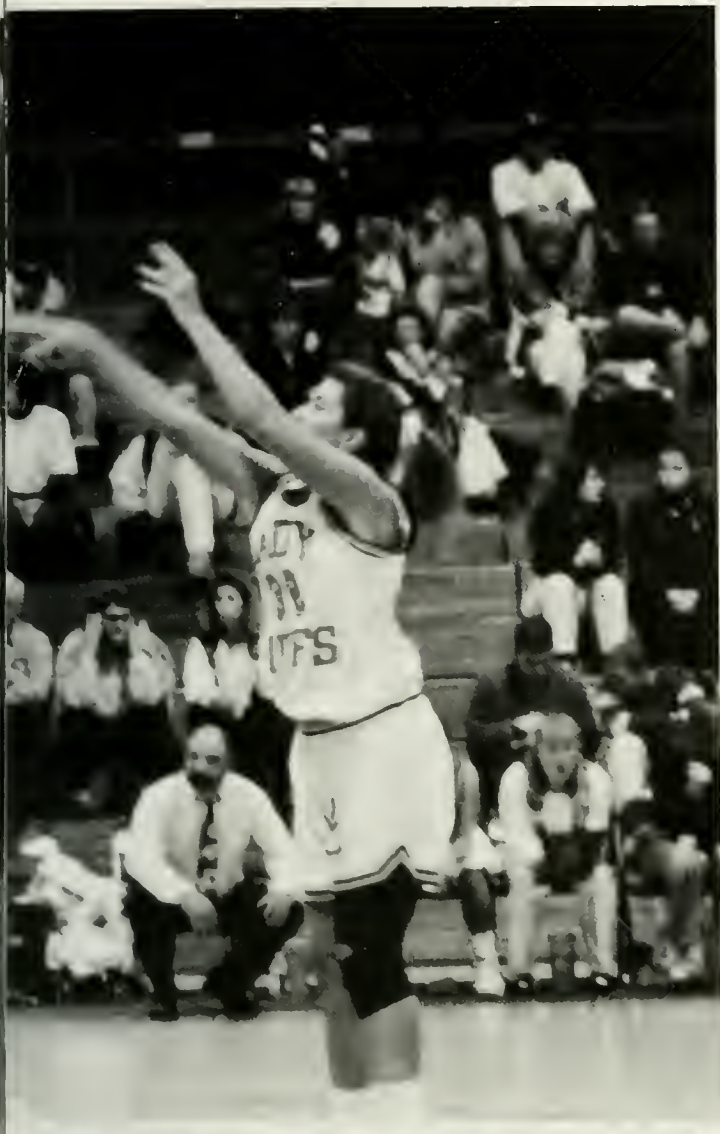

Theatre Captured Hearts and Imaginations

The 1994-95 theatre season at Milligan College once again captured the hearts and imaginations of its audiences through stellar performances and thought provoking productions. The Fall production of William Nicholson's *Shadowlands* featured guest artist, Dr. Paul Blowers, of Emmanuel School of Religion in a captivating portrayal of C.S. Lewis. The start-studded cast was recognized by the American College Theater Festival, sponsored by the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington D.C., as one of the outstanding productions in the Southeast for 1995 and was invited to the Regional Festival at the University of North Carolina, Greensboro to participate in an evening of scenes of the regions most significant theatre work.

The spring production of Shakespeares classic love story, of *Romeo and Juliet* was equally ambitious and successfully packed houses during its two week run. Notable performances included Gabriel Morrow as Romeo, Laura Leigh Davidson as

Juliet, Dr. Jack Knowles as Friar Lawrence, and Elaine Cavanaugh as the Nurse.

Rounding out the year was the annual Milligan College Theatre for young Audiences tour to area schools. This year's production of *Jack and the Beanstalk* was performed eighteen times to a combined audience of approximately 5,000 young people.

The final project of the season was the Ninth Edition of the Festival of One Act plays, sponsored by the National Theatre Honorary, Alpha-Psi Omega, which involved 75+ Milligan Students, staff, and faculty members. The seven productions ran concurrently with the 1st Annual Student Art Exhibited which featured 85 works by 26 students. Again, as in past years, excellence was the standard of the Milligan stage, where young actors gained experience and confidence, always guided by the touch of the Master.

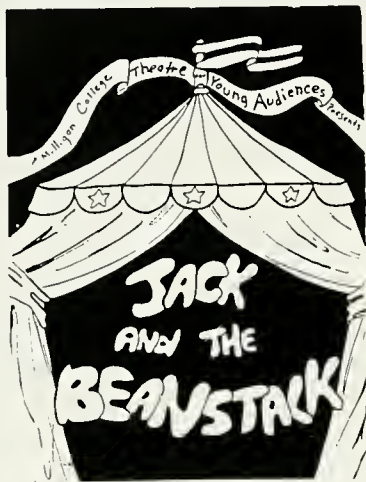

choir to worship God with many diverse people. Churches were always welcoming the choir with wonderful

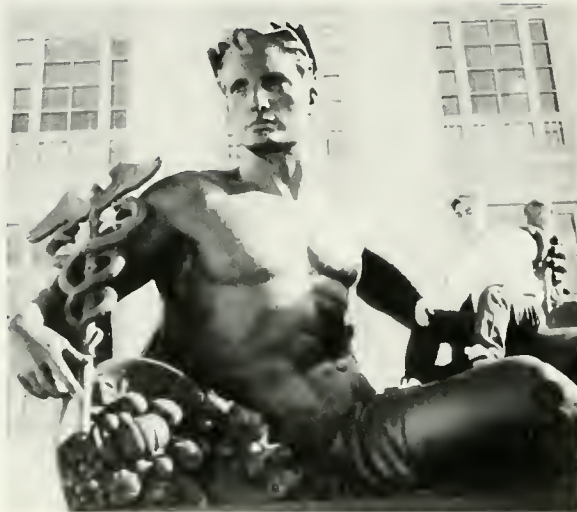
reminded everyone of how special they were to the success of the tour. (Okay, so maybe the squirt guns didn't add too much unity, but

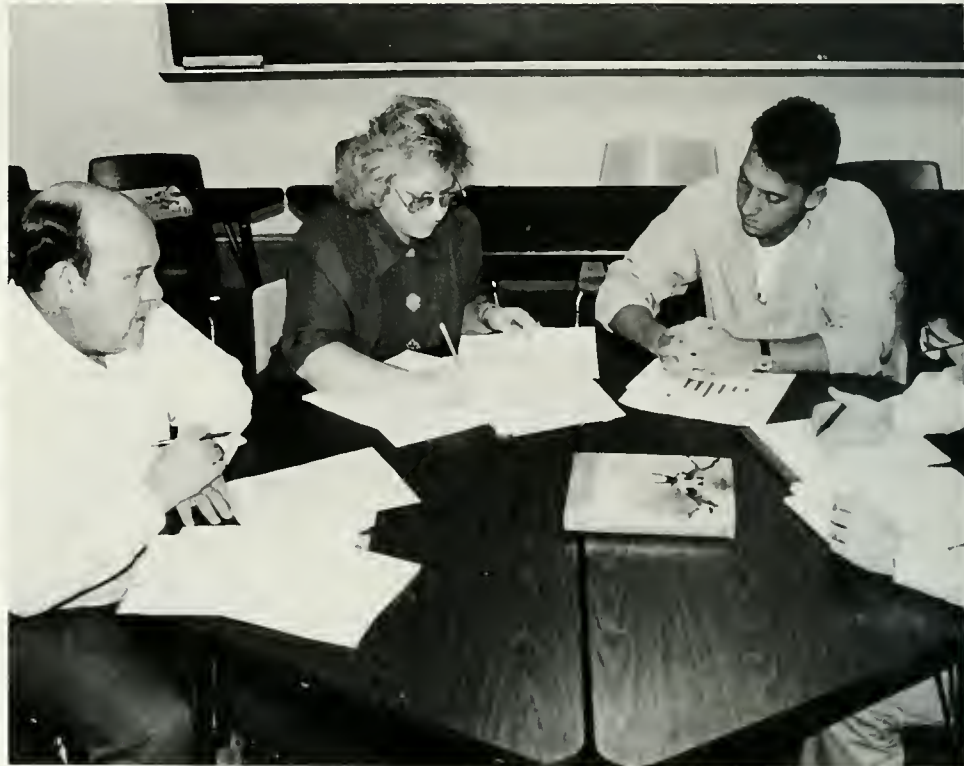

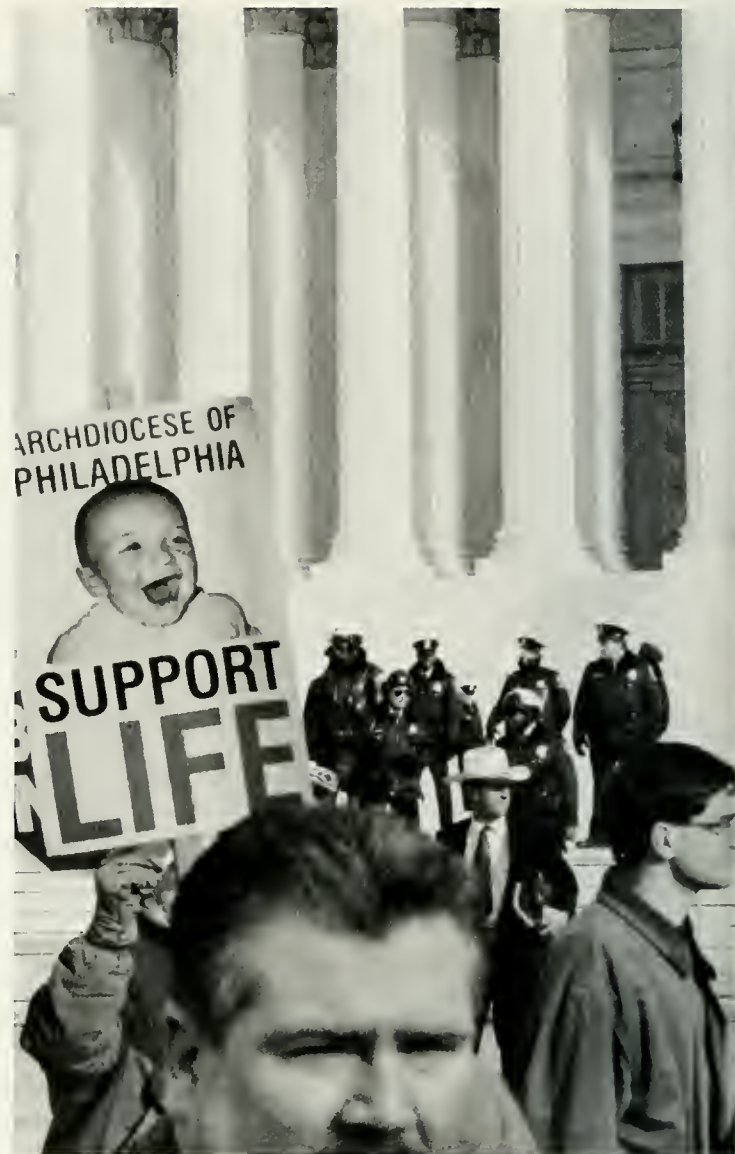
But that isn't the only thing we do! Many of our members participated in the local Life Chain, a time of public prayer. Others wrote letters to their Senators.

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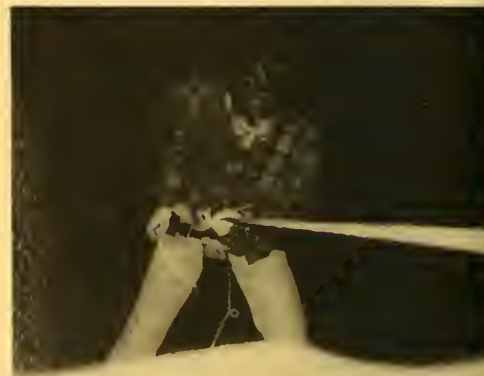
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No Hooligans in Heaven
