Bowers got his second degree at Milligan College in 1915; since first graduating from Milligan in 1900 he has attended the University of Virginia in the summers of 1902-3-4, Columbia University in the summers of 1912, 16, 18 and from February 1919-June 1919 and also he did graduate work there in 1927 and 1928; his community interests are Kiwanis Club, Masonic Order, church and Sunday School; at present his occupation is Professor of Mathematics, teaching Professional Courses and subjects in Math outside of college. Mr. Bower's address is East Radford, Virginia.

Joseph H. Crouch, member of the class of 1914, is now city clerk and auditor of the city of Wichita Falls, Texas; his community interests are church and municipal government.

D. Park Chapman, member of the class of 1913 graduating under the administration of President Utterback, is now a pastor of the first Church of Christ, East Liverpool, Ohio. Tyler E. Utterback

President Kershner resigned soon after the first of 1911-12, his resignation taking place October 31, 1911. The Board of Directors immediately elected Dean Tyler E. Utterback, a native of Kentucky, graduate of Kentucky University (now known as Transylvania University), Central University of Kentucky, and Columbia University, New York, a man of large experience both as an educator and a preacher. The work of the college progressed without a jar from the time he took charge as president. The same ideals of life which ruled under the former administration continued throughout the administration, and the same emphasis upon purity and cleanness of living and the development of Christian character, remains as the core of the Milligan spirit.

ENDOWMENT ?

In the last number of the Buffalo Range which was dedicated to President Hopwood it was noted that since the early days of Milligan College some effort has been made to raise an endowment. Why it has failed through the years we are unable to say unless it be that the task of raising current expenses has been the major one. Last year the president of the Alumni Association conceived the idea that all the alumni members contribute one dollar each month for twelve months. He set one thousand dollars as the first goal to be reached. To reach the minimum endowment required of all colleges it would require only five centuries of time.

Shall we fail in our first goal of one thousand dollars? On page two of the Buffalo Range you will note that \$391 have been pledged and \$177 have been paid, leaving in pledges \$214. Will we be able to reach our goal by May 25? We are short \$609 in pledges with only two months to go. The alumni members of Milligan College can answer these questions. Shall we fail or shall we realize our goal for the first year and thus comply with the alumni request. Time is getting short. At the present rate the minimum endowment would require more than one thousand years. Think these facts over!
