SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

FOUNDER'S DAY

Founder's Day honors the founder of Milligan College, Joseph Hopwood. Both students and alumni anticipate the day as homecoming weekend. The weekend opens with a varsity-alumni basketball game. The grounds boast of decorations made by the classes and school organizations. The selection of the Founder's Daughter (representing Milligan's best in Christian womanhood) is a featured event of the weekend.

CHRISTMAS PARTY

The Christmas Party, sponsored by the Student Council, is a major event open to all students of Milligan College. It is a semi-formal affair, held prior to Christmas vacation with both student and professional entertainment. This year's party will feature the nationally famous vocal group, THE LETTERMEN.

WELSHIMER LECTURES

The Welshimer Lectures are a series of interesting and informing lectures and discussions held in honor of the late Dr. P. H. Welshimer who served as minister of the Christian Church for 50 years. The lectures are given to discuss subjects which were of deep interest to the late Dr. Welshimer.

MAY DAY

May Day is traditionally held on a Saturday in the middle of the month of May. This

day is highlighted by a pageant presented by Milligan students. This past year, members of the Freshman Class retold, in an authentic play, the "Watauga Story", the story of the settling of the East Tennessee hills. The afternoon is climaxed by the May Court and the presentation and crowning of the May Queen and King. The entire day is one of student participation, directed by a committee of the faculty and students.

SENIOR SAYONARA

The Senior Sayonara is a party given the seniors by the Student Council. Light entertainment is provided with a view toward honoring the graduating class of students.

AWARDS DAY

Recognition is given for outstanding student accomplishment in scholarship, athletics and service at an Awards Banquet on Awards Day. The banquet is held in Sutton Dining Hall.

CONCERT SERIES

Part of the students activity provides a number of concerts each year for the College by famous national artists. There are operas, plays, comedies, and musical programs, all on a high level for a broad appeal.

FALL CONVOCATION

The Fall Convocation marks the formal opening of the College. A required event on every student's calendar, the service is one in which both seniors and faculty appear in

formal academic dress. A distinguished speaker is engaged to deliver a sermon keynoting the college's program and objectives.

FACULTY RECEPTION

The faculty reception is a semi-formal occasion held during the first week of school, honoring the incoming students. This is a "must" on the social calendar for all students.

TWIRP WEEK

Twirp Week takes its name from the letters of the word TWIRP which represents the first letters of the phrase, "The Woman Is Required To Pay." It is sponsored by the Junior Class, who plan each day's activities for the week. A court is held for offenders of the week's rules.

STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

There are approximately one hundred opportunities for student part-time employment on the campus. These assignments are in the maintenance of the campus and the buildings, the dining hall, the library, and offices of the College. Applications for work on the campus are to be obtained from the business office and are then to be filed with the Chairman of the Committee on Student Employment, Mr. B. J. Moore. The need and ability of the applicant is considered in the awarding of each work assignment. Each assignment is on the contract basis—\$100 a semester—which is credited to the student's account at the satisfactory completion of each semesters work. The student averages 14 hours per week in fulfilling his assignment. A student working on campus must keep, a point-hour ratio of 2.00 to retain his assignment.

Part-time employment may also be found with firms in Johnson City and Elizabethton. Students having experience in some specialized work have good opportunities of securing part-time employment. Such students should inform Mr. Price, the Placement Secretary of their abilities and desires so that the office may assist them in placement.

Students wishing to serve churches in the area as ministers, assistant ministers, music

directors, and youth directors, should contact Dr. Webb for this assistance.

TEXT BOOKS

Text books for all courses may be purchased at the College Bookstore located in the Business Office (Hardin Hall). Both new and used books are available. If a book is listed by the faculty as one which will be used again in the future, it may be resold to the Bookstore, providing it is in resaleable condition. All purchases are made on a cash basis.

SUPPLIES

General supplies—Paper, Notebooks, Pens, Pencils, etc.—may be purchased at the Student Union Building.

TRANSPORTATION

Students, who need public transportation from their homes to the College, will find rail, bus and air service available.

The Southern Railway has six trains a day from Johnson City—three north and three south.

The Tri-Cities Airport (20 miles from the College) is served by Piedmont, Southern and United Airlines.

The Trailway Bus line (with connections with Greyhound) includes Johnson City in their schedule.

The Suburban Bus line provides local transportation from the College to all points

within a 25 mile radius of the College.

In emergency, taxi service is available from both Elizabethton and Johnson City.

MAIL

Milligan College has its own second class Post Office (Milligan College, Tennessee). Mail is delivered and picked up at the College, outgoing mail at 9:50 A.M., 1:10 and 5:00 P.M. and incoming mail at 8:00 A.M. and 1:00 P.M. Post Office boxes may be rented for the year.

TELEPHONES

Pay telephones are provided for student use in the dormitories. Students are not permitted to use the business telephones of the College.

STORAGE OF TRUNKS

Arrangements for moving of trunks may be made in the office of the Housemother.

SNACKS

The Student Union Building (SUB) is a popular meeting place for snacks and short-orders. Students may obtain various types of sandwiches, soups, milk-shakes, french fries, soft drinks, pastries, ice cream and fruits. The SUB hours are: M-F 7:30 A.M. - 5:00 P.M.; 7:00 P.M. - 10:30 P.M.; Sat. 8:00 A.M. - 12:30 P.M.; 7:00 P.M. - 11:00 P.M. and Sun. 2:00-4:00 and 8:00 - 10:30 P.M.

MUSIC

Music at Milligan has traditionally been one of its marks of distinction. The Concert Choir, Touring Choir, ensembles, trios, quartets and gospel teams are widely known for their excellence.

Private instruction is available in voice, piano and organ.

Students, professionally interested in music, may major or minor in this field.

LAUNDRY

Laundry facilities (for hand laundry) are available in most of the dormitories. Students may rent towels, washclothes, sheets and pillow cases from local laundry services. A laundramat is located near Webb Hall. The cost is modest, 25c per load for washing, and 10c per load for drying.

For those students desiring to send out their laundry, there are several laundries in the neighboring towns.

On campus there are several laundry agencies who have pick-up service for laundry and dry cleaning through student representatives.

LIBRARY

The P. H. Welshimer Memorial Library (39,592 volumes) is available to all Milligan students upon an open-shelf basis.

The library is open more than 80 hours

per week (Monday-Friday it is open 8 A.M. to 10 P.M.; Saturday hours are 8 A.M. - 4 P.M.; Sunday hours are 1:30 - 4:30 P.M.)

The reference books do not circulate out of the library.

All books are out on open shelves and are checked out on a two week basis unless otherwise stated. Renewal is permitted for another two weeks if the book is not in demand.

Reserve books are regular books taken from the open shelf and placed on the reserve shelf by the professors; these are not permitted to leave the library except when it is closed, i.e. over week ends and over night. A fine of five cents is charged for every day a book is overdue, excluding Sundays. The fines on the reserve books are five cents per hour that they are out of the library overdue.

A professional librarian's service is offered to all students. A readers guidance and reference service is available at all times. Photocopy (at 10c per page), microfilm, and micro-card services are also available to the Milligan student.

ATHLETICS

Milligan College encourages participation in inter-collegiate athletics on a non-professional basis. Milligan is represented in inter-collegiate athletics in baseball, basketball, track, tennis, wrestling, golf and cross country. A member of the Volunteer State Athletic

Conference, Milligan competes with some of the best of the small college teams in the south.

The Milligan Cheerleaders are chosen at the beginning of each year for that year. Any girl may try out and five regular and two alternate cheerleaders are chosen by the student body.

The Intramural program of athletics is designed to encourage participation by all of the students in some sport. A choice of sports is offered in basketball, touch-football, bowling, archery, tennis, badminton, ping-pong, horse-shoe, swimming, and softball.

The Intramural Council is on campus to serve the participants of intramurals so they will have the optimum level of recreation and enjoyment in each sport. The Council is composed of physical education majors and minors who are interested in the organization and administration of intramurals.

TIPS FOR WOMEN ON A SUCCESSFUL CAMPUS WARDROBE

The key factor of a successful college wardrobe is not its size but its appropriateness and versatility. The freshman finds fashion lines becoming smoother and straighter; she finds that many things can be done with conservative but subtly flattering tweeds and beiges. Becoming basics are NEVER out of

style; dress it up for the very dressy occasion—leave it basic and smart for church.

Campus dress is definitely seasonal. The early fall brings the dark cottons; shirtwaist dresses and skirts—pleated, straight, A-lined, or wrap around—are standard. A necessity for fall, or for a matter of fact, all year 'round, is a trench coat and good umbrella. The rains never cease to come at Milligan. With cooler weather (usually coming after Fall Break) heavier cottons, corduroys, and lightweight wools appear. Soon the East Tennessee Mountain snows and cold weather set in and bring out the heavy wools and suedes. Tennessee winters demand a heavy winter coat, warm gloves, a wool scarf and snow boots (these hills get quite slippery).

Transitional cottons reappear around Easter, but in light colors, with spring coats for Sundays. More summery dresses, light colored and sleeveless, come with the warmer weather in May and early June.

College sportswear is always around and should fit the casual occasion. (See Section on Regulations).

It is nice to remember that campus dress is somewhat flexible so casual suits and jumpers or dresses which can be dressed up or down are invaluable, and many girls find smart but comfortable stacked heels a real boon for weekend dress.

ORGANIZATIONS

MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION

The Ministerial Association, better known as BYKOTA (be ye kind one to another), is an organization created for the purpose of uniting the men of Milligan who are interested in the ministry or other specific fields of Christian service. The BYKOTA's purpose on campus and in the community is to establish and preserve Christian spirit. Many members of the Ministerial Association are working as assistant ministers, youth directors, and in other positions with churches in the area in order to gain valuable experience in their various chosen professions serving God and mankind.

ALPHA PSI OMEGA

The Alpha Psi Omega is a national honorary dramatic fraternity. Members earn membership by participation in dramatic events sponsored by Footlighters. Upon earning enough points, one is initiated into the fraternity. The aim of Alpha Psi Omega is to promote a deeper and more sincere love for the art of drama.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE CLUB

The Christian Service Club, the oldest and largest club on the campus, is open to all students in the college. The Club's main goal is to extend Christian service to the churches

in the surrounding areas and to send out gospel teams to provide religious services at the churches. Another goal is to stimulate the spiritual growth of the students. The prayer room in the Ad. Building is sponsored by the Club for the school. All Milligan College students are automatically members. No dues are charged and the Club meets each Monday evening.

COMMERCE CLUB

All students interested in a career in business administration, secretarial science, or industry should be interested in the Commerce Club. The main aim of the Club is to gain a better understanding of business. This club plans programs and speakers that will present discussions of topics which are not normally pointed out in the classroom. The Club takes conducted tours of several business enterprises during the school year, which helps to give the student a better understanding of the operation of business firms. Films are shown so that the student may obtain a broader view of the many aspects that are encountered in the business world.

FOOTLIGHTERS

The Footlighters, the drama organization of the college, provide students an opportunity to work in and on play productions. Through the Footlighters, students are admitted to the national dramatic fraternity of Alpha Psi Omega.

M CLUB

The "M" Club includes students who have won the letter "M" for performance in an intercollegiate sport. The aims and objectives are to foster fellowship, loyalty, good sportsmanship, and to stimulate athletic interest in and for the college. It also desires to aid in moral and general atmosphere of the college.

MISSIONARY FELLOWSHIP

The Missionary Fellowship is open to all students who are interested in the missionary work of the church—both home and foreign. Its purpose is to make the students aware both of the needs of the missionaries and their own obligation to make Christ known throughout the world. It purposes to start a growing interest in missionary work among all Christians and is especially interested in helping those who are thinking of becoming missionaries.

P. E. CLUB

The P. E. Club is an organization for students who are majoring in this field and strives to encourage professional training in health and P. E. and motivate enjoyable and recreational activities on the campus. The club has many projects during the year, one of which is to sell concessions at the basketball games.

PRE-MED CLUB

The main purpose of the Pre-Med Club is to prepare students who are interested in the

medical field. The club provides discussions of opportunities in the medical and allied professions. Guidance is provided for the students in relation to not only their undergraduate work but also their application to graduate school. It is hoped the uniting of these students with similar hopes will bring about a spirit of encouragement and inspiration for one another.

SERVICE SEEKERS

The Service Seekers is an organization for young women who are preparing for service in the church or those who wish to participate in helpful service to the less fortunate and to the community. Its aims are to increase and encourage Christian service. Its purpose is to promote Christian leadership. One of the main projects of this club is to visit the Children's Home in Elizabethton.

S.N.E.A.

The S.N.E.A. is a professional organization for all students in college who are planning to enter some field of teaching. Special programs are planned to show and demonstrate specific areas in this profession. The members hold student membership in both the Tennessee Education Association and the National Education Association.

CIRCLE K

The Circle K Club was organized on the campus in the spring of 1964. This club is the college counterpart of Key Club and is

related to the International Civic Club of Kiwanis. The Milligan club was sponsored by the Elizabethton Kiwanis Club. The club is a service club whose purpose is to participate and sponsor community and civic projects on campus.

CIVITAN

The Collegiate Civitan Club is one of the newest men's organizations on campus. Organized in 1963, its purpose is service—both on the Milligan campus and to the surrounding area. This objective is carried out through the Civitan's sponsoring of many activities on campus.

GERMAN CLUB

The German Club—Der deutsche Bur-schenverein—is a club which has been organized for the benefit of all those students who have or are taking German at Milligan College. The organization holds regular meetings in which a greater knowledge of all the factors about Germany is stressed.

FELLOWSHIP OF CHRISTIAN ATHLETES

The Fellowship of Christian Athletes is a club for men which is organized to confront modern athletes with the challenge and adventure of following Christ. All Milligan College athletes are automatically members. The club meets each morning in the men's dressing room for prayer and inspirational messages from teachers and students.

PUBLICATIONS

THE STAMPEDE

The Milligan newspaper, The Stampede, is the official student publication of Milligan College. Included in it's bi-monthly editions are editorials, items of entertainment, features and important information pertaining to student body and college activities and accomplishments. The aims of the Stampede are three-fold:

1. To present fairly and impartially the news of, by, and for the students, administration and campus of Milligan College.

2. To maintain a suitable relationship with all respects of campus life, and to give all equal consideration in the publication of the Stampede.

3. To act as a public relations instrument for Milligan College in dealing with other people and organizations. To promote school spirit, good sportsmanship, and fair play, with emphasis on Christian education.

Students interested in journalism or creative writing may find an opportunity for self-expression through the medium of The Stampede.

THE BUFFALO

The Buffalo is the Milligan College annual and is a project of the Senior Class. The main aim of the Buffalo is to record the happenings of the past year as a pictorial history.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council represents the formal aspects of student life in relation to college regulations and discipline. The president of the Student Council, who is elected in the spring of the school year from and by the total student population, presides over the council.

DORMITORY COUNCILS

Whenever people live together in a group, as we do here in the dorms, a few rules are necessary to create, promote, and preserve an atmosphere conducive to study and to the development of Christian character.

To provide these objectives, we rely upon our Dorm Councils. Students work together to channel effort through a responsible organization which can more effectively speak and act in their interest.

The Dorm Councils are composed of representatives from each dorm who work with the Dorm Council President and Administration to achieve common aims, to unify, to coordinate and to enrich the spirit and activities of the students at Milligan.

COMMUTERS COUNCIL

The Commuters Council consists of students who represent the "off-campus" or

commuting students. Its purposes and goals are identical to those of the Student Council in that both councils work hand in hand in behalf of the Students and Administration of Milligan College. As of this year the Commuting Council is represented on the Student Council by its president and two elected representatives.

MILLIGAN COLLEGE STUDENT COUNCIL CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

We, the student members of Milligan College, in our desire to attain the goal of Christian character through the mutual endeavor of the Milligan family and to more adequately express our mutual responsibility to the Board of Directors, Administration, and Faculty of our College in matters of student life, do hereby establish this constitution of the Student Council of Milligan College, in order to channel our initiative and activity in student government through a responsible organization which can more effectively speak and act in our interest.

ARTICLE I. Name and Powers

- Section 1.** The name of this organization shall be the Student Council of Milligan College.
- Section 2.** The powers of the Student Council shall be those correlative with this constitution.

ARTICLE II. Responsibilities and Purposes

- Section 1.** The Student Council shall be directly responsible as the official voice of the students to the President of the College in matters pertaining to at least two of the three constituent groups of the student

body; i.e., the male dormitory residents, the female dormitory residents, and the commuting students; and it shall be directly responsible to the students as their elected representatives.

Section 2. Purposes

- A. The Student Council shall represent their constituents in all matters of student life.
- B. The Student Council shall strive to create and maintain campus attitudes and atmosphere conducive to academic advancement.
- C. The Student Council shall endeavor to maintain a spiritual environment on campus in the tradition of Christian education.
- D. The Student Council shall promote an active program for a well balanced campus social life.
- E. The Student Council shall advocate and exemplify those characteristics which promote school spirit, pride, and respect.
- F. The Student Council shall mutually cooperate with the Administration in the coordination of student affairs.
- G. The Student Council shall strive to communicate all pertinent information between students and faculty-administration.

ARTICLE III. Membership

Section 1. Composition of the Student Council

- A. Seventeen student members
 1. The President
 2. The Vice-President
 3. The President of the Men's Dormitory Council
 4. The President of the Women's Dormitory Council
 5. The President of the Commuting Student's Council
 6. The four class Presidents
 7. Two representatives from each class
- B. Two faculty advisors

Section 2. Requirements for Student Council membership

- A. Student members
 1. The President, Vice-President, President of the Men's Dormitory Council, President of the Women's Dormitory Council, and President of the Commuting Students Council shall be duly elected according to Article IV.
 2. The class Presidents shall be duly elected from their respective classes.
 3. The representatives shall be one male and one female duly elected from their respective classes.

B. Faculty advisors

1. The Council shall elect as one advisor one of the Deans.
2. The Council shall elect as the other advisor one member of the faculty.

ARTICLE IV. Elections

Section 1. Proclamation for the offices of President and Vice President of the Student Council, President of the Men's Dormitory Council, President of the Women's Dormitory Council, and President of the Commuting Students' Council.

A. The President shall post the proclamation the week following spring vacation initiating election proceedings.

B. The provisions of the proclamation

1. Nomination for each office shall be by a written petition presented to the President.
 - a. A valid petition shall consist of the signatures of at least ten percent of the regularly enrolled students of the group represented by the office.
 - b. Duplication of signatures on two or more petitions for the same office shall automatically invalidate the sig-

nature.

2. No petitions for nomination shall be received after noon of the day one week from the day of proclamation.
3. Campaigns shall commence immediately following the close of nominations, and shall be concluded at a time designated by the Election Committee.
4. The elections shall be conducted on the day two weeks from the day of proclamation.

C. Provided five percent or more of the student body is absent from the campus on official business at the proclamation, the President shall post the proclamation the week following their return.

Section 2. Qualification of Candidates

A. The Election Committee shall determine if a nominee is qualified for candidacy.

B. Candidate for the office of President of the Student Council

1. He shall be a rising Senior.
2. He must have cumulative point hour ratio of at least 2.0.
3. He must have the same for the preceding semester.

C. Candidate for the office of Vice-President of the Student Council

1. He shall be a rising Junior or Senior.
2. He must have a cumulative point-hour ratio of at least 2.0.
3. He must have the same for the preceeding semester.

D. Candidates for the office of President of the Men's Dormitory Council, President of the Women's Dormitory Council, and President of the Commuting Student's Council shall meet the requirements set forth in their respective constitutions.

Section 3. Regulation for election proceedings

- A. Election proceedings shall be supervised by the Student Council Election Committee.
- B. All regularly enrolled students desiring voting privileges shall register prior to the election at the time and place which the Election Committee shall designate.
- C. Students properly registered shall vote by depositing a secret written ballot in a locked ballot box which the Committee shall provide at a location which it shall designate.
- D. The Election Committee shall issue absentee ballots.

1. Regularly enrolled students too ill to be at the poll or absent

from the campus for reasons deemed necessary by the Dean of the College shall be eligible for absentee ballots.

2. The Committee shall issue the absentee ballots prior to the election at a time deemed expedient by a majority of the Committee.
3. The absentee ballots shall be returned to the Committee before the officially designated closing of the poll and be placed in the designated locked ballot box.

Section 4. Provided any elected officer fails to return to the College in the fall or vacates his office at any time, a new election shall be conducted.

- A. The new election shall be held in accordance with this article excepting that the President or President **pro tempore** shall post the proclamation after the fall term begins within two weeks after he officially confirms that the office has been vacated.
- B. The Vice-President shall act as President **pro tempore** in the case that the President vacates his office.

- C. In the case that the President and Vice-President both vacate their offices the order of succession for President **pro tempore** shall be President of the Men's Dormitory Council, President of the Women's Dormitory Council, and President of the Commuting Students' Council.
- D. In the case that all of these officers vacate their offices, the President of the College shall appoint a President **pro tempore**.

Section 5. The rising Senior, Junior, and Sophomore classes shall elect their respective representatives at the first class meeting following the general elections, and the Freshman class shall elect their respective representatives at their first meeting of the fall semester.

Section 6. The newly elected Student Council shall elect the Corresponding Secretary, the Recording Secretary, and the Treasurer from the Council and the Advisors from the faculty at its first organizational meeting of the spring.

ARTICLE V. Duties of Members

Section 1. Duties of all members

- A. They shall faithfully execute the

policies set forth in this constitution.

- B. They shall strive to represent their constituents to the Council and regularly report to their constituents.
- C. They shall attend all meetings.
- D. They shall serve on the Milligan Forum.

Section 2. Duties of officers

- A. The President shall:
 1. Preside over meetings of the Student Council and the Student Body.
 2. Act as an ex-officio member of all committees;
 3. Execute the policies of the Council;
 4. Act as chairman of the Election Committee;
 5. Serve on the Student Life Self Study Committee;
 6. Dismiss any member having three unexcused absences.
- B. The Vice-President shall:
 1. Act as President in case of the absence of that officer;
 2. Serve on the Student Life Self Study Committee;
 3. Assist the President in the executive duties.
- C. The Recording Secretary shall:

Section 6. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be consulted for points of parliamentary procedure not covered by this Constitution.

ARTICLE VII. Impeachment

Section 1. Impeachment proceedings shall be brought against any Council member for failure to perform their duties or for failure to uphold the responsibilities and purposes of the Council.

Section 2. A three-fourths vote of the Council is necessary for conviction of impeachment.

ARTICLE VIII. Amendments

Section 1. An amendment may be initiated by a petition carrying the signatures of forty percent of the student body.

Section 2. A resolution for amendment shall be tabled for one regularly scheduled meeting of the Council. If it is then passed by a three-fourths vote of the Council, it shall then be referred to the student body.

Section 3. Passage by a simple majority of the student body and approval by the President of the college shall put an amendment into effect.

Section 4. A resolution for amendment having failed to pass the Student Council may be referred to the student body. If passed by a three-fourths vote of the student body and approved by the President of the college, it shall then be put into effect.

ARTICLE IX. Ratification

Section 1. A resolution for adoption of this revised constitution shall be tabled for one regularly scheduled meeting of the Student Council, after which it may be passed by a three-fourths vote of the Council and referred to the student body.

Section 2. Passage by a simple majority of the student body and approval by the President of the College shall put this revised constitution into effect.

BY-LAW I. Student Life Self Study Committee

Section 1. The President and Vice-President of the Student Council, President of the Men's Dormitory Council, President of the Women's Dormitory Council, and President of Commuting Students' Council shall serve with the designated Faculty

and Administration members on the Student Life Self Study Committee.

- Section 2.** The student members of this committee shall cooperate with the rest of the committee by expressing their evaluations and suggestions and presenting student opinions, needs, and desires concerning student life.

BY-LAW II. Milligan Forum

- Section 1.** The Milligan Forum shall offer an opportunity for open discussion in order that definite suggestions might be submitted to the various councils and in order that there may be an opportunity for an exchange of ideas with the administration.
- Section 2.** The Milligan Forum shall consist of the entire membership of the Student Council, the Men's Dormitory Council, the Women's Dormitory Council, and the Commuting Students' Council. The President of the college shall be chosen from the membership at the first meeting of each school year.
- Section 3.** The Student Council shall schedule monthly meetings for the Forum

during the first month of the school year.

BY-LAWS III. Standing Committees

- Section 1.** Student Council Election Committee
- A. Duties of the committee
1. They shall make decisions concerning campaign policies.
 2. They shall issue absentee ballots according to Article IV., Section 3, of this Constitution.
 3. They shall disqualify from voting any student who does not comply with Article IV., Section 3, of this Constitution.
 4. They shall count the ballots and declare the winning candidates.
- B. The members of this committee shall be the senior members of the Council, and the President shall be the chairman of the Committee.
- Section 2.** Freshman Week Committee
- A. This committee shall plan and supervise the Freshman Week Activities.
- B. The members of this committee shall be appointed by the President.
- Section 3.** Cheerleaders Election Committee
- A. This committee shall select fifteen candidates from those trying out,

providing there are more than fifteen trying out, and present them to a student assembly which shall select five in a secret ballot election. The committee shall count the ballots and declare the five candidates having the highest totals to be winners and the two having the next highest totals to be alternates.

- B. The members of this committee shall be the Vice-President of the Student Council, the Vice-President of each of the classes, and the faculty Athletic Committee.

Section 4. Summer Picnic Committee

- A. This committee shall plan and be responsible for Milligan Summer Picnics to be held in various sections of the country, providing fellowship for Milligan students and an opportunity for new or prospective students to get acquainted.
- B. The chairman of this committee shall be a member of the Student Council appointed by the President. The chairman and the President shall together choose two students from each area in which the Council decides to sponsor a picnic.

Section 5. Student Assembly Committee

- A. This committee shall prepare a schedule of all student assembly programs for the year which must receive the approval of the Council and the faculty Chapel committee.
- B. This committee shall be responsible for providing a weekly Wednesday chapel for the benefit of all students.
- C. The members of this committee shall be appointed by the President.

Section 6. Student Social Life Committee

- A. Duties of the committee
 1. They shall be responsible for the supervision of all student activities sponsored by the Council.
 2. They shall prepare a tentative monthly budget of funds provided for the student activities sponsored by the Council.
 3. They shall keep a record of procedures and evaluate each social event.
- B. The members of this committee shall be appointed by the President.

Section 7. Bulletin Board Committee.

- A. This Committee shall be responsible for the appearance of all public

bulletin boards. They shall keep the bulletin boards free from impertinent notices.

- B. This committee shall be appointed by the president.

Section 8. Publicity and Announcement Committee.

- A. This committee shall be composed of at least two council members, one of which must be the representative of the commuters council.
- B. Duties of the committee.
1. They shall be responsible for publicizing all important events to the day and dorm students.
 2. They shall make all necessary announcements at the noon and evening meals.

Section 9. Spiritual Life Committee.

- A. Duties of the committee.
1. They shall be responsible for emphasizing character by posting monthly themes on the bulletin boards.
 2. They shall be responsible to see that some college class or club holds a weeks revival each year.
 3. They shall be responsible for programs for such spiritual emphasis days as Christmas, Easter, Day of Prayer, etc.

- B. This committee shall be appointed by the President.

Section 10. Lost and Found Committee.

- A. This committee shall receive all found articles and keep a list on the bulletin boards of the articles lost and found.
- B. This committee shall be appointed by the president.

Section 11. Menu Committee.

- A. This committee shall be responsible for posting a weekly menu of meals on the public bulletin boards.
- B. This committee shall be appointed by the president.

Section 12 Student Awareness Committee.

- A. This committee shall endeavor to open the minds of the students to world affairs by all means possible.
- B. This committee shall be appointed by the president.

BY-LAW IV. Installation and Inauguration

- Section 1.** After the spring elections and before the close of school, the president in office shall call together an assembly of the student body for the installation of the newly elected Council members. The President

at this time shall make appropriate remarks which shall be followed by the passing on of the robes.

Section 2. In the fall within four weeks after the opening of college, the President shall call together an assembly of the student body for the inauguration of the Student Council.

- A. The President shall officially take the pledge which shall be administered by the President of the college.

"I sincerely pledge to uphold the Constitution of the Student Council of Milligan College and to discharge faithfully the duties incumbent upon my office."

- B. The President shall officially receive to the Council the newly elected freshman members.
- C. Remarks by the President of the Student Council:
1. He shall emphasize the Constitution.
 2. He shall charge the Student Council.
 3. He shall charge the student body, administration, and faculty.

BY-LAW V. Permanent Record

Section 1. A Permanent Record shall be filed in the name of the Student Council and shall be maintained each year by the Recording Secretary.

Section 2. Contents of the Permanent Record.

- A. This Constitution.
- B. Official recommendations.
- C. The Recording Secretary's minutes and Annual Report.
- D. The Corresponding Secretary's file and Annual Report.
- E. The Treasurer's Annual Report.

Section 3 The Record shall be filed in the Student Council's Office and shall not be removed from that office.

BY-LAW VI. Petitions

Section 1. A petition may be initiated by any member of the student body. If it is successful in obtaining the signatures of twenty-five percent of the student body, it may be presented to the Council by the President or by an interested student. If it is passed by the Council, the President shall present it to the President of the college for his consideration.

Section 2. If the petition fails to pass the President of the college for his

Council, it may be presented to the consideration after having received signatures of fifty-one percent of the student body.

MILLIGAN COLLEGE WOMEN'S RESIDENT CONSTITUTION

This Constitution is the rules and regulations by which you live in the resident halls.

PREAMBLE

We, the dormitory women of Milligan College, in our desire to promote Christian character and in order to channel our activity through a responsible organization which can more effectively speak and act in our interest, do hereby establish this constitution of the Women's Dormitory Council.

ARTICLE I. Name and Powers

- Section 1.** The name of this organization shall be the Women's Dormitory Council of Milligan College.
- Section 2.** The powers of the Dormitory Council shall be those correlative with this constitution.

ARTICLE II. Responsibilities and Purposes

- Section 1.** The Dormitory Council shall be directly responsible as the official voice of the dormitory women to the administration in matters pertaining to the Constituent group; and it shall be directly responsible to its constituents as their elected representatives.

Section 2. Purposes

- A. The Dormitory Council shall represent their constituents in all matters of dormitory life.
- B. The Dormitory Council shall strive to create, promote and preserve an atmosphere conducive to study.
- C. The Dormitory Council shall endeavor to maintain a spiritual environment in the dormitories.
- D. The Dormitory Council shall mutually co-operate with the Administration in the co-ordination of student affairs.
- E. The Dormitory Council shall strive to communicate all pertinent information between students and administration.
- F. The Dormitory Council shall act as a reviewing board in the case of a violation of this constitution or by-laws.

ARTICLE III. Membership

Section 1. Composition of Women's Dormitory Council

- A. Student members.
 - 1. The President.
 - 2. A sufficient number of dormitory representatives, as determined by the President.
- B. One faculty advisor.
- C. Executive Committee shall be com-

posed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, and faculty advisor.

Section 2. Requirements for Dormitory Council membership.

- A. Student members
 - 1. The President shall be elected according to Article IV of the Student Council Constitution.
 - 2. The representatives shall be duly elected from their respective sections according to Article IV of this Constitution.
- B. The Council shall have a faculty advisor.

ARTICLE IV. Elections

Section 1. The proclamation for the office of President of the Women's Dormitory Council shall be as stated in Article IV, Section 1 of the Student Council Constitution.

Section 2. Qualification of Candidates

- A. A candidate for the office of Dormitory Council President
 - 1. She must be a rising senior.
 - 2. She must uphold Christian principles.
 - 3. She must have an accumulative point-hour ratio of 2.5 for her college career.
 - 4. She shall have the same for

the semester preceding her elections.

5. She shall be a resident of a Women's Dormitory.
 6. She must have had previous experience on the Council.
- B. A candidate for the office of Vice-President should have the same qualifications as a dorm council representative and must have previous experience on the council. She must reside in the dormitory in which the President does not reside.
1. She must be a senior, junior, or sophomore resident of the section from which she is elected.
 2. She must have an accumulative point-hour ratio of 2.5 for her college career.
 3. She must uphold Christian principles.
 4. She will have survived a screening committee on the basis of integrity, service to school, leadership, Christian character, scholarship. The screening committee will be chosen each year.

Section 3. Regulations for election proceedings

A. President

1. The election proceedings for

President shall follow the regulations of Article IV, Section 3 of the Student Council Constitution.

2. A candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be elected.

B. Vice-President

1. The Vice-President(s) shall be elected by the members from the dormitory(s) in which the President does not reside.

C. Secretary

1. Shall be a member of the newly elected Dormitory Council and shall be elected by it.

D. Representatives

1. The election of Dormitory representative shall be held within the month of April. The new representatives making up the next year's Council will serve jointly with the present council from May 1st until the end of the semester.
2. One representative shall be elected from each section of the women's dormitories according to divisions made by the President.
3. The votes shall be cast by secret ballot.
4. The Council members shall

serve as the election committee.

- a. They shall count the ballots for each section.
 - b. The election committee shall declare a candidate elected upon her receiving a majority of the votes cast.
5. If a girl wishes to be a representative and can meet the grade-point qualification, although the screening committee does not nominate her, she may petition to be placed on the ballot. Her petition shall consist of 10% of the residents of the dormitory in which she lives.

Section 5. Vacation of Office

- A. An office is vacated by resignation which is accepted by the council.
- B. An office is vacated by a member having residence other than in the dormitory.
- C. An office is vacated upon conviction of impeachment by the Dormitory Council.
- D. Upon vacation of office of President a new election shall be conducted according to Article IV, Section 4, in the Student Council Constitution.
- E. Upon vacation of office of repre-

sentatives, the section having the vacation shall elect a new representative supervised by the Dormitory Council according to Article IV, Section 2, B.

ARTICLE V. Impeachment

- Section 1.** Impeachment proceedings shall be brought against a member by the Council for failure to uphold this constitution or by-laws.
- Section 2.** Three-fourths vote by the Council is necessary for conviction of impeachment.

ARTICLE VI. Duties of Members

- Section 1.** Duties of all members.
- A. They shall have residence in the section from which they are elected.
 - B. They shall be present on campus during Freshman Orientation period.
 - C. They shall supervise the weekly women's prayer meetings.
 - D. They shall be responsible for maintaining an atmosphere conducive to study in the dormitories and surrounding areas.
 - E. They shall uphold the ideals set forth in the Constitution.
 - F. They shall act as a reviewing board

for any dormitory women who infringe upon the Constitution or by-laws.

Section 2. Duties of officers

A. The President

1. She shall supervise the "Little Sister-Big Sister" program.
2. She shall orientate the new women to dormitory life.
3. She shall call meetings of the Council or of the Dormitory women and preside over them.
4. She shall appoint all committees of the Council and serve as an ex-officio member of them.
5. She shall represent the Dormitory women on the Student Council.
6. **She shall execute policies determined by the Council.**
7. **She shall section off the women's dormitories at the beginning of each school year.**

B. Vice-President

1. Assist the President and preside over any meetings that the President cannot attend.
2. Preside at all meetings in her dormitory.
3. Take the responsibility of house president in the dorm in which

she resides.

C. The Secretary

1. She shall record the minutes of all Dormitory Council meetings.
2. She shall take roll at each Dormitory Council meeting.
3. She shall distribute a copy of the minutes to each women's dormitory resident.
4. She shall submit a copy of the minutes of each meeting to the President of the College and to the Dean of Women.

D. The Advisor

1. She shall be present at all meetings.
2. She shall advise the Council throughout the year.
3. She shall help communicate ideas, suggestions, directives, and requests between the Administration, Faculty, and Student Body.

E. Executive Committees

1. Shall act as a reviewing board in individual cases and shall determine whether or not they shall be brought before the entire council.
2. Shall act in emergency situations when the council cannot convene.

ARTICLE VII. Meetings

- Section 1.** The President shall call a meeting of the Council at the beginning of the Freshman Orientation Period.
- Section 2.** The President shall call the first meeting of the newly elected Council immediately following its election.
- Section 3.** The frequency and place of meeting shall be decided each year by the newly elected Council at its first meeting.
- Section 4.** A quorum shall consist of two-thirds of the membership for the transaction of business.
- Section 5.** Any person, student or faculty, may attend a council meeting.
- A. Only members of the Council may vote.
 - B. A meeting shall be declared closed to non-members by a two-thirds vote of the Council.

ARTICLE VIII. Amendments

- Section 1.** An amendment may be initiated by a petition carrying the signatures of forty percent of the Dormitory women.
- Section 2.** A resolution for amendment shall

be tabled for one regularly scheduled meeting of the Council, after which it may be passed by a three-fourths vote of the Council. It shall then be referred to the Dormitory women.

- Section 3.** Passage by a two-thirds vote of the Dormitory women and approval by the President of the College and the Dean of Women will put an amendment into effect.

ARTICLE IX. Ratification

- Section 1.** A resolution for adoption of this revised constitution shall be tabled for one regularly scheduled meeting of the Dormitory Council, after which it may be passed by a three-fourths vote of the Council and referred to the dormitory women.
- Section 2.** Passage by a simple majority of the women's dormitory residents and approval by the President of the College shall put this revised constitution into effect.

MILLIGAN COLLEGE MALE RESIDENT CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

We, the Male Dormitory Students of Milligan College, in order to create, promote, and preserve a favorable atmosphere of study within a Christian environment, do hereby and with the counsel and consent of the faculty establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE I. The Council

Section 1. Composition.

- A. The Men's Dormitory Council of Milligan College will consist of:
 - 1. The President, elected according to the Article on elections as found in the Student Government Constitution.
 - 2. Two members from each end of each floor and one member from the basement of Pardee Hall.
 - 3. Representation from each men's residence on campus, the minimum being one representative; and there must be a representative for each ten residents.
- B. Officers of the Council.
 - 1. The President, elected by the residents of the men's dormitories.

- 2. The Vice-President, elected by the Dormitory Council.
- 3. The Secretary, elected by the Dormitory Council.

Section 2. Elections.

- A. The electorate will consist of all male students living in the men's residence of Milligan College:
 - 1. The President shall be elected by all male dormitory students.
 - 2. The Council members shall be elected by the men they represent.
 - 3. Vice-President and Secretary shall be elected by the Dormitory Council.
- B. Method of Election.
 - 1. The President.
 - a. Election proceedings for the President are the same as stated in the Student Government Constitution, Article IV, as amended.
 - b. If a re-election is necessary at a later date, the election rules will be the same as in the Student Government Constitution, Article IV, as amended, with the exception that the election will be by secret ballot by upper classmen only.

2. Council Members.
 - a. The members of the Men's Dormitory Council will be elected in the fall of each school year, within the first two weeks, to serve that entire school year.
 - b. The place and time of the elections will be designated by the President.
 - c. The balloting will be by a show of hands or secret ballot, of those men whom they will represent.
 3. The Vice-President.
 - a. The Vice-President will be elected by the Men's Dormitory Council.
 - b. The place and time of election will be designated by the President.
 - c. The balloting will be by a show of hands or secret ballot of the Dormitory Council.
 4. The Secretary will be elected in the same manner as the Vice-President.
- C. Qualification of Officers
1. A candidate for the office of President must:
 - a. Be a rising senior.
 - b. Have an accumulative point-

- hour ratio of 2.00 for his college career.
 - c. Have the same for the semester preceeding his election.
 - d. Have been a resident of a Dormitory one year.
 - e. Be a resident of a Dormitory at the time of his election, and a dormitory resident within the school year during which he is serving.
 - f. Be acquainted with the standards of Milligan College and be willing to do his utmost to uphold these standards.
 - g. Not be serving as a President of any other organization.
2. A candidate for the office of a Dormitory Council representative must:
 - a. Be an upper classman with at least one year's residence (previous to election) in the Dormitory, and a dormitory resident within the school year during which he is serving.
 - b. Be acquainted with the standards of Milligan College and be willing to do his ut-

most to uphold these standards.

- c. Reside in a different room from any other candidate for said office. (Effective Fall of 1958)
 - d. Not be a member of the Student Council.
3. A candidate for Vice-President must have the same qualifications as stated for the Dormitory Council members in Article I, Section 2, Part C, 2, with the exception that he will be a member of the dorm council or a rising senior.
 4. A candidate for Secretary must have the same qualifications as the Vice-President, Article I, Section 2, Part C, 3.

Section 3. Term of Office.

A. President.

1. The President's term of office is from his Spring installation to the installation of his successor the Spring of the next school year.
2. The President must maintain all qualifications listed in Article I, Section 2, Part C, 1, throughout his term of office. If the President does not uphold these qualifications of his

office, he will be liable for impeachment, according to the Article II, Section 3, Part C, of the Judiciary.

3. If the newly elected President does not return to the dormitory in the Fall, he will be removed from office and a new President will be elected. The same rules for election will be necessary as those stated in Article I, Section 2, Part B, 1 b.
4. In the event of death, disability, or impeachment, the duties of the President will devolve upon the Vice-President, until a new President is elected immediately according to Article I, Section 2, Part B, 1 b.
5. Any group of at least two-thirds ($2/3$) of the Dormitory Council Members or Judiciary Board may call a meeting for impeachment proceedings if it seems necessary.
6. The Dormitory Council or Judiciary Board will have the power to present impeachment proceeding before the entire body of male residents. A two-thirds ($2/3$) vote of the male residents is necessary for the

removal from office. The Dormitory Council or Judiciary Board will then dismiss the President and call for the election of a new President according to the section on Elections, in Article I.

B. The Vice-President.

1. The term of office shall be the entire school year for which he was elected.
2. The Vice-President must maintain all qualifications listed in Article I, Section 2, Part C, 3, throughout his term of office. If the Vice-President does not uphold these qualifications of his office he will be liable for impeachment, in the same manner as stated for the President in Article II, the Judiciary, Section 3, Part C.
3. In the event of death, disability, or impeachment, the duties of the Vice-President will devolve upon the Secretary until a new Vice-President is elected.
4. Impeachment proceedings, removal from office, and re-election will be done in the same manner as stated for the President in Article I, Section 3, Part A, 5 and 6.

- C. The Secretary will have the same governing principles for his term of office as stated in Section 3, Part B.

Section 4. Duties.

A. The President.

1. He will uphold and defend the by-laws provided for in this Constitution, which are essential to the atmosphere of study and Christian fellowship of the male residence.
2. He will devote his time to the attainment of all ideals set forth in the preamble of this Constitution.
3. He will institute regular weekly prayer meetings and encourage nightly group prayer meetings in all male residences.
4. He will preside at all meetings of the Dormitory Council and the Judiciary Board, except in the case of his own impeachment.
5. He will act as mediator between the residents of the men's dormitories and the Administration, and will work in cooperation with the Girl's Dormitory Council, Student Council, and the Administration, to

help promote the desired college atmosphere as said in the constitution at all times and in all activities of the school.

6. In the Fall, before the regular Council is elected, he will appoint certain upper classmen to help him carry out any work that needs to be done to prepare the dormitories for occupation. These men will be dismissed after the Dormitory Council is elected.
7. The President will designate the duties and powers of the Vice-President and Secretary as he sees fit and proper with the approval of the Dormitory Council.
8. It will be his duty to enforce all laws and ideals set forth by the Constitution through the consent of the Council.

B. Council Members.

1. It will be the duty of the Council members to uphold the by-laws and all rules necessary to make the dormitories a place of study and Christian fellowship.
2. Each member will act as a member of the Judiciary Board and will devote his time to

servicing the men he represents.

3. The Council will have weekly meetings following prayer meetings and each member is required to be present, unless excused by the President.
- C.** In the event of death, disability, or removal from office of any Council member, the President will call for an election to fill the vacated office.

Section 5. Powers.

A. The President.

1. The President will have the power to call and preside over any meeting of the Dormitory Council, Judiciary Board and the whole body of male residents.
2. He will have the power to demand the resignation of any member of the Council if that person's work is unsatisfactory and if the Judiciary Board votes for the dismissal by a two-thirds ($2/3$) vote of all members.
3. He will have the power to present all petitions to the Council of Judiciary Board from the male residents.
4. He will have the power to sub-

mit the name of any person who the Judiciary Board, by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members, has recommended to the Administration for further action due to some violation of the Constitution or by-laws of the men's dormitories.

B. Council Members.

1. Any Council member will have power to enforce all by-laws provided for by this Constitution when it is advisable to do so, in view of the principles set forth in the preamble.
2. Each member shall submit any major violation by any male resident before the Council or Judiciary Board.
3. Each Council member will have the power to present a petition for impeachment of the President to the Judiciary Board.
4. Each Council member will have the power to act as a member of the Judiciary Board, to hear and try cases, and to exact the punishments as stated in Section 3 of Article II, the Judiciary Board.
5. Any Council member will have the power to present a written statement requesting the ad-

dition or repeal of a by-law to the dormitory by-laws.

Section 6. Resignation.

A. The President.

1. In the event that the President should desire to resign, he will submit this desire by written statement to the Vice-President.
2. The Vice-President will present this statement to the Judiciary Board for consideration and action.
3. Upon the acceptance of the President's resignation by the Judiciary Board, the election of a new President will be done as stated in Article I, Section 2, Part B, 1 b.

B. The Vice-President.

1. In the event that the Vice-President should desire to resign, he will submit this desire in the form of a written statement to the President.
2. The President will present this statement to the Judiciary Board for consideration and action.
3. Upon the acceptance of the Vice-President's resignation by the Judiciary Board, the elec-

tion of a new Vice-President will be done as stated in Article I, Section 2. Part B, 3.

- C. Secretary will be able to resign in the same manner as the Vice-President, and will be replaced in the same manner, also.
- D. Dormitory Council Members.
 - 1. In the event that any Dormitory Council Member should desire to resign, he will submit this desire in the form of a written statement to the President.
 - 2. The President will present this statement to the Judiciary Board for consideration and action.
 - 3. Upon the acceptance of the Member's resignation by the Judiciary Board, the election of a new Dormitory Council member will be done as stated in Article I, Section 2, Part B, 2, b and c.

ARTICLE II. The Judiciary

Section 1. Composition

The Judiciary Board of the men's dormitories of Milligan College will consist of all members of the Dormitory Council. The President of the Dormitory Council will pre-

side at all meetings of the Judiciary Board.

Section 2. Duty

The Judiciary Board will act in the capacity of a court for violations of the dormitories' regulations as stated in the by-laws and Constitution of the men's dormitories.

Section 3. Powers.

- A. The Judiciary Board has the power to bring before it any resident of the men's dormitories who has previously been warned of his violations three times by any member or members of the Dormitory Council. If the violator refuses to appear before the Judiciary Board, his name will be given directly to the Administration. The Board will recommend action to be taken against the violator. The name of the violator and his number of violations will be posted in a public place such as the lobby of the Administration Building or Pardee Hall. The name of the violator will remain posted for the present semester. At the end of the semester, each person will be given a clean record.

When the violator appears before

the Board, he will be warned of his violations and asked to respect the regulations set forth in the by-laws and Constitution. The violator is placed on a four week probation period and if guilty of other violations during his probation period he will reappear before the Judiciary Board. There will be a faculty member present. This faculty member shall serve at the request of the President (or Vice-President in the case of the President's impeachment) of the Men's Dormitory Council and approval of the President of the college. This faculty member will have no voting rights. The Board will vote and if passed by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the Board members, the name of the reappearing violator will be given to the administration by the dormitory President where further action will be recommended.

- B. The Judiciary Board has the power to remove any member of the Dormitory Council if he does not uphold the duties of his position and respect the regulations set forth in the by-laws and the Constitution. The name of the Council member who has made violations

will be presented to the Board by another Council Member. Any male resident of the dormitories has the right to present the name of a Council member who has violated the dormitories' regulations. This name shall be given to a Council member. The violators offences will be stated and presented to the Board and by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members of the Judiciary Board, the Council member will be removed from his position.

The election of a new Council member will be in the same manner as they were originally elected.

- C. The Judiciary Board has the power to remove the President of the Dormitory Council from office. This removal will be in the following manner: A petition signed by twenty-five (25) percent of the men's dormitory residents on campus will be presented to the Judiciary Board by a Council member. This petition must state the offenses of the President. Confrontation of witnesses will be the rule of all such petitions. After the petition is presented to the Board and passed by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of Council members, then the

President will be presented to the residents of the men's dormitories. The conditions of his impeachment will be presented to the residents by a Council member. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the male residents in the dormitories will be needed to remove the President.

A new President will be elected immediately by the election rules stated in Article I, Section 2, part 1, b, of the Men's Dormitory Constitution.

The Vice-President of the Dormitory Council will preside at the impeachment of the President.

- D. The Male resident(s)-in-charge will, if a question arises, be the final judge concerning a violation of a by-law or a violation of the Constitution. A resident accused of any violation may, if he so desires, appeal to the male resident(s)-in-charge or to the administration, even if the Judiciary Board finds the accused guilty.

ARTICLE III. Amendments

- Section 1.** An amendment may be initiated by a petition carrying the signatures of twenty-five (25) percent of the male residents.

- Section 2.** A resolution for amendments upon passage by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of the Council, shall then be referred to the male dormitory residents.

- Section 3.** Passage by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the male residents and approval by the President of the College will put an amendment into effect.

ARTICLE IV. By-Laws

- Section 1.** Any By-Law may be enacted by the following process:

- A. A written petition signed by at least twenty-five (25) percent of the male dormitory residents is to be presented to the Dormitory Council by a council member.
- B. Upon passage of this petition by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of the council, the proposed By-Law shall be referred to the male dormitory residents.
- C. Passage by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the male residents and approval by the President of the College will put a By-Law into effect.

- Section 2.** Any By-Law may be repealed by the same process as one is enacted.

Section 3. The administration of Milligan College may add, alter, or make void a By-Law upon its own discretion.

ARTICLE V. Petitions

Section 1. A petition may be initiated by any member of the dormitory. If it is successful in obtaining the signatures of twenty-five (25) percent of the dormitory residents, it may be handed to the President. If it is found to be in order, it shall be presented to the Dormitory Council, either by the President or by a council member who may speak on the question. If it is passed by the Council, the President shall hand it to the President of the College for his consideration.

ARTICLE VI. Advisors

Section 1. Each dormitory's resident-in-charge, shall serve as advisor(s) to the Council.

ARTICLE VII. Ratification

Section 1. Ratification of this Constitution shall be effected upon the conclusion of the following procedure:

A. Approval of the Dormitory Council.

B. Approval by the President of the College.

C. Acceptance by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the male dormitory residents of Milligan College.

Section 2. Upon the meeting of these requirements, this Constitution shall take effect immediately.

STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

Milligan College purposes to integrate Biblical Christianity with scholarship and life. We expect standards of conduct which the college in the past has found relevant in creating the most favorable framework conducive to the pursuit of a liberal arts education in the Christian tradition.

In the light of this statement of policy, we draw attention to the following catalog precedents: "the possession or use of alcoholic beverages will incur liability of immediate dismissal." "Membership in Milligan College is not open to women who smoke. The use of tobacco by men is restricted to designated places." (By "designated places" it is particularly meant to exclude smoking in front of buildings and in the main campus area.)

Standards of neatness **AND** decorum in matters of dress are expected of Milligan College students. The "casual look" is restricted to the casual occasion. Students are required to dress up for the Sunday noon meals. Men are to wear coats and ties and women heels and hose.

Women: Bermudas, slacks, cut-offs and peddle pushers are not acceptable dress for class, library, dining hall or the main dormitory lounge.

Men: Bermudas, levis, jeans, beachcomber

pants, "T" shirts, and altered or makeshift athletic shirts are not acceptable attire for class, library or dining hall. The "sockless," "flying shirt tail" look falls below the standard of neatness required of Milligan men and appears only in the more casual setting.

It is expected that Milligan students will use discretion in dating behavior so that they will not be an embarrassment to themselves and to others.

Matriculation signifies agreement to live within the above principles and regulations. While some may not have personal convictions in accord with some of these conventions, responsibility for honorable adherence to them while under jurisdiction of the college will be demanded and judged a necessary part of one's participation in the purposes of Milligan College and in the educative process.

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
