East Tennessee State senior right-hander Jessica Duncan pitched effectively and sophomore outfielder Tara Hartnett's sacrifice fly in the seventh inning scored the game-winning run in a 4-3 victory at Stetson on Thursday. The Hatters won the nightcap 6-5 to tie the Atlantic Sun doubleheader.

Duncan (7-9) allowed three runs on five hits in the complete game for the Bucs (3-7, 14-22). Hartnett's previous RBI scored the game-winning run.

overall. Milligan (3-1, 20-13) split an Appalachian Athletic Conference doubleheader at Union College in Barboursville, Ky. The Buffaloes fell 1-0 in the first game and won game two 5-4.

Hard-luck loser Sidney Burns allowed one run on five hits in the opener. Freshman Council Commissaire got the victory in game two.

Emily Rags was 1-for-2 with two RBIs, while Commissaire was 2-for-3 with an RBI. The Buffaloes are slated to return to action on Saturday, April 9, when they host Virginia Intermont at 2 p.m.

Bulls unveil Pippen statue

Scottie Pippen now has a sculpture at the United Center, just like Mike.

The Bulls unveiled the bronze bust showing him in his No. 33 jersey during a ceremony at halftime of Thursday's game against the Boston Celtics at the United Center.

It was a fitting honor for the Hall of Famer, who along with Michael Jordan led the Bulls to six NBA championships in eight years.

Pippen told the crowd he was "truly honored" and thanked the organization and fans, saying he appreciated "the love, the drive" they gave him.

The bust, which will be displayed in the new concourse, was made by the same artist who sculpted Jordan's outside the United Center.

Pippen says this "truly ranks at the top" of all the honors he's received.

Rose, Bulls beat Boston

Derick Rose scored 20 points and the Chicago Bulls closed in on the top seed in the Eastern Conference by beating the Boston Celtics 97-81 on Thursday.

The Bulls' 17th win in 19 games put them four games behind Boston and Miami with four to play and eliminated the Heat from getting the No. 1 seed.

The Celtics, who played the Heat on Sunday, still have a mathematical shot albeit a remote one.

But barring a collapse, Chicago will be the top seed in the East.

It's another step for a team that expected big things after a major overhaul, and all the Bulls have done is deliver their best season since Michael Jordan and Scottie Pippen made championship celebrations a regular event.

Wozniacki wins at Family Circle

Top-ranked Caroline Wozniacki was expected to headline the Family Circle Cup — and she did it from a semi-ranked player from the Czech Republic.

The top-seeded Dane had to win two tie-breakers to defeat Barbora Zahlavova Strycova 7-6 (6), 7-6 (9) in a stadium court match last night at 2:42 hours. It looked nothing like the 55-minute cakewalk Wozniacki enjoyed in Wednesday's opening match.

"I knew that if it wasn't going to be easy, I've seen it before and I played her last year here," Wozniacki said.

Wozniacki appeared to be cruising again with a 4-1 lead in the opening set against Zahlavova Strycova. Then the frustrated Czech talked to her coach and promised to play more aggressively. That didn't work. She extended points and forced Wozniacki deep into corners to chase down shots.

Zahlavova Strycova held serve twice to force the tiebreaker. The 25-year-old fought back in that one, too. After trailing 5-1, she won five straight points to hold a set point of her own. But Zahlavova Strycova had that chance long and netted the next two points to give Wozniacki the set.

It was Wozniacki's turn to rally in the second set after Zahlavova Strycova took a 3-1 lead. She then held serve with Zahlavova Strycova forced to force a second tiebreaker, thrilling the fans at the Family Circle Tennis Center.

Wozniacki moved in front 5-2, but Zahlavova Strycova fought off four match points. Zahlavova Strycova then had to take the set leading 9-8 but sent the ball wide.
