



TO NATIONALS

Milligan College Women's Basketball completed its most successful season ever. The Lady Buffs won the TVAC regular season championship, going a perfect 18-0 in the conference. They also won the conference tournament. At the NAIA Division II National Championship in Angola, IN, Milligan defeated Grand View College of Iowa, 82-77, before falling to eventual runnerup Black Hills State of South Dakota, 71-70.

The 30-5 Lady Buffs were led by First Team All-American and TVAC Player of the Year, Glenda Blevins, who averaged 25.5 points and 8.8 rebounds per game. TCAC Freshman of the Year, Becky Sells, averaged 17.2 points and 11.5 rebounds per game. Sophomore Crystal Grindstaff (10.5 points and 3.5

assists per game) was named All-TVAC for the second time in her career.






