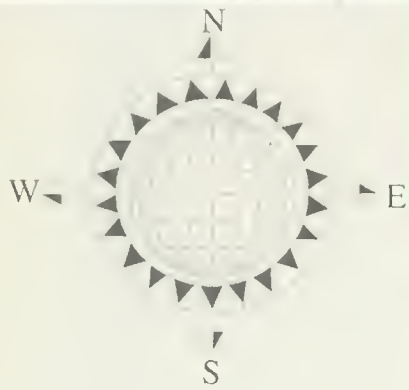

Lip service to the Queen

Olde English singers entertain feastgoers with song and dance from 16th century



The great doors of Windsor Castle frantically burst open, and a jester bounds in with flailing arms proclaiming, "What Ho! Make Way! Queen Bess stands ready to enter this hall!" In a grand procession, the twelve loyal peacock-posing guests of Queen Elizabeth escort the Queen herself to the head table of the feast while rattling off a 16th century madrigal with accuracy. The scene is set for some 2,000 guests who attended the six performances of the 25th Annual Madrigal Dinners.

The evening centered around Queen Elizabeth (Caitlin Reaves) and her twelve royal guests. During the dinner, the guests were entertained by singing, acting, dancing, a lively jester, and an instrumental consort. Dr. Dennis

Williams, director, claimed that "the enjoyment of the evening is based upon the fact that the dinner guests are not the audience, but they are the participants."

The dinner guests were encouraged to sing Christmas carols, clap their hands in rhythm to a vigorous Spanish carol led by Sir Francis Drake (Richard Harrison), and even partake in a spontaneous play which incorporated the talents of five dinner guests each night.

Since this madrigal dinner marked the 25th feast in Milligan's history, Williams was challenged to create something new." Besides the addition of new music, fresh dialogue and a trio of dancing minstrels, Williams acknowledges "the most striking addition was the applica-

tion of a company of actors called the Nottingham Players." Fueled by the humor of Mike Stanley, Erika Pierson and Mike Beverly, the Players were directed by Richard Major, professor of drama. Thomas Townsend who has played the role of the High Chamberlain for the past two years said, "I think it was a great experience for the music and the theatre departments to work together in such a cooperative way."

"There's an educational aspect to the madrigal performances that I think a lot of people miss at first glance," said Amy Bishop who portrayed Lady Elizabeth Raliegth. For example, Scott Greaser portrayed scientist/inventor Sir Francis Bacon, Doug Hartley played the role of the famous poet Ben Jonson.

The task of constructing the madrigal event was very complex. Besides the twelve chamber singers who began rehearsing in September, Bobbie Macek created six new costumes, Doris Schmidt coordinated the dancing, 15 theatre work study students helped build the set, and some 40 kitchen workers assisted in the meal. The jester, Kip Lines, spent up to an hour and a half preparing his make-up, costume, and undergoing necessary mental preparations each night. "It was a lot of work... [yet] it was really an enjoyable experience to make people laugh," said Lines. Lady Sarah Morely, played by Beth Zimmerman, agreed that it was hard work. "But the friendships made it all worth it."

reaches new depths



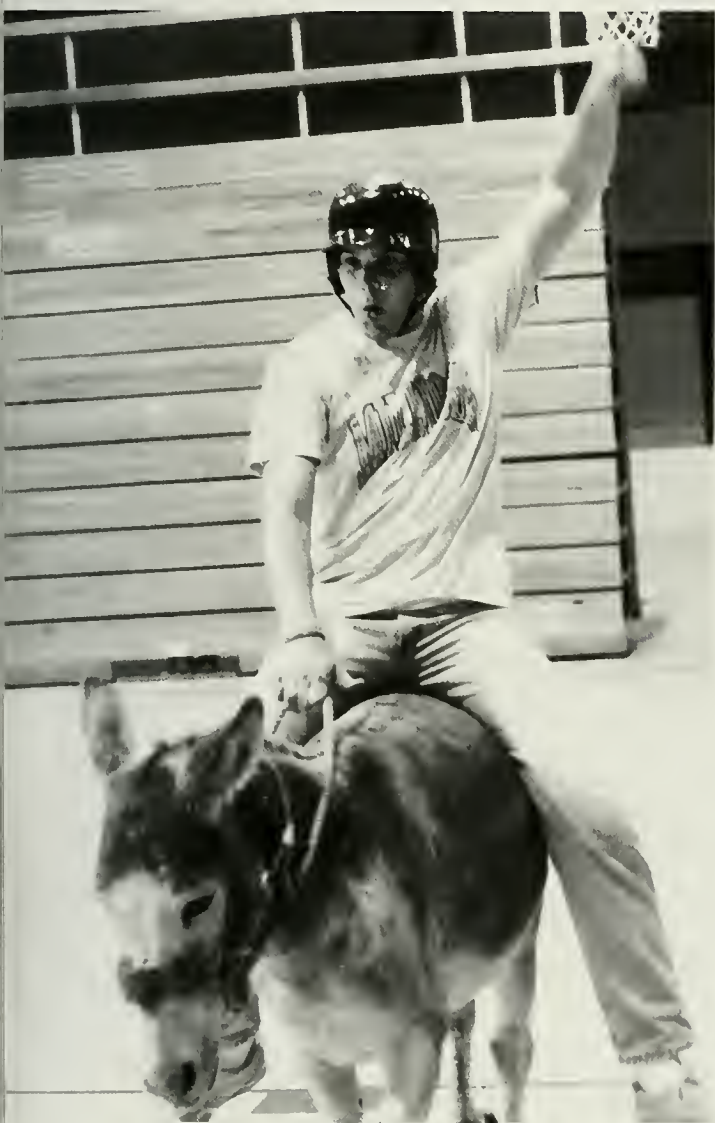

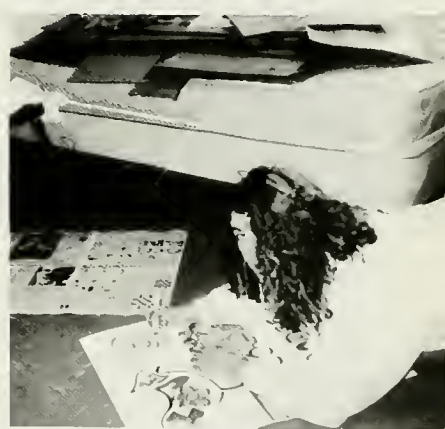

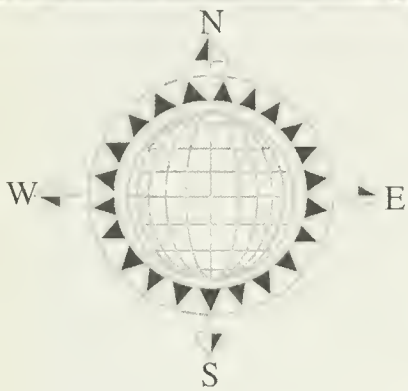

During the month of April, The Science Department sponsored a trip to the nation's capital, Washington D. C. , allowing students three days to see the sights as well as enjoy a break from school.

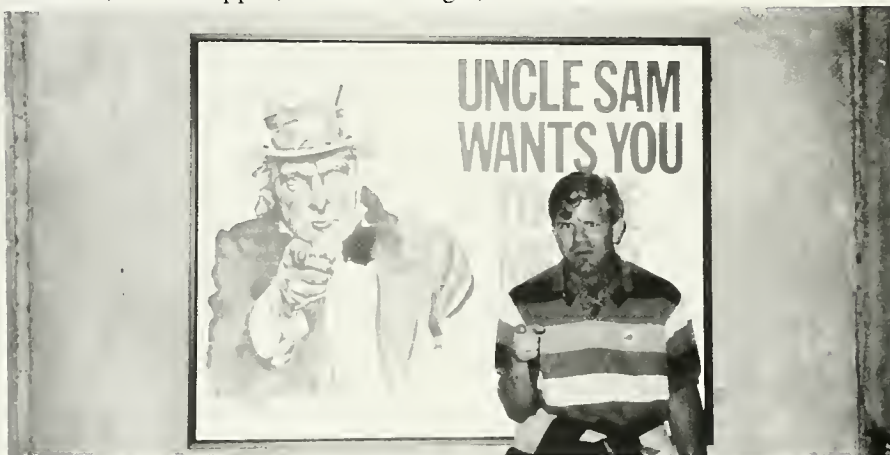

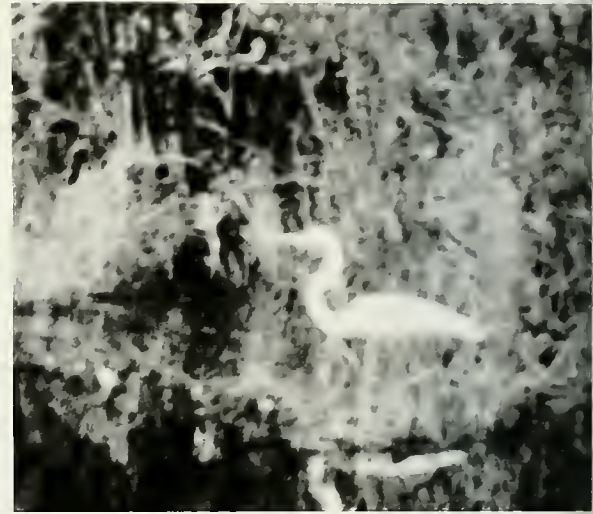

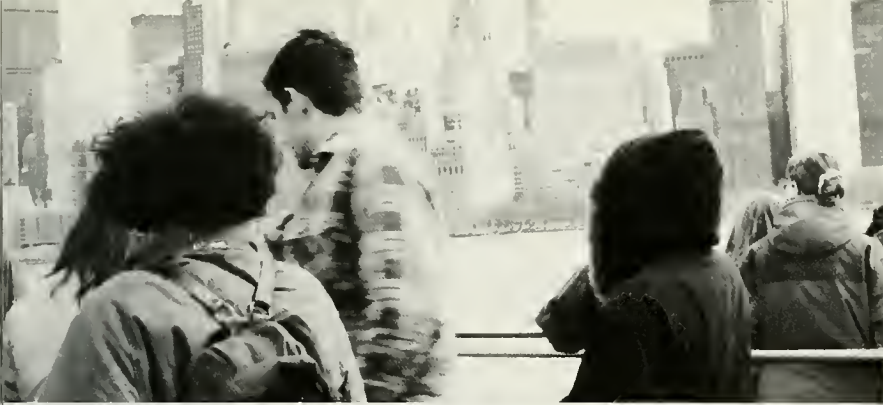

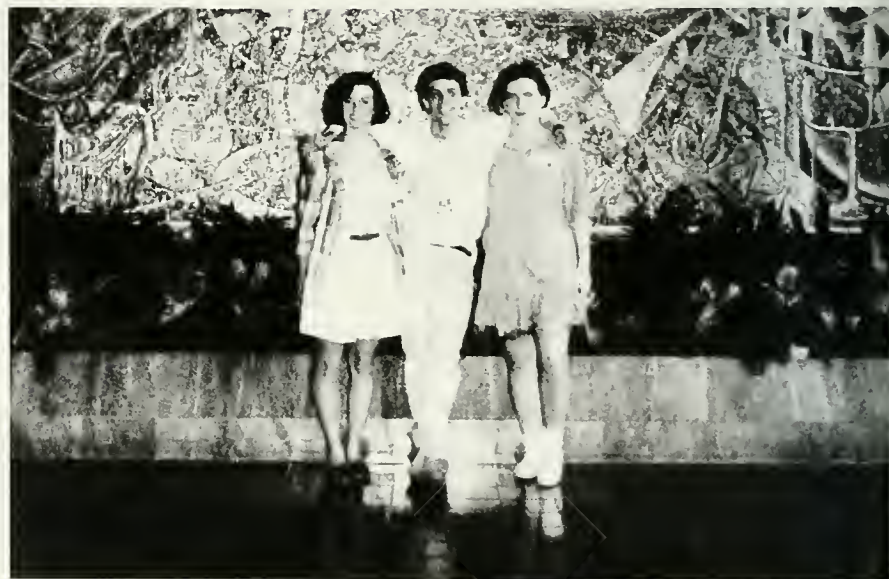

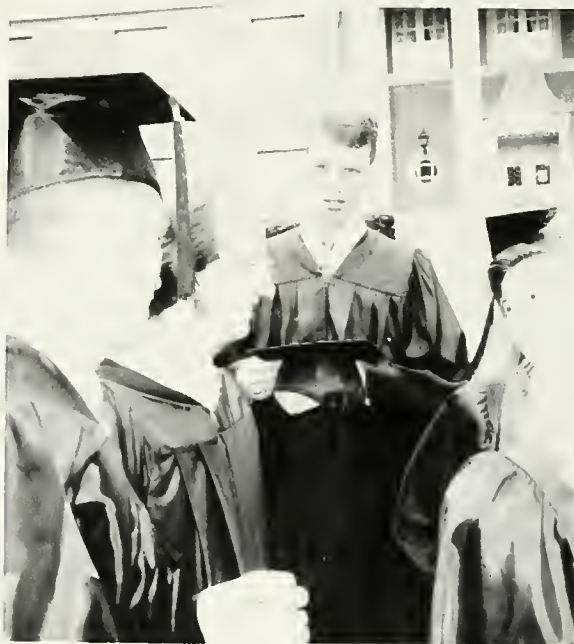

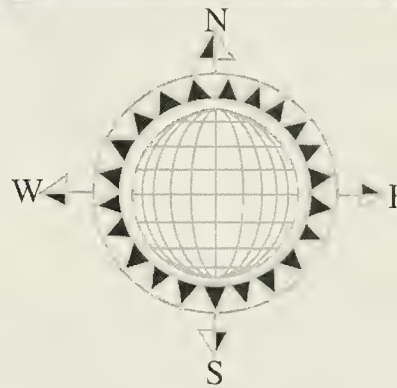

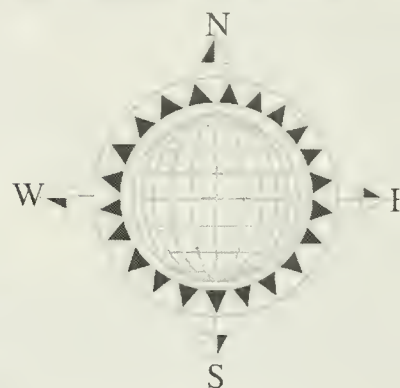
Will Ratliff battles to get the ball past a King opponent during their heated game, Jan. 30.

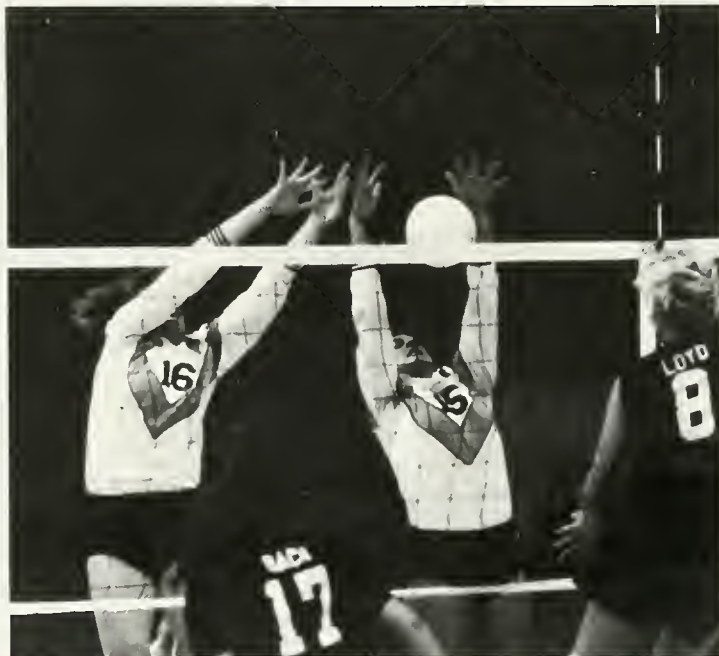
was an Academic All American. Coach Linda King was named the NAIA District 24 coach of the year for the second consecutive year.

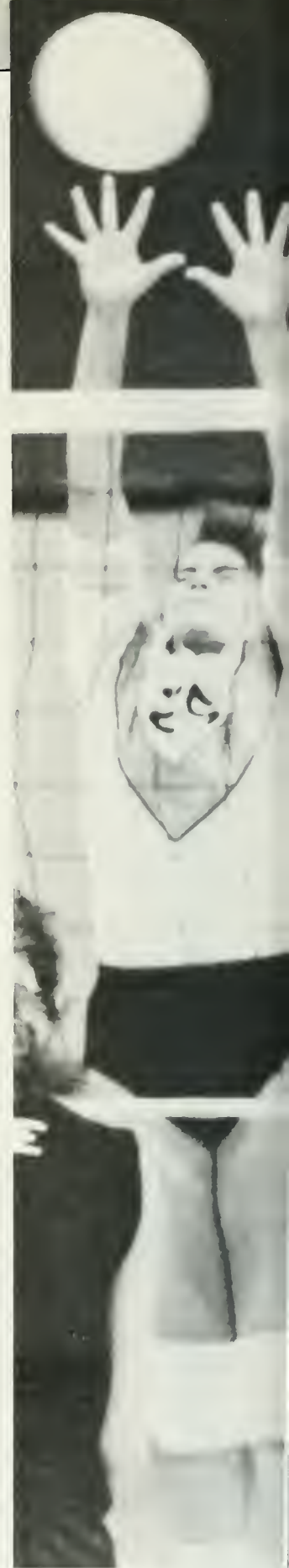

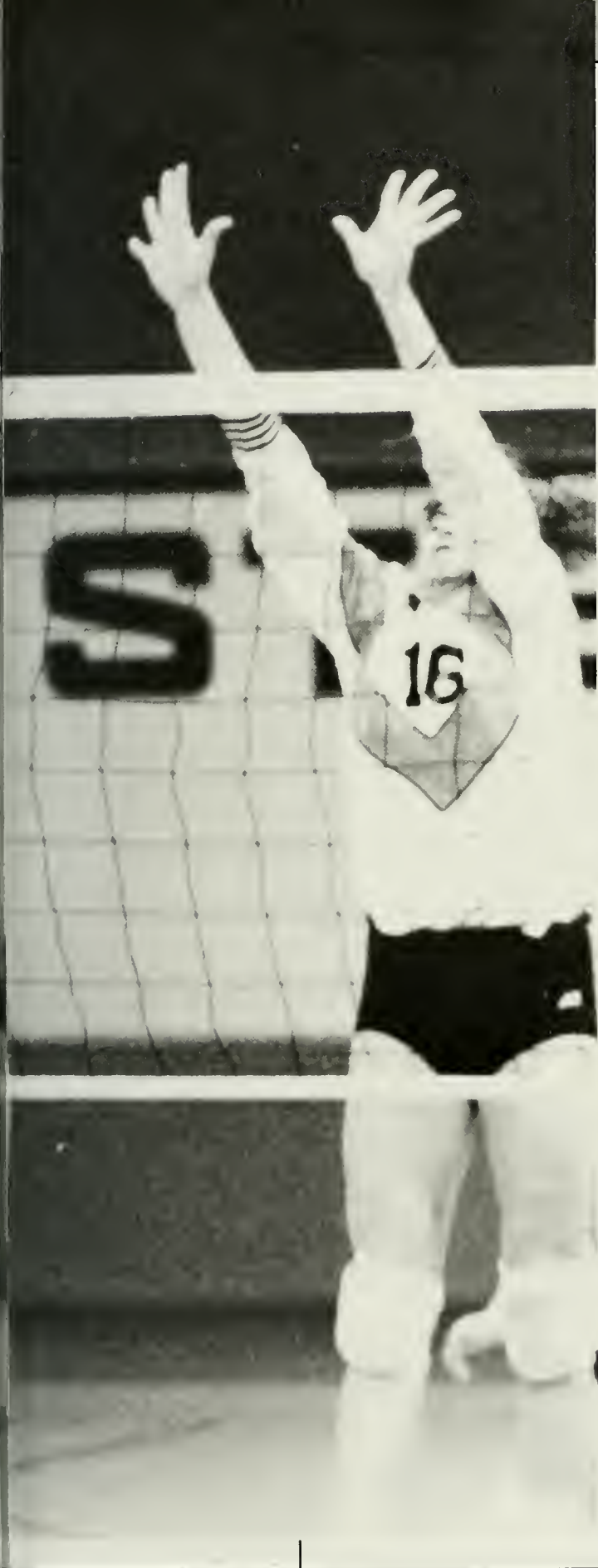


Paige Hammond jump in order to get a better angle on the ball.

The Buffs finished the first semester with a losing record, but with the new semester ahead, the season

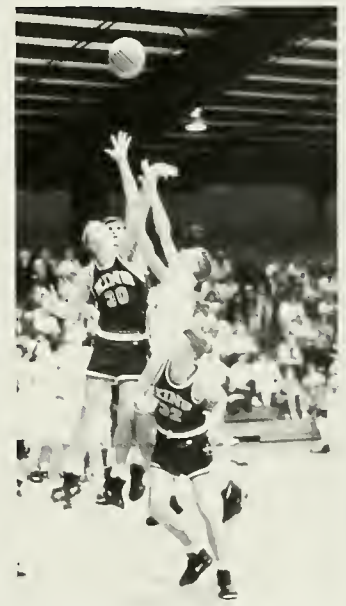

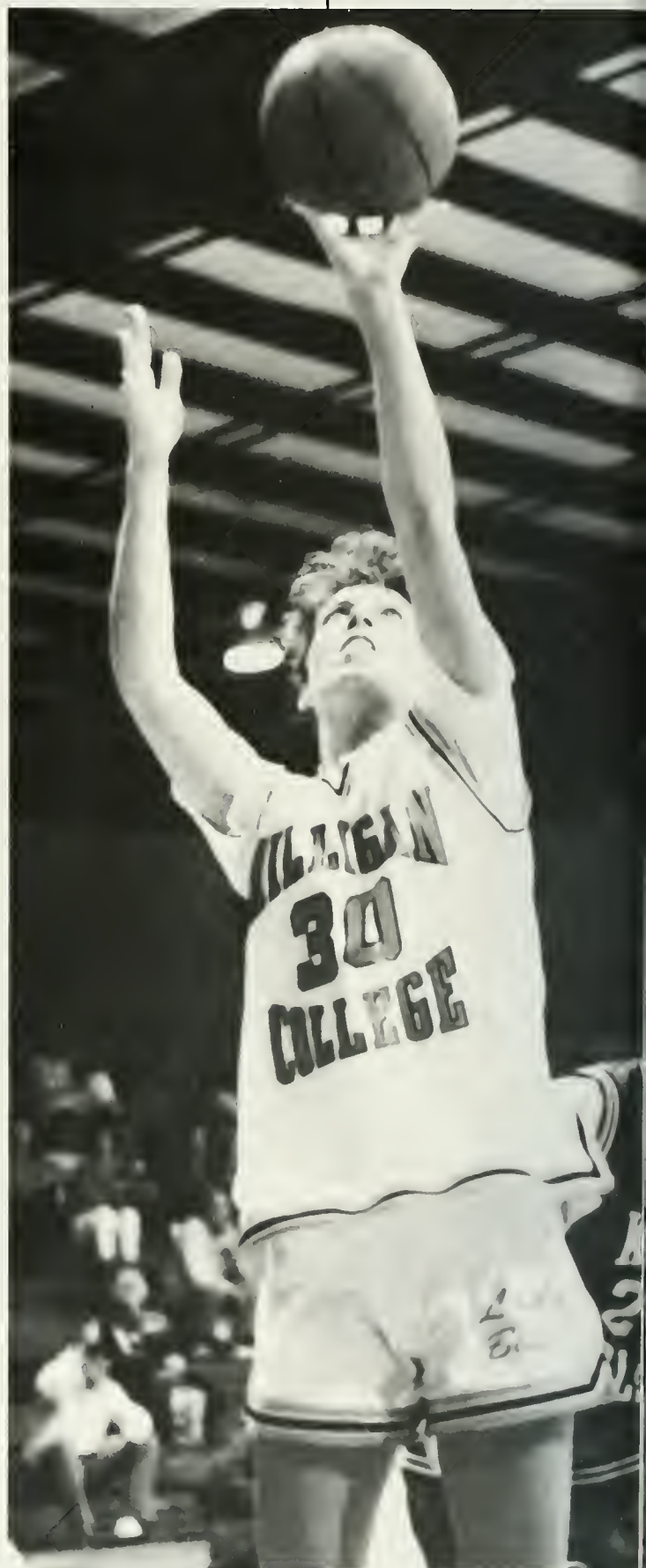

Underclassmen constituted the majority of the team with the only senior being Becky Wilson. Jodie Iwanusa won the most valuable player award along with the conference singles championship

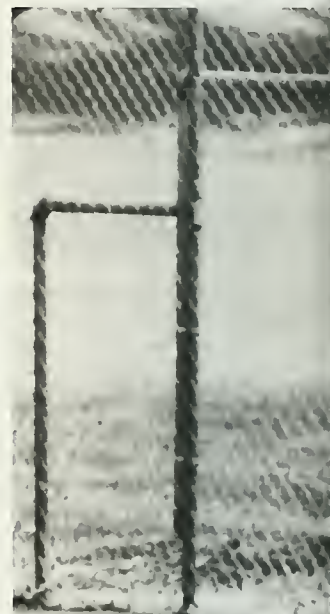

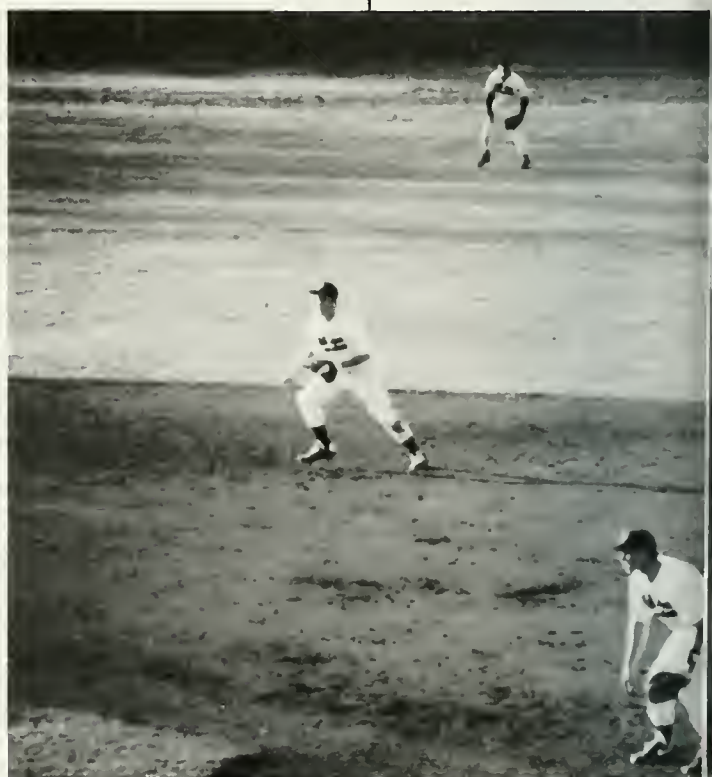

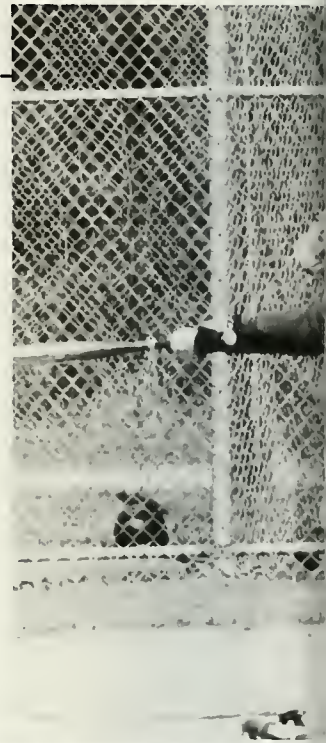
Overall, the team batting average held at .371 for the year.

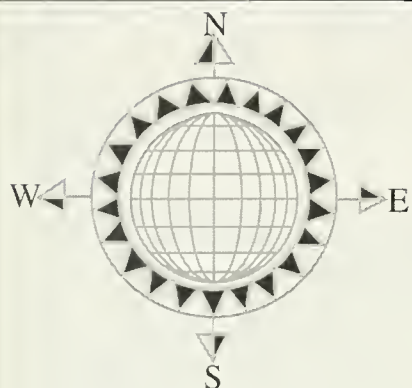

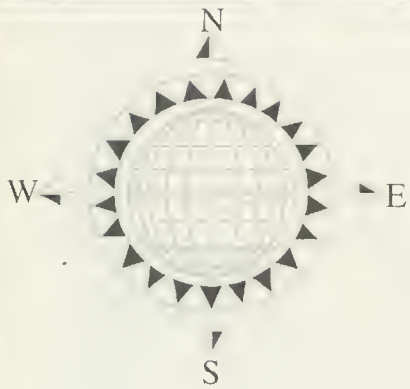

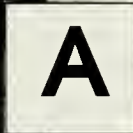

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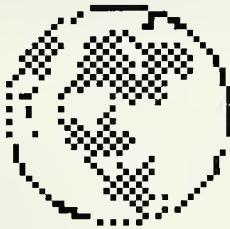

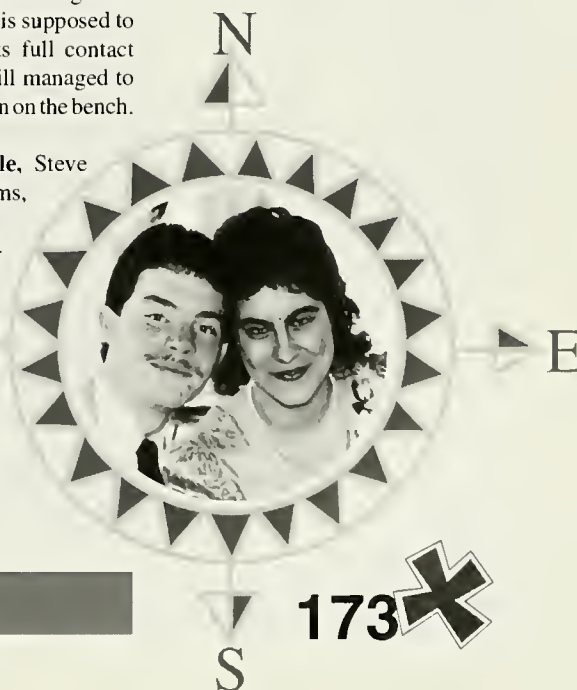

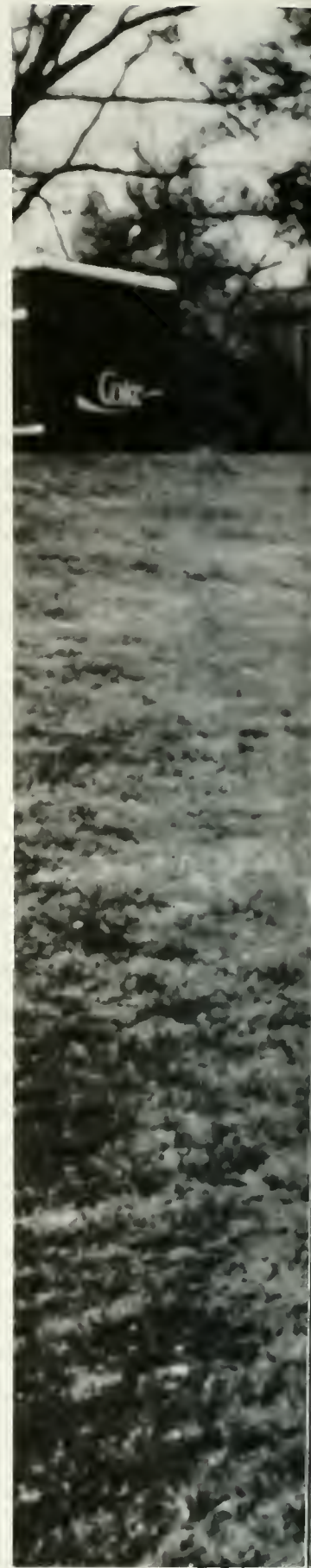
