

Cross-Cultural Dsychology Students Travel to Atlanta

Each year, Dr. Mills takes two trips to Atlanta, Georgia with students from her Cross-Cultural Psychology class. The purpose of the trip is two-fold, to provide for the local homeless and to learn more about Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. In the past students have spent Saturday morning working at Blood N Fire, a homeless shelter. However, when the second group of students arrived in the Fall they found that the shelter had been shut down, so they spent the morning doing odd jobs. The trip to Blood N Fire is organized by a missions agency that is directed by Kelly McDuffie. Kelly is a Milligan alum and close friend of Dr. Mills. Saturday afternoon the students travel to downtown Atlanta, to pay tribute to Martin Luther King Jr. Within a few short steps of each other are Dr. King's and his wife Coretta Scott King's tombs, the original Ebeneezer Baptist Church, where Dr. King was a pastor, and the Martin Luther King Jr. National Historic Site. On Sunday morning, students attend church at the new Ebeneezer Baptist Church, located across the street from the original, which has since been turned into a museum.





TRACK & CROSS COUNTRY

66 It is difficult to recount all of the successes of the Men and Women's Cross Country and Track Teams this year. The Lady Buffs led the way with their fourth straight AAC Conference and Region XII Championship titles, qualifying them for the National Championships in Louisville, KY. Entering the race ranked 8th in the nation, the Lady Buffs turned heads as they came away with a 6th place finish at Nationals. This is the highest finish at a national competition by any Milligan athletic team ever. The women were also named NAIA Women's Scholar All-American Team due to their outstanding performance in the classroom. The men's team also ended the season successfully, with a third place finish in the Conference and a 4th place finish at the Regional Championships. The men made their appearance at the National Championships with two individual qualifiers: Jair Collie and Will Frye.

During the Indoor Track season, the success was just as plentiful. Milligan hosted the NAIA Indoor Track and Field National Championships at ETSU's facility for the 7th straight year. The men and women showed their talent yet again, with 8 All-American finishes. The women's team also received the NAIA Indoor Track and Field National Champions of Character Team Award. Now, with the outdoor season heading into the final stretch, 7 athletes have qualified for Outdoor Track and Field Nationals that will be held in Fresno, CA on May 24-26. The team is hoping for another outstanding performance at this national competition.

In addition to the enormous amount of athletic accomplishments, the men and women also launched the "Buffalo Task Force," as an initiative to get more involved in campus, community, and global issues. The team volunteered hours at the Melting Pot together, ushered the Scholarship 5K race on campus during Homecoming weekend, repainted the youth floor of Munsey Memorial Church, and helped pack clothes for Master Provisions' clothing drive. The team also hosted their second running clinic on Milligan's campus



for area kids to learn more about the sport, Milligan College, and the Lord that we serve. For their global involvement, the team now sponsors a child through Compassion International, and also donated new and used shoes to One World Running which sends the shoes to Third World countries. The team hopes to set an example for other Milligan athletic teams, showing that they can get involved and make a difference on campus, in the community, and in other areas of the world." -Lindsey Davis



¹¹This year, the ISL juniors were allowed to choose a service project that they would like to undertake for this school year. They decided that they wanted to do something that would involve the Milligan community as well as those communites surrounding Milligan. Many options were considered, but the final decision was to sponsor and manage a clothing drive with the group Master's Provisions for the country of Ukraine. Master's Provisions is lead by Roger Babik, whose daughter, Lydia Babik, was on the ISL juniors team. Master's Provisions collects clothing then ships it to the Ukraine (and other countries around the world) where it is distributed to widows and orphans and then sent to thrift stores that have been set up, which provides employement as well as affordable clothing for the people. The juniors' goal was to collect a semi full of clothing, so area churches were contacted and trash bins were set up around campus for students and faculty to donate thier clothes. After all the clothes were collected along with another semi full brought down by Mr. Babik, Friday and Saturday--March 29th and 30th--volunteers sorted and packed the clothes. Students were asked to sign up in two hour shift periods, however they were welcomed to sign up for as many shift as they would like. SFP credit was also given for every two hours spent helping. Clothes were sorted, throwing out stained and holey clothing, and repacking into 100 pound bags. These were then loaded into the semis. Come Saturday afternoon--two hours ahead of schedule--all the clothes were packed into the two huge semis. It ended with a prayer and a word of congratulations from Mr. Babik on a great job done. There was a good turn out of students coming to help serve alongside their fellow students. "




Milligan continued a new tradition--now in it's fourth year--of having a day of service in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The first event, held in 2004, began on January 20th the tradition of a convocation in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. It was considered a day off of school to serve in the community. There was also a four day focus on servant leadership that week. In 2005 students got January 18th off for service, and agenicies in the community were contacted to have groups of students come and volunteer for that day. In 2006, according to the Stampede article from that year, there were 18 activities offered and 300 students participated. This year convocation was led by Rev. Danny Johnson of Thankful Baptist Church, which was followed immediately by a brunch in the cafteria. After brunch, students left campus to serve in many areas of the community. This year students signed up to help in 24 different organizations.

Milligan College has been involved in several sevice projects in the past including: In 1999, Milligan had a Student for Life Club, organized as a "voice for those without a voice, unborn babies." They joined a March for Life in Washington D.C. streets, trying to stop partial birth abotions. In 1998 for the second time groups from Milligan took trips to Cranks Creek in Harlan, Kentucky and Roan Mountain communities. Students worked with the Cranks Creek Survival Center making trips to the poverty striken creek. Roan Mountain got hit bad that year by a storm that left many homeless. Milligan students began a clean up mission to help the residents recover.

Milligan also offers many clubs that are involved with service to the community. MLK Jr. Day will continue in the tradtition of Service: leading the whole campus in a day of service, instilling community, and a chance to find a place to serve.


Senior Kacie Letterman was named to the All-AAC defensive team while Brit White was placed on the All-AAC freshmen team.





Cafeteria Renovations


"I'm pleased to announce that Milligan has partnered

Dining Hall Remodel - Remodeling the interior space of McCormick Dining Hall to provide contemporary seating, with booths, lounge chairs, stool tables, and 4-top cafe tables; carpeted flooring; new lighting; new dish return; and customized service areas. These changes will help create a more community-focused environment and be less institutional.



Continuous Service - To accommodate students' busy schedules, the dining hall will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Students can come and go as fits their schedule and even stay as long as they like when visiting with friends. A complete meal program will be offered during traditional breakfast, lunch, and dinner hours. At other times, the deli bar, pizza station, soup and salad bar, desserts, cereal bars, and other stations will always be available. All students will have the same food plan option and have unlimited access to the dining services.

Higher Quality - A commitment to providing higher quality food. This includes subs and sandwiches made to order, freshly prepared pizza and pasta, entrees made to order, pastry table, and carved roasted meats.

Late Night Service - Exchange meals will be available in the Grill from 7:30 a.m. to 11 p.m. Current restrictions to a fixed menu have been eliminated, providing students with a greater flexibility in menu selection. The Grab & Go selection will also be expanded.
