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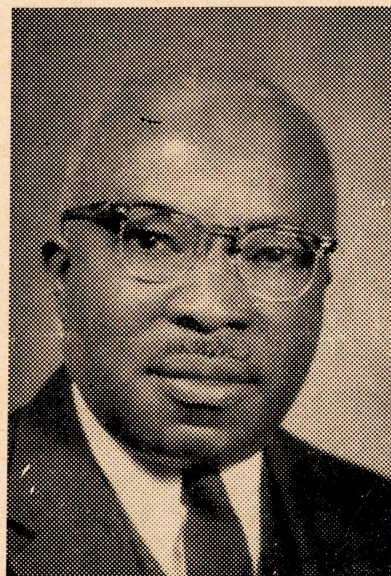

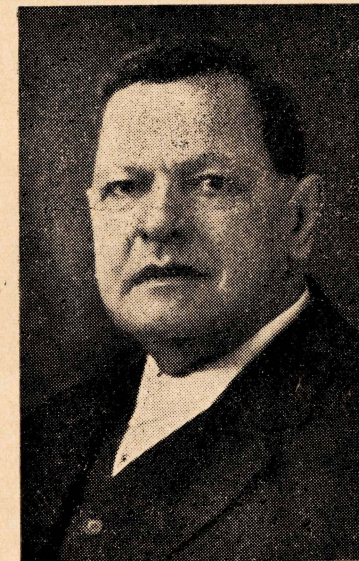
We left Louisville Monday, November 9th, for Norfolk, Va. Dr. I. H. Moore, Dean of the College

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I WAS A LONE WOLF IN MARYLAND

About forty years ago, I broke rank or got out of step with the late Dr. Peter Ainslie, The United Christian Missionary Society. The International Convention of Disciples of Christ. The World Convention of Disciples of Christ. In fact I got out of step with the whole open membership; and denominational world.

From the "Pope" down, and from "Daddy Grace" and "Father Devine" up. I believe that the Church of Christ as found in the New Testament, is the only way to God and Heaven. Christ said in Matthew, chapter sixteen: Upon this rock I will build my church. In another place he said: "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me. John 14:6.

As a child I was brought up in the Methodist and Episcopal Churches. "But when I became a man, I put away childish things." About fifty-five years ago, I heard R. L. (Back to the Book) Peters preach about the New Testament Church. That sermon knocked me out of the Episcopal Church into the Church of Christ, and I became a Christian. Very often I sing this song, On Christ, the solid Rock, I stand; All other ground is sinking sand. About fifty-five years ago I left the denominational world; to never return back to it, like some persons and organizations I have known.

They disregard what Christ said in Matthew 15:9. But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men. They disregard Second Peter 2:20-21-22.

Quote. For if after they have escaped the pollutions of the world, through the knowledge of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, they are again entangled therein, and overcome, the latter end is worse with them than the beginning. THE EMANCIPATION PROCLAMATION

January 1, 1863

(U.S. Statutes at Large, Vol. XII, p. 1268-9)

As early as July 22, 1862, Lincoln had read to his Cabinet a preliminary draft of an emancipation proclamation. At this time Secretary Seward suggested that the proclamation should not be issued until a military victory had been won. The battle of Antietam gave Lincoln his desired opportunity; on the 22nd of September he read to his Cabinet a second draft of the proclamation. After some modifications this was issued as a preliminary proclamation; the formal and definite proclamation came January 1, 1863. The **DIARIES** of Welles, Chase, and Bates give interesting records of the Cabinet meetings. BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED
STATES OF AMERICA:

A Proclamation

Whereas on the 22nd day of September, A.D. 1862, a proclamation was issued by the President of the United States, containing, among other things, the following to wit:

"That on the 1st day of January, A.D. 1863, all persons held as slaves within any State or designated part of a State the people whereof shall then be in rebellion against the United States shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free; and the executive government of the United States, including the military and naval authority thereof, will recognize and maintain the freedom of such persons and will do no act or acts to repress such persons, or any of them, in any efforts they may make for their actual freedom.

"That the executive will on the 1st day of January aforesaid, by proclamation, designate the States and parts of States, if any, in which the people thereof, respectively, shall then be in rebellion against the United States; and the fact that any State or the people thereof shall on that day be in good faith represented in the Congress of the United States by members chosen thereto at elections wherein a majority of the qualified voters of such States shall have participated shall, in the absence of strong countervailing testimony, be deemed conclusive evidence that such State and the people thereof are not then in rebellion against the United States."

Now, therefore, I, Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States, by virtue of the power in me vested as Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States in time of actual armed rebellion against the authority and government of the United States and as a fit and necessary war measure for suppressing said rebellion, do on this

1st day of January, A.D. 1863, and in accordance with my purpose so to do, publicly proclaimed for the full period of one hundred days from the first day above mentioned, order and designate as the States and parts of States wherein the people thereof, respectively, are this day in rebellion against the United States following, to wit:

Arkansas, Texas, Louisiana (except the parishes of St. Bernard, Plaquemines, Jefferson, St. John, St. Charles St. James, Ascension, Assumption, Terrebonne, Lafourche, St. Mary, St. Martin and Orleans, including the city of New Orleans), Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, and Virginia (except the forty-eight counties designated as West Virginia, and also the counties of Berkeley, Accomac, Northampton, Elizabeth City, York, Princess Anne, and Norfolk, including the cities of Norfolk and Portsmouth), and which excepted parts are for the present left precisely as if this proclamation were not issued.

And by virtue of the power and for the purpose aforesaid, I do order and declare that all persons held as slaves within said designated States and parts of States are, and henceforward shall be free; and that the Executive Government of the United States, including the military and naval authorities thereof, will recognize and maintain the freedom of said persons.

And I hereby enjoin upon the people so declared to be free to abstain from all violence, unless in necessary self-defense; and I recommend to them that, in all cases when allowed, they labor faithfully for reasonable wages.

And I further declare and make known that such persons of suitable condition will be received into the armed service of the United States to garrison forts, positions, stations, and other places, and to man vessels of all sorts in said service.

And upon this act, sincerely believed to be an act of justice, warranted by the Constitution upon military necessity, I invoke the considerate judgment of mankind and the gracious favor of Almighty God.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my name and cause the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this first day of January in the year of our Lord, 1863 and of the independence of the United States, the eighty-seventh.

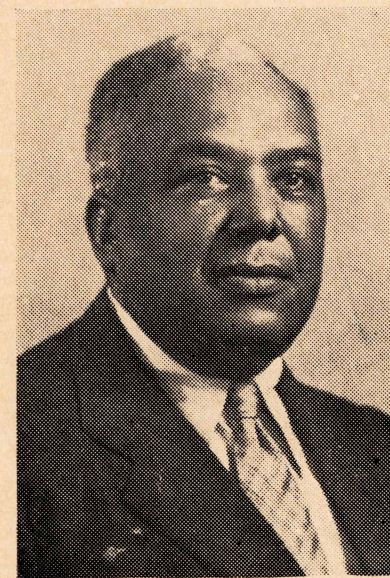

The young man did not act like a preacher, because he would not take the money I offered him. (Smile)

On the tenth of November I was returning from a preaching engagement at the College of the Scriptures, Louisville, Ky., by the way of Richmond and Norfolk, Va. On number one highway, between Alexandria and Arlington, the rain was heavy, when I stopped for a red light at a busy corner my car stopped. There I was in a heavy rain, blocking traffic. I prayed to the Lord for help. Before I could say Amen to my prayer, a Police Officer pulled around me and stopped. He got out of his car in the rain and came to me and said, your wires must be wet. If you live in or near Baltimore, consider yourself a personal evangelist. Personal evangelism (mouth to mouth feeding) is still the most effective method to save a starving soul.

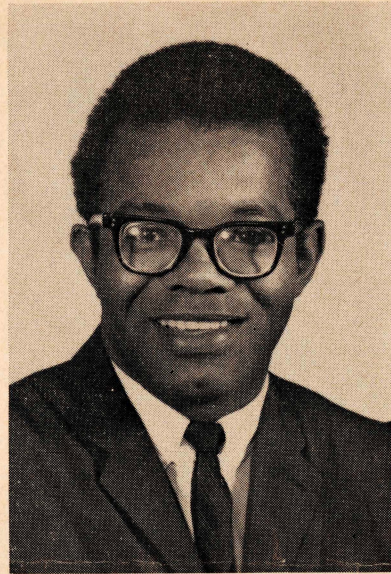
If you live outside Baltimore, a personal monetary gift can be your method to lead a soul to Christ.

THEME:
**Building a Bridge Between Jamaica
 And The U.S.A.**

By N. Carlton Mullings, Jamaica

TEXT: And other sheep I have which are not of this fold. Them also I must bring and they shall hear my voice and there shall be one fold and one shepherd. (John 10:16).

There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female, for we are all one in Christ Jesus. (Gal. 3:28).

Mr. President, Faculty, students of the College of The Scriptures, friends, in keeping with the theme of this year's Wide World Rally, the topic assigned me is "Building A Bridge between Jamaica and the United States."

The need for a bridge suggests among other things there exists between our two nations, a gulf, a gap, a chasm, or a barrier. The common annotation of a bridge is to link any gap which separates, in order to provide for better communication, fellowship, and intercourse. We are aware of the fact that Jamaica and the United States are separated by a natural barrier - the beautiful Caribbean Sea, whose waves lashes the coast line of this great country and provides Jamaica with some of the most beautiful beaches in the world. On one side of this magnificent water way is the United States—vast, rich progressive, powerful. . . .

On the other side is Jamaica, - tiny, poor, struggling, weak. . . . However, I am not here this afternoon to give you any engineering plans for the erecting of a physical bridge to link our two nations, but rather to share with you some of the essentials for building a structure that will far outlast any physical structure.

The things that Jamaica and the United States have in common far outweigh the differences.

A) We Share the Same Heritage. . . . To use a Jamaican phrase 'we came from the same navel string'

It was in the year 1606 that King James I of England granted a charter to the Virginia Com-

pany for the settlement in the New World, and it was in 1607 that Jamestown was selected and settled as an English Colony - an event which was to be the beginning of the historic destiny of this Country.

Some fifty years later Cromwell's men conquered the Spanish and planted the British flag on the Island of Jamaica. Thus, for nearly a century and a quarter the U.S.A. and Jamaica existed as sisters, ruled by the same monarch, raised the same flag, paid taxes to the same government, and paid allegiance to the same crown. We inherited the same traditions. We speak the same language. We accept the same principles of parliamentary democracy, and share the same philosophy of self determinism for all nations.

B) We Share the Same Ignominious Tragedy Of Slavery.

Jamaica, was the centre for the slave trade in this region. It was in Jamaica that the slaves received their orientation to the New World and from where they were shipped to the United States and other British territories. (Today, thank God, the only reminder of that disgrace in Jamaica is the sugar plantations. But, alas, the same cannot be said of this country as the scars of slavery have not faded.)

C) We Are Both Free Countries, and Independent Nations.

We embrace the same basic principles of freedom and human rights. We embrace the ideals of democracy. We share the Christian Faith, and accept its message. We strive for peace, the upliftment of human dignity and the triumph of the Gospel of Christ.

D) Sin Abounds In Jamaica As It Does In the U.S.A.

The forces of evil are as prevalent in Jamaica. . . . (Perhaps the farthest we are apart is in the fact that our air and beaches are not polluted yet).

I mention these things, for I believe that misunderstanding is the greatest cause of strife and frictions among nations. Consequently, I believe that one of the greatest criterion for building a bridge between any two nations is UNDERSTANDING.

MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING IS NECESSARY FOR THE BUILDING OF THIS BRIDGE.

I am appalled at how little Americans know about Jamaica - a country which is a mere 75 minutes from your coastline. Many of the students I have encountered on college campuses believe that Jamaica is somewhere in the far east; that it is a backward country with a savage populus, ignorant, illiterate . . . heathen - a mission field akin to the darkest parts of Africa when David Livingstone first set foot on that continent.

But this is not so. Jamaica is a religious country, with a very unique culture. Though we are poor, yet we are modern and progressive people. We have a very high standard of education, a very informed populus and outreach to most nations of the world. **THESE THINGS AND MUCH MORE AMERICANS NEED TO KNOW ABOUT JAMAICA.**

You need to know that we have taken our place among the nations of the world. As a member of the United Nations, it was through our resolution that 1969 was set apart and observed as Human

Rights Year. You need to know that Jamaica has a stable government, based upon a parliamentary system that is second to none. You need to know that we are teaching the world a much needed lesson on racial harmony and racial tolerance. It is not accidental that teams from the U.N. and other countries have come to our Island to study our racial climate. . . . You must know too, that Jamaica had produced leaders that have taken their places in world history. I'll mention only Marcus Garvey, a National Hero, who has done more than any other single individual, to bring the American Negroes, and Negroes all over the world to a place of self identification, and dignity. It is not co-incidental that his great work for the Black man was done in the United States. Neither, is it a proud fact that his name and accomplishments have been omitted from most American history text books.

Americans need to know that there are Jamaicans as dedicated to Christ and as capable of preaching the Gospel as any American or for that matter, any other nationality. There are Jamaicans who have sacrificed for the cause of Christ, and who are this very day labouring under adverse conditions for the cause of Christ. It is known that America has sent missionaries to Jamaica, but what is not known is that Jamaica has also sent missionaries to the United States.

Jamaicans on the other hand need to understand the United States too. There are many Jamaicans who believe that America is heaven on earth. . . . As a matter of fact some believe that if you land in one of the large cities of the U.S.A. you are apt to find Christ. (Personally, I believe that the large cities of the U.S. is the closest place to hell on earth). Some Jamaicans believe that money grows on trees in the U.S. so seasons in and seasons out you can pick money off trees as we pick mangoes, oranges or bananas. For some the word America or American means money. . . .

Understanding will come when we realize the nature of man is the same wherever he might be, whoever he is, and whatever his culture. Man all over shares the same passions, the same humanity, the same needs.

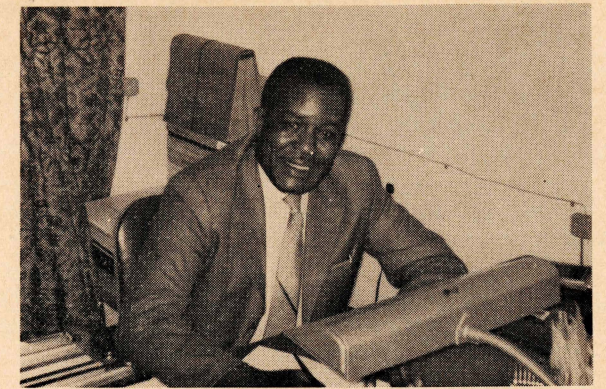
It was upon this foundation of understanding that Jesus Christ built the greatest of all bridges - that which linked man and God. He came as a man, to be touched with our infirmities, to be subjected to our passions, to be tempted as we are - sitting where we sat . . . and having understood us He was able to build the bridge - making straight in the desert a highway for our God; exalting every valley; making the mountains and hills low and straightening the crooked paths, smoothing the rough places, thus revealing the glory of our God.

To understand others, we must first understand Calvary, for there rests the architect's plan for building bridges.

THE STRUCTURE OF OUR BRIDGE MUST BE MUTUAL CONCERN

I am thinking here of a concern like unto that of the Apostle Paul who said "My heart's desire and Prayer to God for Israel is that they might be saved." (Rom. 10:1). Nor did Paul merely state his concern in superfluous words. Nay, his very life

**GUIDE LINE RULES FOR
 INTERRACIAL EVANGELISM**

**By Dean Henry M. Johnson,
 College of the Scriptures, Louisville, Ky.**

1. Most Negroes are very receptive in their attitudes of anyone, regardless of racial difference - "More than the Caucasian race." The reason for this, until just recently, they are not taught to hate anyone in their formative years. The reason why most Negroes hate racially is because of the ill treatment they have received by those who racially feel falsely superior above them.
2. It is a grave mistake for any Caucasian person or groups to go to the Negro with the look of "what I have done attitude," I have condescended to your inferior level to bring you Christ and his Gospel, and you ought to feel honored and privileged for having us white people to stoop to your level with the gospel of Christ.
3. For anyone to succeed in their work among Negroes, one must be friendly, to win their confidence. But not over-friendly to impress them.
4. It is not of a good taste or wise to express an isolated case or racial incident where Negroes have been treated unfairly to express your disapproval to insure them of your fairness and your honest intentions when prevailed upon. Just be yourself and let your examples, attitudes, and feelings be the determining factor in your relationship with them.
5. To win the confidence and admiration of Negroes, one must be very frank in what they say and do in their behaviour. The reason for this, "frankness" is one of the most pronounced characteristics you will find in most Negroes.
6. It is never of a good taste at anytime to introduce a Negro to another white friend as a colored friend when you mention his or her name for acquaintances.
7. One must accept Negroes without exception and without reservation before you can win him fully to Christ. "Things that are equal to the same things must be equal to each other."
8. All leaders and workers must be consecrated and dedicated to the mission work and its cause above everything else.
9. All the work and purpose of the mission must be geared only for educational improvement

for spiritual development, both socially and economically.

10. The work must not ever be tagged as a charitable organization. Only render charity when it is necessary for consideration.
11. An attractive, suitable place and building should be established completely with the necessary facilities to do the work effectively.

was a demonstration of this concern. He toiled; he prayed; he suffered; he preached; he wrote. In a word, Paul demonstrated his concern.

God was concerned and he acted! Calvary is the demonstration of his concern, without which there would have been no bridge between man and God.

If we are concerned, then there is no sacrifice too great for us to make. There is no price too high for us to pay - no pride too endearing for us to shatter.

Finally, A BRIDGE SUGGESTS COMMUNICATION.

Total communication also suggests the breaking down of barriers. The breaking down of barriers between man and God was our Lord's intention. Our text proclaims "**one fold and one shepherd**"; neither Jew nor Greek, bond nor free . . . but one in Christ. . . .

The Gospel is our bridge of Communication. It links men and nations, races and cultures. It removes barriers . . . it unites forces.

Thus, we must of necessity build a bridge of mutual Understanding, upon Mutual Concern for Communication. Nor can I over emphasize the need for communication . . . especially the communication of the Gospel. Let us drive the piles! Let us erect the bridge. Let us be God's people.
