We believe that there are sufficient fond memories of splintered paddles and the taming of unruly minds to warrant the commemoration of this old familiar spot in lines of poetry. Milligan, Tennessee May 13, 1931

Dear Grandma,

I know you all have looked for a letter from me before this but I have been so busy with examinations I hope you will excuse me. I received my box all right last Thursday morning. My things are just beautiful and they fit just as nice as if I had been there to try them on. I like them both but my linen dress is something I never had a dress like before I certainly do appre ciate the nice things you sent me. many thanks. I went to Johns 13 City Saturday. I took my old hat with me but did not have it trimmed over. I got a real pretty hat for two dollars, \$2.00. It looked better than to have \$2.00 worth put on the old frame. I got some white ribbon for my waist to wear with my white dress, a white tie, a belt, a fan, and some hand'serchiefs. I spent \$3.40 at Johnson City, Sat. and .95 for the pictures of school and paid for my music and washing besides other little things. Be sure and meet me Wednesday, 22nd. I

will get to Pulaski on the 11:13 if nothing prevents. Mr. Minor dressed to Mrs. M. A. Shepper-J. Ross, a young preacher here, from Craig Co., Va. is going to preach for us at Pine, Dorapher, Shilol, and Newbern this summer. He is a fine youg man and a good preacher. Every one here with Mr. Ross tonight, he says he is coming home with Grace and me. Bess is going to stay for the summer school. Prof. Hodges returned today. I certainly was glad to see him. His brother was buried Monday.

Several visitors have come in the last few days and more are coming every day

I will have to bring blankets and books home in a box. Several of the girls are going to take boxes home with them. I began to pack my trunk this evening. I got my Latin grade tcday, it was 83. That was a pass allright. I will get all my other grades tomorrow. A young man and woman were baptized this evening. I went but there were but a few there. Grace and I play our duet tomorrow night One of the girl, is visiting us tonight so I must bring my letter to a close. Be sure and send my money for me to come home on, for I have only one dollar left.

Love and kisses for you all. Excuse this pencil and short letter. Good bye "for a little while"

> Milligan, Tenn. Sept. 11, 1900

Dear Grandma,

We have arrived safely at likes him. Bess had a long chat Milligan. I have Just returned from supper. We reached Johnson City about 1 o'clock and laid over there two hours and came out to Milligan and reached here about 3 o'clock. B. G., Lo and I wal' ed from the stati: n and were the first to walk up to the College. Prof. Hopwood came down the walk to meet us. Profs. Thomas and Hopwood met us at Johnson City. I did not get at all sick on the train. There were several on the train when we got

> This is a pretty place. I have met a lot of young people this afternoon. Everyone is nice and pleasant. I room with Bessie and Grace. We ate our lunches at Johnson City and Lynn bought two water melons.

> The reunion will be tomorrow night.

> Everything in my trunk was all right.

> Bessie is suffering with the toothache this evening.

I will sleep with Grace tonight as Bessie is going to sleep with her old room mate and Mrs. Hopwood hasn't fixed my bed.

I have mot all the teachers. Miss Susie Price was on the train this me raing on her way to Sullin College where shs is going to t ach this winter. She sat on the seat with me and she had some beautiful tube roses and she gave me two.

l mett o of P of H p vood's nieces who are here going to school. I haven't time to write much, will write more next time. I am going to write to Forrest realsoon, when did you hear from him? You must take good care of yourself, ma.

Give my love to papa and all of the children.

You must write me all the news.
