### Cupid Crashes Through Milligan Opens With Large Enrollment

The total enrollment of Milligan College, according to the latest report issued by Mrs. Bowman, school Registrar, is 321 students. This is the largest number of regular students enrolled in recent years.

While a total of 331 students enrolled at Millign during the school year of 1938-1939, of this total 22 were boys from the CCC camp at Unicoi.

Two hundred and eleven students reside in the dormitories. the remaining one hundred and ten being off campus students.

There are 178 boys and 143 girls comprising the total enrollment

Carter County has the largest number of representatives with a total of 90 students; Elizabethton the largest according to cities with 51: Tennessee the largest according to states with a total of 213.

In addition to Tennessee's 213 students, there are 79 students from Virginia, 9 from Kentucky, 7 from North Carolina, 4 from Massachusetts, and 3 from each of the states of Indiana, West Virginia, and Florida. Ohio and Puerto Rico have 2 each; while Delaware, Pennsylvania, Georgia Alabama, Mississippi and Canada are each represented by one student.
