

I've seen the lightning flashing, I've heard the thunder roll, I've seen sin's breakers dashing, Which almost conquered my soul; I've heard the voice of my Savior Bidding me still to fight on; He promised never to leave me, Never to leave me alone; For me He waiteth in glory, Seated upon His throne; He promised never to leave me, Never to leave me alone.

I attended this meeting November 27th, at East Orange, N.J., as a reporter for the Christian Informer.

I served as Representative from Maryland, under the late Dr. Preston Taylor, Founder and first President of the National Christian Missionary Convention. Down through the years, we served as National Evangelist, Program Director, Chairman of Recommendation Committee. Second Vice President, First Vice President and President. We left them and started the Christian Informer and the National Christian Preaching Convention in 1944.

If they are going to build a BLACK CHURCH I think I was the blackest man at the meeting. Others were light brown, dark brown, high brown, high yellow, half white, dark white, almost white. They must have been talking to me

The only "new day" I can see for the socalled "black church and black Disciple" is the day of execution. They have tried every kind of day you can mention. I remember once we tried "pan-cake day".

A "New Door". When I was with them, we tried to get in every door we could to no avail. If the so-called BLACK DISCIPLES stay where they are; the only "New Door" I can see, as an old preacher and a pastor for more than fifty years, is the door to the spiritual gas chamber, where the National Christian Missionary Convention, The Christian Plea Paper, Southern Christian Institute, Piedmont Christian Institute, the old Louisville Bible School and others were put to sleep.

Old Timers like Dr. R. H. Peoples, know what I am talking about.

"RESOLUTION NUMBER FORTY-SEVEN"



Gone But Not Forgotten 1941 Eddie Thomas Clark 1971

Mr. Eddie T. Clark, 4410 W. Sunset died at 5:30 A.M. Saturday, November 13, 1971 at Veterans Hospital, Louisville, Kentucky.

He was born November 3, 1914 in Charlestown, Missouri, one of 6 children to Thomas and Gertrude Clark. He married Magnolia Marie Ernest in February 1941 and they adopted Ronald Livingston Clark in 1949.

Mr. Clark came to Louisville, Ky, from Danville, Illinois in 1954. He was educated in the Illinois public school system and studied one year at the College of the Scriptures. He was a Veteran of World War II serving with the Airforce in the Asiatic Pacific and was awarded 3 bronze stars, the Good Conduct Medal and the Presidential unit citation.

He became a Christian in 1946 and was a chartered member of the Collett Street Church of Christ, Danville, Illinois. At his death he was a deacon, song director and treasurer of the West Side Church of Christ, which he helped to start. He was employed with Dulaney Cleaners and Walker Bag Co.

Survivors include a son, Ronald L. 

Sermon Outline With Brief Notes

"WITNESSING FOR CHRIST."

Text: "And you shall be witnesses for me, both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth." Acts 1:8

I. To begin, we may consider witnessing as a service in itself.

A. Thus, one may think of oneself as a citi-

1. He is concerned about his environment just around his house, his home; to see if he might improve conditions, etc.

2. He wants to show by action in this area that he is not unaware of common citizenship responsibilities, etc.

3. He is careful about his family; his children are under protective observation so that they also might catch his ideas of doing the right and necessary things which convey a message, if you please, to others.

II. We now speak of witnessing as a service to or for a cause outside of oneself.

B. Here he thinks of himself as being obligated to vouchsafe that cause for the very joy of doing a sacrificial mission in answer to call from God as does a volunteer in time of serious danger to the safety of his coun-

1. He goes willingly through serious, stringent training to fit himself for performance of his tasks.

2. He strives to prove his loyalty and unselfishness in this cause which has become to him as dear as his own life itself, as did the great heroes of historic fame.

3. He has discovered fully that he has at last found something that is more and greater than himself, because he is at this point living outside of himself.

III. Now we come to our text where we discover the glorified message of Jesus Christ to his Apostles: His witnesses.

C. Here we find a service which involves a command and a duty. If Jesus had not even told his Disciples to witness for him, it would have been their moral duty to have done so just for what had happened to them through the teachings of Jesus. It is also so of us.

1. Here is the discovery that it is the operation of the Holy Spirit which makes possible the ends we seek. It involves keeping it Christ's message and not our own personal message to which we give witness and carry to others.

2. Because we are trying to put Christ into every phase of human activity and concern that is valid as a means to build character and thereby to add to the dimensions of all areas physical, mental, moral, spiritual growth and development of the human species.

3. The successful achievement of these highly idealistic aims will give to us an input that will sustain and support us as we move into the very dangerous areas of the coming advance of socio-economic, political, and technological prog-

The Inner City Mission, Inc. Story

Fort Wayne has long been recognized as a religious community. For nearly thirty years Fort Wayne has been known as "the city of churches". Many of the churches in Fort Wayne, however, have been neglecting evangelism in the inner city. The city and area Churches of Christ have accepted the opportunities presented in this area.

In the spring of 1970, the Fort Wayne community Churches of Christ and the Fellowship of Christian Evangelizers (FOCE) began the sponsorship and support of an Inner City Mission. A ten room brick house was contracted for in downtown Fort Wayne at 624 East Wayne Street. Sam Winger was called to the ministry of inner city evangelism in Fort Wayne. Sam Winger, 35, is a graduate from the College of the Scriptures in Louisville, Kentucky and now serves as executive director and evangelist of the Inner City Mission, Inc. As executive director, Mr. Winger works with existing congregations as well as organizing and directing programs at the mission. Mr. Winger and his family live at the Mission house because he feels that you have to be on the job to do the job for Christ.

One important part of the Inner City Mission's program is the "Inn-Possible". The "Inn-Possible" program offers withdrawal for those addicted to drugs, continuous counseling during withdrawal, and complete rehabilitation toward a healthy Christian life. Great accomplishments have been made in this program. Many people have already been won for the Lord through the "Inn-Possible".

Another phase of the Inner City Mission's work is is educational training program. Classes are conducted at the Mission for those needing special skills to re-enter the job market. Adult education classes are provided for the high school drop-out. Classes teaching math, business, bookkeeping, and English for those who do not speak English fluently are being planned.

A third part of the Inner City Mission's program is its inner city youth organization. A Christian summer camp and youth programs are currently being organized. The summer camp program takes place each year at Wonder Valley Camp in Salem, Indiana.

The goal of all of these programs is, of course, winning souls for the Lord. This is accomplished through continuous evangelism. Personal and group Bible study classes are being held nightly. House to house evangelism campaigns are organized periodically. A bureau for personal and family counseling is being organized. All of this will lead to a strong, Christ-centered inner city congregation for Fort Wayne

In its short period of existence, the Inner City Mission has succeeded beyond all expectations. Through the support and contributions made by area congregations, civic organizations, private individuals, and area industries; the Mission has become primarily self-supporting. The staff of the Mission publishes its own newsletter once a month which is sent to over 500 people on mailing lists and to 60 area churches. The work of the Inner City Mission has been praised by the Fort Wayne press and news media. Recently, the Mission received a sizeable loan (\$2,000.00) which enabled it to make a down payment on a large home next door to the Mission building now being used. This extra space and additional facilities will enable the Mission to carry out an even more thorough job of winning new lives to Christ.

The most significant example of the success of the Inner City Mission is that over twenty-five human lives have been baptized into Christ. These that have been won to the Lord return to their community and witness by telling others about Christ. As the good news about Christ and the Inner City Mission spread through the inner city, more and more lives are going to be reached for Jesus.

There has been a deliberate effort to plan a flexible and overlapping program so that the Inner City Mission can carry the total Gospel to the total man in order that he might gain his total freedom in Christ. As explained by Sam Winger, executive director, "Our work will always be Christ centered in its goal. Our aim and our goal are simply to lift up Christ so that He, through His Spirit, may draw all men unto Him."

The purposes of the Inner City Mission and its goals, present a tremendous Christian challenge to all Christians everywhere. The Inner City Mission needs the prayers and financial assistance of each and every Christian. In doing so, we fulfill the command of the ascending Christ; "Go into all the world and preach the Gospel. . . ."




Dear Bro. Taylor,

THIS beatitude, like the others, seems a contradiction of terms. How can a meek person get his share of this world's goods, much less inherit the earth? What virtue, what blessedness is there in being poor, hungry, thirsty and mourning?

When we conceive of meekness as an interhuman relationship it is weakness and not might. A meek person is one who is humble, mild, modest, gentle, submissive, subservient and easily led. We compare him with a lamb, an innocent creature, submissive and easily led, "as meek as a lamb." But the lambs are sheared in Wall Street. The way to power and possession is with the go-getter, he who knows how to subdue, and to make others subservient to his purpose.

But Jesus is here referring to our attitude toward God. Meekness toward God makes us His ready instrument. It makes for courage.

The meek trust God. They are men of faith, relying upon the Divine power. It inspires courage and daring. "Learn of me that I am meek and lowly of heart," said Jesus, but it was He who drove the money changers out of the temple with a scourge, who called the Pharisees hypocrites, whitewashed sepulchres, generation of vipers, children of the devil. His zeal arising from an implicit faith gave Him power.

In that magnificent gallery of the heroes of faith, which the writer of the epistle to the Hebrews depicts so vividly, we find portrayed for us men of might, of courage, or daring, of tremendous power and influence. They were meek, but it was a meekness that made them rely upon the power of their

Heavenly Father through which they overcame the world.

The meek are humble. Humility awakens a sense of weakness, of human weakness, but it creates a consciousness of the possession of Divine power. "God wills it" was inscribed upon the banner of the crusaders, and this is written in the hearts of the meek, as they take recourse to God. Paul, the proud rider, was unhorsed on the way to Damascus. Humbly he fell, prone before the Lord, and from that day he became a chosen vessel of his Lord to the gentiles, a fearless soldier, a courageous fighter in the army of the Lord. Humility is ever a sign of true greatness, but Christian humility makes one subservient to the will of God.

Meekness implies submission to God. Through that submission Christ takes complete possession of a life. Paul had this. He said: "It is no longer I that live, but Christ liveth in me." Here we have the real source of might in meekness. When the great apostle asked: "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" then his Lord became dominant in his life. What courage, what daring, what resistance, what endurance, what hero:sm that meek follower revealed in his great crusade for Christ.

Through such meek submission to the spirit of God, our life becomes a powerful conductor for the vital flow of God's grace and power. A coil of copper wire, strung on the poles along the highway, remains inert and dead until it becomes connected with a dynamo or turbine, then it becomes powerful, throbs with life and energy, and conveys a mighty invisible force to serve humanity. Meek submission means direct contact with God. It makes our life conductors, vibrating with spiritual power. Then a weak mortal becomes a dynamic force, a living instrument of God.

Such spiritual meekness the world may not understand. It did not understand the meek submission of Jesus to His enemies when they falsely accused Him, when they abused and mocked Him. But it revealed His great self-control when He answered nothing. His calm silence in the midst of the storm, when curses, taunts and ridicule were heaped upon Him, this paid eloquent tribute to His might of meekness.
