An Important Message From President Burns

Our college has just received a most challenging proposition. What do you think of it?

Mr. Earhart, the gentleman who has been giving us \$5,000 a year provided we raise at least \$20,000 annually within state of Tennessee, now proposes to increase his help. When Mr. Earhart learned that we had to start the present college year owing \$10,000 at the bank, he offered to help us remove this indebtedness.

Here is the proposition. If we raise at least \$20,000 in the state of Tennessee, Mr. Earhart will give us the \$5,000 as usual; but if we raise as much as \$25,000 within the state, he will give us \$10,000. Here is the best chance you ever had to be of financial help to your college. The full amount must be in hand by the end of the present fiscal year, but it is highly important that we secure all gifts as early as possible so as not to risk failure. If your legal residence is in Tennescee, your gift can be counted.

To those former students who live outside the state, we can say without hesitation that your support right now is also most vital to the ongoing of the college.

Well, my training has finally finished. It is my last few days here. Our graduation is only a few days away. It was the toughest grind that I have ever gone—I am glad that it is all through.

I see N. T. Williams quite frequently. He is in a different Battalion but I see him every night in the canteen. He is going to graduate also. Our graduation day is January 28th. Admiral Downs is going to be the principal speaker.

We have spent the greater part of today turning in our clothes. This past week has been all right. Since exams are over we have been free every night until taps.

I want you to forward my paper to the home town. Just send it to me at Tazewell, Tennessee. I can't say just now what my address will be. Mother will find out first and forward it to me.

I get about six days off at home until I have to report to my next station. It will be a relief to get away from all this studying for a while. This grind has been awful and is beginning to tell on me. The subjects were rather tough. It wasn't too hard but it is rather hard to grasp about 35 or 40 pages at once.

Then we had tests every week. These weekly tests really counted quite a bit. However, it was necessary to pass your final to graduate. It got to be a habit to get up at 4 o'clock on Friday and Saturday morning to study for the weekly exams. Reveille was at 5:50 and taps at 2200 (10 p. m.) I realize now how precious sleep is.

Well I have time now to write letters so I will close for now. Thanks again for all the considerations that you showed me in college. I will try and see you one of these days. I will write a letter to you just as soon as I am settled at my new station. Give my regards to all, especially Mrs. Long.

Lee Varnell

Lee Varnell, whose basketball career started at Adamsville, Tenn., High School, today is rated among the best players in the nation as a member of the powerful Naval Training Station team at Norfolk, Virginia.

The rangy Varnell was a roommate of the famed pitcher, Bob Feller, before the latter left for sea duty.

High Scorer On Team

Varnell is high scorer on the Sailors' quintet that includes six college All-Americans, and an outfit that hasn't tasted defeat. In every game he has tied for top pointmaking or led the Norfolk boys.

During his senior year at Adamsville, Varnell won All-District laurels. Now 16 years old, he left for Duke University, but due to his youth coaches advised him to attend prep school another year. But young Varnell wasn't satisfied. He wanted to play college basketball. So he hied off to Milligan College at Johnson City, Tenn., weighing 146 pounds and standing five feet eight inches.

All-Smoky Four Times

After graduating, Varnell accept initial game, Varnell played five minutes of the second tussle, scoring seven points. Coaches saw possibilities, so he was in every game thereafter, and went ahead to gain All-Smoky Mountain Conference laurels. And he repeated every year, making it four times in a row—the only cager ever to turn the trick.

By the time he had finished college, Lee had jumped to six feet and gained until he tipped the scales at 185. It was almost unanimous among rival coaches that Varnell would have achieved All-American laurels if he had been with a large college.

After graduating, Varnell accepted a job in Norton, Va., as coach and also played semi-pro basketball. The next year he went to Roanoke, Virginia, to play pro bail with Roanoke Business College and doubled as teacher-coach in high school. He stayed there until enlisting in the Navy, in which he is now a chief petty officer.

Contracts were offered Varnell by the powerful Phillips 66 Oilers, Denver Legions and Original Celtics.
