President Returns

Monday, February 27, President H. J. Derthick left Milligan College for a trip to New York in the interest of the College. Of his trip, President Derthick says: "I always marvel every time I tarry in New York City, even for a day, at the greatness of Man's achievements. New York has the finest homes in the world as well as the most desperate. It is a city wherein are gathered together some of the most intelligent people in the world and some of the most illiterate. It has the greatest business men in the world and the most unfortunate, the greatest architecture in magnificient buildings and the most uninhabitable slum homes and shops. It is the largest Jewish city in the world, the Jewish population exceeding population of Jerusalem in the height of its glory. It is the largest Irish city in the world, the largest Italian city and probably the fourth largest German city. More philanthropy is dispensed by those to whom God has given a surplus there than in any other city. In the latter part of April, the greatest World's Fair that man has ever conceived will open. It is now about ninety per cent finished. New York City is a city of contrasts."

While in New York the President had the unique experience of dining at lunch with a man whose fortune is doubtless counted in millions of dollars. and dining the same day at dinner with a woman who lived in utmost poverty in one of New New York's slums. "Yet", said President Derthick, "no hospitality anywhere could have surpassed that which this christian woman of nearly eighty offered me."

Questioned about the success of the trip President Derthick declared that from most standpoints it was successful. "Fortunately," says he, "Milligan College has a number of friends in New York City who are greatly interested in her students.



T. J. BOND

T. J. Bond graduated from Milligan College in the spring of 1927 and in September of that year accepted a position as teacher of Mathematics in the Marion County High School, Jasper, Tennessee. He served for a period of two years in this position and then was elected principal of that school. After serving as principal for a period of two years he resigned and accepted employment as a teacher of Mathematics and Science in the Birchwood High School in Hamilton County. In 1933 Mr. Bond left this position and accepted the principalship of the Whitwell High School at Whitwell, Tennessee, in which position he remained for a period of three years. In the spring of 1936 Mr. Bond went to Dayton, Tennessee as principal of the Rhea Central High School, which position he still holds. Mr. Bond married Clara Chisam Sawyer and they have one child.


H. C. HUMPHREY
