1947 Homecoming Set For Nov. 8

Homecoming is November 8, 1947. There will be a general get-together on the campus as Alumni arrive during the afternoon. There will be no business session since the Board of Directors meets for such discussions. This year Homecoming will be purely social and the big business meeting will be in the spring.

There will be a Rally Supper in the college dining room at 6 o'clock. Plates will be \$1.00. You will be eating someplace before the game so come on out and eat with Milligan folk! You will want to see the cafeteria arrangement in the dining room, too. Be sure to notify the Alumni Secretary that you plan to attend the supper.

The Homecoming Football Game is with Tennessee Wesleyan College at Roosevelt Stadium in Johnson City. This stadium has concrete stands now on the east side as well as the west side and will seat everybody comfortably. Bring along a blanket because that November breeze off Buffalo Mountain gets cold at night!

Complimentary tickets to the Homecoming Game will be available to all alumni at the Rally Supper. This is a courtesy not extended by most schools but Milligan is glad to be able to be your host for the game. Do not expect tickets unless you are at the Rally Supper—Milligan College Dining Room—plates \$1.

It is always good to see faces you know when you return to your Alma Mater. You will be glad to know that several of your "old profs" are still at Milligan.

Prof. Sam J. Hyder has the longest record of service on the faculty. He graduated at Milligan in 1916 and has been teaching math since then. He has probably thrown a mountain of chalk out the window by now.

Prof. A. F. Cochrane, who came to Milligan in 1920, became academic dean of the college at the beginning of this school year. He and Mrs. Cochrane own a home in Pinecrest on the Milligan Highway.

Dr. H. M. Thompson still heads the chemistry department. He came to Milligan in 1928. He owns a home on the Glantzoff Highway about three miles from the campus.

In 1931 Prof. E. G. Lodter came to Milligan as head of the department of modern languages. In 1946 he became registrar of the college. He and his family still

In July, 1947, the professors of Milligan College organized The Faculty Club. Mr. Marsh is the president of the new organization which meets each third Thursday evening of the month.

Milligan's 65th Year

On September 8, Milligan College opened her sixty-fifth year. During the first two weeks 456 students were enrolled; this number breaks all records for number enrolled in previous years. Of this number, 204 are veterans of the past war, enrolled under the G. I. Bill.

On Thursday, September 11, the annual Faculty Reception was held in the parlors of Hardin Hall. The affair was informal. Punch and cookies were served.

There was a big pep meeting around a huge fire on Anglin Field on Friday night. Cries of "Stampede 'em, Buffaloes" still echo through the crisp night air on such occasions. The first football game, with Southeastern Louisiana, followed on Saturday night. A rain-drenched crowd stayed at the stadium in Johnson City until the final whistle declared Milligan had tied the opponent, 6 to 6.

Convocation Sunday on September 4 was marked by a morning service in Hopwood Memorial Church and an afternoon Memorial Service for Milligan boys killed in World War II.

THE BUFFALO HEAD

The stuffed buffalo head pictured above was given to Milligan College in 1944 by Mr. W. B. Johnson of Johnson City. A friend of Mr. Johnson's son, Dick, killed the buffalo in Texas and presented it to Dick, who sent the stuffed head to his father. Mr. Johnson, in turn, gave it to Milligan College. The big Buff has since that time headed two beautiful Burley Bowl floats on Thanksgiving Day and has paraded proudly before several football crowds. The ingenuity of Milligan students has provided him with a realistic body, complete with

Meet The Coaches

W. H. "Red" Yancey—Coach attended Jacksonville, Alabama Teachers College. While there he participated in football, basketball, baseball and track and lettered in each sport. Aside from athletic ability he also received the honor of being chosen as outstanding scholastic student.

After leaving Alabama, he attended Auburn and received his Master's Degree in history from that institution. He has coached at Palatka, Florida High School, Brunskick, Ga., and Kingsport, and his teams at each of those schools have been able to give a good account of themselves on the sports front.

Sidney Rice—"Sid" has an enviable sports background at Lincoln Memorial and Columbia. He coaches the ends and one look at the Buff wingmen will tell you that he knows his job well. In the spring, he also handles the trackmen and you can look for a fast cinder team next year.

Frank Spraker—"Pluto" is back as line coach after serving briefly at St. Paul, Va. High. Those who recall his bruising play at tackle under Steve Lacy and Ray Brown know that "Sprake" is a hard-working, ambitious young fellow.

Bill Showalter—Blond, good-natured Bill Showalter is another ex-Buff who needs no introduction. His sterling play at fullback in 1940-41 was a prominent factor in winning two conference titles. Bill is working in the capacity of student assistant and he is responsible for keeping the squad in good physical condition.

Homecoming Game— Milligan vs. Tennessee Wesleyan

The Tennessee Wesleyan Bulldogs, beaten 14-12 here last month by East Tennessee State, come back to Memorial Stadium on Nov. 8th to furnish the opposition for Milligan's homecoming game.

Wesleyan, coached by Rankin Hudson, former V. P. I. star, presented a smooth-working club in their first visit to Johnson City and they are expected to be even stronger against the "Thundering Herd". Hudson uses the deceptive "T" formation and the Bulldogs have a formidable air attack they can break out when the land assault stalls. They have a trio of capable passers in Blackie Blackley, Wes Barker and Bill Eggert and "Ace" Adams at end is one of the finest receivers in the conference.

Other outstanding linemen include C. W. Pemberton, hustling one-armed guard from Rockwood, Tenn.; Ed McBroom, 205 pound tackle from Lenoir City; and James Scarce, 210 pound tackle from Richmond, Va.

Last year at Athens the Buffs edged the Bulldogs 12-7 as Claude



Holsclaw hit Lynn Goddard with a touchdown pass in the fading minutes of the game. This year's conflict should be one of the best on the schedule and Coach "Red" Yancey and his assistants have been readying their attack with meticulous care.

Hundreds of the "Old Grads" are expected to witness the contest and take part in the extensive homecoming ceremonies that are planned for the week-end.



MEMBER OF 1882 CLASS STILL TEACHING SCHOOL

Mr. James A. Tate

Mr. James A. Tate of Shelbyville, Tennessee, is the only living member of the class of 1882, the first graduating class of Milligan College. Mr. Tate is now in his fifty-fourth year of teaching.

Mr. Tate was born nearly 88 years ago at Maness, Scott County, Virginia. During the Civil War his family moved to Hancock County, Tennessee. He graduated at Milligan College in 1882 and remained at the college as professor of mathematics for eight years. While at Milligan he married Laetitia Larue Cornforth, class of 1887, who was his faithful fellow-teacher for the next fifty years.

In 1890 the Tates moved to Fayetteville where they operated Fayetteville Institute. Next followed thirteen years at the American University in Harriman, Tennessee. In 1908 Mr. Tate moved to Shelbyville where he took over and reorganized the old Dixon Academy, which became known as the Tate School. Many educators thought his ideas on education were too idealistic, however his school grew and prospered. His slogans for his students were "Know what you know, and know you know it", and "Do what you do and do it well."

The Tate School continued under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Tate and their daughter, Rose, wife of Bain Stewart, until the death of Mrs. Tate in 1934. At that time Tate School closed but after a two year attempt at retirement, Mr. Tate was again eager for activity. It was then that he joined in the crusade for prohibition and toured the country making speeches against liquor. He is now the president of the United Dry Forces of Tennessee.

Returning to his old profession of teaching, Mr. Tate is now professor of mathematics at Tennessee Industrial School in Nashville. His grandson, Bain Tate, is a professor of English at the University of Tennessee.

**Reserve A Plate For
Rally Supper Nov. 8**

Round Robin Letter In 1940 Class

In May, 1940, before the graduating class of that year scattered, some of the girls agreed to correspond with each other through a Round Robin Letter.
