The ministers and churches who have been wanting an opportunity to help build a Bible School for the specific purpose of training ministers to establish churches according to the New Testament doctrines, now have this opportunity presented to them by that most commendable and Christian effort being put forth in that direction by President Tibbs Maxey and others who are working with him.

It is not necessary to argue as to the need of such an institution because it is too well known that we haven't any such an institution at the present, and haven't had since the Louisville Bible School was closed several years ago. The effort to make possible the School of the Scriptures is most commendable in every way. It will build a school which will not be in competition with any of the schools now established, because it will be working in a field most glaringly neglected for over forty years.

It will make possible the training of ministers true to the restoration movement and other church workers who will be true to the "BOOK."

It will meet a need among us which has not been met up to the present time and train men for the ministry which can build up again many of our run-down pastorless churches, and establish other churches in new fields. Every minister should give this effort his loyal support and encouragement in every way possible and urge all others who realize the urgent need for such an institution.

WHERE DO YOU STAND?

Thus saith the Lord, stand ye in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls. But they said, we will not walk therein.—Jr. 6:16.

The question is being ask now on various occasions, where do you stand? Some are taking it for an insult, but I don't think any person should be insulted because it is a privilege for any Christian or non-Christian to ask where a person stands on certain principals. There might be those who say there isn't but one place to stand, or I am standing where the fathers stood; then we may ask. where did the fathers stand? From history or from the Bible, we find that the fathers stood for the unity of the people of God upon the Bible alone. They taught that faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God; and that everything that is not of faith, is sin. Because of their stand, it was not a hard thing for them to say to a person, you are either right or you are wrong. But the question is: "Where do you stand?" We must admit that there are two or more ways now. but only one right way; if a person is not in the if he is to get the promise of the Father, he must right way then he is in some way that is wrong. What is the solution? Stand ye in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls. A comparison must be made of the ways. We have the right way—wrong way; high way—low way; narrow way—broad way; the way of Christ—the way of man. In the days of Jeremiah, some said we will not walk therein, and people are still saying we will not walk therein, by deliberately refusing the God given book of inspiration. If we are to stand in the old path, then we must fight against the forces of evil and everything that has within it the spirit of sectarianism. There are those today who say they do not believe in the old statement, "Once in Christ and never out," but they are practicing it on their church rolls. I am sure if we would accept the word for what it says, our rolls would not be padded with persons who say they are not members of the church. In man's way they can get

out and you not know it, but in Christ's way, when a branch beareth not fruit, He taketh it away. Jno. 15:2.

A highway shall be there, and a way, and it shall be called the way of holiness the unclean shall not pass over it; but it shall be for those: the wayfaring men, thou fools, shall not error therein. Ise. 35:8. Whenever the church becomes a place for personal gain, it is no longer the church of Christ. Call it what you will or may. Rom. 8:9 says: But ye are not in the flesh, but in the spirit, if so be that the spirit of God dwell in you. Now if any man have not the spirit of Christ, he is none of His. The people make up the church, and the churches make up the convention; the only way a church can be a Christian church, it must be made up of a Christ-like spirit. We are looking for men who have faith enough in Christ to step out and trust Him for what he has said. Come ye out from among them saith the Lord, be ye separate, touch not the unclean things, and I will receive you. 2 Cor. 6:17. There is no need of us trying to call bitter sweet and sweet bitter. The time shall come and is now when judgment shall begin at the house of the Lord. Where do you stand? The leaders of my people do cause them to error saith the Lord of Host. We are about to let the best chance for establishing the Kingdom of God go by; missionaries and evangelists being pulled from the field, the cry is that we are not able to have an evangelist, churches dying and buildings falling down; while promoters and secretaries are being richly fed. I do think it is time for us to wake up, why nay \$5,000 to get \$100 to a worker? There are those who would like to come out and take a stand I am sure, but they sav, well, I have been with this so long, and I don't know what the people will say about me. The question is, shall we obey God or man? Abraham liked his set-un, but God had him to understand move out, so by faith he went not knowing whither. Some for the sake of a hand-out will stand where they are, but tell me how can you be satisfied with your \$300 or \$600 a year when there are churches all around you dving for the lack of funds to carry on? If you want to know where I stand, here it is: I stand for the Christ who will find His way among humble people: I am in for the program that will find the little country church, small town church, and the program that will help to maintain the churches that are making so great a sacrifice to the welfare of our brotherhood. Give not that which is holy to the doos: think over as you please, but the ministers who are being maintained by mission funds, should at least be grateful enough to say once in a while, thank you or make some kind of report. Why would you ask your evangelist to make so many reports when there are those who have never made one report. I stand against—where do you stand?

THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH IN JERUSALEM

The gospel was preached. a large number heard, believed, repented, and were hartized in the name of Jesus Christ. All that Matthew 16:18. Romans 16:16-17-18. was said and done that day was said and done under the direction of the Holy Spirit.

The Growth of the Christian Church in Jerusalem

It is said of the Christian church in Jerusalem that the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved. Evidently, there was a continuous revival. The converts continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers. Many wonders and signs were done by the apostles. The believers had all things common. Those that had possessions and goods sold them and parted them to all, according as any had need. The Church of Christ or Christian was a new thing under the sun. It is not surprising that there were daily

additions to it. It was not long before the Church of Christ encountered opposition and persecution. The apostles were thrust into prison. But the word of God was bound. The Christian Church flourishes under persecution as it cannot under prosperity, popularity, liberalism, modernism and open-membership.

So we read that many of them that heard the word believed, repented, confessed and were buried in Christian baptism. We are told that the word of God increased; and the number of disciples in Jerusalem multiplied exceedingly and a great company of the priest became obedient to the faith. Acts 6:7. The fact that the priests were reached and won to the Christian Church is significant. Naturally they would have been the last to come into the Christian Church. When they were baptized in such large numbers we may be sure that the Christian Church in Jerusalem was in a most flourishing condition.

The Death of Stephen

The death of Stephen marked a new advance in the Church of Christ in Jerusalem. The day Stephen was stoned there arose a great persecution against the church which was in Jerusalem. Acts 8:1. Those that were scattered abroad went about preaching the word. Among those that were scattered was Philip. He went down to Samaria and preached Christ to the Samaritians. When they believed Philip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women. Then Simon himself believed also, and was baptized. Acts 8:12-13. There was no such thing as open membership there. As a result of this preaching by the scattered disciples the Christian church was established in all Judea and Galisalem was the first church founded. Look in the Bible for yourself and see if you can find another. Read Acts 11:26. Acts 26:28. 1st Peter 4:16.

THE MAN BY THE SIDE OF THE ROAD

Luke 10:30. And Jesus answered and said: A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell among thieves which stripped him of his raiment, and wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead.

The words of this parable tell a horrible story of life. They tell us there are certain things to be met, and experienced, and overcome. That when sorrow comes upon us, when we are burdened with oppression an ingratitude, when wounded and left by the side of the road to die, we know our need of strength from outside of ourselves. Strength which no material thing can give. Jesus calls us in our text to his great need to serve, to share, and to lift. There are men, women and children whom have been left by the side of the road to die. The text presents three ways by which we can meet this call.

I. The Priest's Way

This priest knowing the man was there, shut his eyes, closed his ears to his cries. He knew the law from the beginning to the end. Yet with all of his knowledge and wisdom he passed by on the other side.

Friends, one thing that has rendered Christianity void and meaningless are those who know the needs of the church, and the needs of a perishing, and sin-ridden world, yet dodge their duties and responsibilities. Christianity isn't something to argue about. It's power and value is in the fact that it is designated to regulate human conduct, and help us to meet life's responsibilities.

Paul, 2 Tim. There are those having a form of Godliness but denying the power thereof, from such turn away.

II. The Levite's Way

He came up to where the wounded man was and looked on him, and passed by on the other side.

Oh friends! The most heartless thing under

the guise of religion is upon investigation and finding the distress and need go on as if they did not exist. This kind of Christianity is hard, cold and selfish.

A young man purchased a high grade of corn and planted it near some corn of inferior grade. As years went by his corn began to degenerate. When planting this high-grade corn he gave no thought to the fact that the bad corn would pollute the better grain. This is true today. No man can be secure in his own prosperity and ignore those around him.

III. The Samaritian's Way

The Samaritan saw a wounded man half dead by the side of the road. He saw even more. He saw a chance to be a brother to the wounded man. Here was his opportunity and made the best of it. He bound up his wounds, poured in oil and wine, then put him on his beast and carried him to an inn and paid for his lodging.

What opportunities come our way to enlarge the Kingdom of God, and help those less fortunate than ourselves. But so often we throw them away by carelessness and indifference.

Has there ever been a time in the history of the world when there has been more unfortunates, beaten and bruised and suffering on the highway of life than at the present time?

Where are the good Samaritans? Where are those who have the spirit of Christ, and will look with pity on the unfortunate victims. And give them time, strength and money, that they might be brought into the Kingdom of God.

The Samaritan's way bore fruit because it was costly. The religion that cost nothing is no religion.

Take the service side of life. And as you labor and give you will find the footprints of your Lord, and they will lead you where trials and heartaches will never come. He will wipe every tear from your eyes, and will say, "well done."
