Nineteenninety-six marks the 130th anniversary of a college that truly has become a CLASSIC.

Founded in 1866as Buffalo Male and Female Institute, the school was renamed Milligan College in 1881 in honor of Josephus Hopwood's favorite professor, Robert Milligan. It was Sarah LaRue Hopwood who coined the College's motto-"Christian Education: The Hope of the World."

The College's humble beginnings consisted of 85 students,just three majors and a single classroom building now known as Hopwood Memorial Christian Church.

In its second year ranked among the best liberal arts colleges in the South by U.S. News $\mathcal{E}$ World Report, Milligan now offers 27 majors and enjoys the highest enrollment ever with 866 students.

Through Milligan's CLASSICAL style of education, we learn to explore our Western roots while also looking at the world we live in today from a Christian perspective.

In short, the past 130 years have proven to be a real MAKING OF A CLASSIC.

## Studies Abroad

For the first time, two Milligan students took advantage of a special program with Oxford University in England. Kyle Kakac and Jason Mead, seniors, spent their spring semesters studying at the Centre for Medieval and Renaissance Studies.

The courses offered dealt with all aspects of study: art, literature, history, science, theology and philosophy. The program offered them the opportunity to be culturally shocked without the warm comforts of a fellow Christian college.

Both Kakac and Mead found the environment academically challenging and hope that Milligan students will continue to take advantage of this opportunity to learn from and study under some of the greatest academic minds in England.

Senior Joel Carillet studied in Cairo, Egypt, with the Middle East Studies Program.


Carillet joined 17 other students. from 15 different Christian schools for a semester of learning and fun.
"Together we trudged through studies that covered the people and cultures of the Middle East, the IsraeliPalestinian conflict, Islam and Arabic," said Carillet.
"The semester included several opportunities to take weekend trips outside Cairo," he explained. "Climbing Mt. Sinai, snorkeling in the chilly Red Sea, riding a bike across hours of desert to the Aswan High Dam, wandering through ancient ruins, hitchhiking along the Mediterranean, sailing on the Nile, and staying out of jail are wonderful memories."

## Christmas Dinners

Traditionally set in Renaissance England, this year the Christmas Dinners moved their theme, a change in the twenty-nine year history of the Dinners, to the Tennessee frontier in order to celebrate Tennessee's bicentennial.

The dinners were even designated as an "Official Tennessee 200 Bicentennial Project."

The setting was a Christmas wedding on the frontier, shortly before the Tennessee constitutional convention of 1796 . The excitement of family and friends as they gathered for the nuptials was paralleled by the excitement of the founding statesmen as Tennessee prepared to join the new United States.

Feasting, dancing, and singing filled the dinner theater festivities, hosted as always by the Chamber Singers.

The characters portrayed in the dinners were all historical figures of high prominence in 1795. John Sevier and his wife, Catherine, hosted the dinner for their friends as they celebrate the marriage of their daughter.

Other notable guests included William Blount, governor of the Southwest Territory who established the town of Knoxville and became the first senator for the state of Tennessee, and his wife, Mary.

Another prominent figure was Landon Carter, one of the founders of Carter County, and his wife Elizabeth for whom the town of Elizabethton was later named. Perhaps the favorite character of the audience, though, was Abner Campbell, who filled the evening with some "good ol' Tennessee Humor."

The Milligan College Lady Buffs Basketball team finished stronger than predicted in the 1995-96 season. Although losing key players due to graduation and injury, the Lady Buffs stood strong down the stretch to finish with an overall record of 18-12. In the TVAC, the Lady Buffs challenged their opponents for the title, only to come up short, to rival Tusculum, and finish third.

The strength of the Lady Buffs rose from the returning seniors that participated in the 199596 season. They included Joanna Bellamy, Tammy Carter, and Amanda Moore, all starters for the Buffs, and heavy contributors to the offensive and defensive ends. Bellamy led the team in 3-point field goal percentage at $35 \%$, Carter in assists with 6.6 per game (fourth nationally), and Moore with 8.8 rebounds per game.

After sophomore scorer Crystal Grindstaff went down with a knee injury at the beginning of the season, the Lady Buffs looked to find someone who would step up and take on the offensive load. Freshman Glenda Blevins and junior Doneva Bays did just that as they averaged 16.4 and 16 points per game, respectively. Blevins became the TVAC Freshman-of-the-Year, as she led the NAIA nationally in field goal percentage at $65 \%$.

The game that the Lady Buffs will most be remembered for this season was the comeback win against Tennessee Wesleyan during Family Weekend. Trailing the entire game, the Buffs tied the score with one minute to go in regulation. With one second left on the clock, Glenda Blevins nailed a foul shot, leading the Buffs to victory in one of the most exciting games in school history.

The Buffs and their fans saw many new aces take the court, inluding the return of iead coach Tony Wallingford.
At the beginning of the year, the Buffs were anked 22nd in the NAIA Division II national re-season poll. Although expectations were igh, the Buffs started out of the blocks slowly nd could not regain the same composure as hey had in the 1994-95 season.
At times, the Buffs looked to be at full trength as they beat nationally ranked Alice loyd College by double digits and made ncredible comebacks against teams like Montreat College.
They also made an incredible comeback in vhat was the most exciting game of the season, gainst Tennessee Wesleyan during Family Veekend. The Men were down by 28 points $t$ the half, and still down by 8 with 1:43 left. hey ended up ahead by a point with 1:05 emaining and a free throw with 19 seconds
left on the clock won the game. Ecstatic fans rushed the court. The men truly showed tenacity.

The Buffs, however, continued to go up and down, only to finish fifth in the TVAC with an overall record of 17-15.

Jason Pittser, Jeff Bishop, and Justin Nelson ended four year careers with the Buffs in the 1995-96 season. Pittser became the fourth player in the school's history to score over 2,000 points in his college career. He ended up as the all-time third leading scorer at Milligan with a total of 2,213 points.

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## Colophon

The 1996 Buffalo was published by the 1996 Buffalo yearbook staff at Milligan College and printed by Herff Jones Yearbooks in Montgomery, Alabama. Press run was 750 copies.

The full color cover used a white lithox base material with full color inks applied. All covers were laminated with heavyweight gloss lamination. The staff selected a Cream Colortext endsheet stock with black ink applied for the design. The first signature was printed on a 110 lb . high gloss paper stock, Allegiance, with the remainder of the book using an 80 lb . gloss paper stock.

Palatino font was used for body copy and Helvetica font for captions. Headline fonts varied throughout the book.
