HERE are many promises that seem to imply some form? Are we not wrong when we complain that no prayer ever goes unanswered. "Call that our prayers are unanswered? unto Me and I will answer." "Ask and it shall be given you; seek and ye shall find; knock and it shall be opened unto you." "All things whatsoever ye pray and ask for, believe that ye receive them and ye shall have them." "If two of you shall agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of My Father."

These promises and many others like them seem to warrant the belief that no prayer is ever offered in vain. But experience would seem to prove otherwise. Here for example is the Psalmist who cries out almost in despair, "O my God, I cry in the daytime, but Thou answerest not; and in the night season, and am not silent." Perhaps very few persons who have had any real experience of prayer would deny that they have sometimes cried to God when the heavens seemed like brass. They could find no answer, nor any evidence that their prayers had granted in the form in which they are made. registered in heaven.

The answer to prayer is sometimes delayed, and we are apt to mistake a delayed answer for no answer. Many prayers are like the second petition of the Lord's prayer. For nineteen hundred years we have prayed "Thy kingdom come," and "Lo, Thy church is praying yet, a thousand years the same." Many things must transpire before the final answer can come. We do not lose faith on that account, nor do we cease praying.

The answer is sometimes negative, and we are apt to interpret a negative answer for no answer. Like any other father, our heavenly Father must sometimes refuse to grant a request. Like any other children, the children of God in their selfishness may be slow to acknowledge a refusal as an answer. And yet it would be a sorry world for us all if our unwise, criss-cross petitions were all

Again, prayers are often answered indirectly, How shall we explain experiences that seem to and an indirect answer may be easily overlooked. We believe that if church members would once form the habit of reading a church paper it would grow with the years and become the source of great pleasure as well as profit.

The initial difficulty of the publishers of church papers has generally been to awaken interest in such a periodical, and this can best be done by those who have been reading it and enjoying it, and who know its value. A commendatory word from a regular reader of the paper to his friend or neighbor, may open the way to another home for the church paper. A quotation from the church paper in the pulpit, or a reference to an article of special interworld if they have been deprived of their morning est or value, as occasion offers, may lead to the formation of new connections between the church paper office and the congregation of the minister who takes this means to call the attention of people to their church paper.—Selected.

WHY SHOULD PEOPLE Go To Church?

In DISCUSSING the problem of church attendance we are considering it on a low level as long as we think merely or mainly of the means and methods of getting people to come to church. There must be some deep motive that urges them to go to church as something that is worthwhile and makes church attendance not so much a duty that should be performed, however distasteful it may be, but as a privilege that they cannot afford to neglect and a help and a joy in all their living, without which they cannot live so well.

Religion is the craving of the soul for God, and all our faculties and needs cry, "Show us the Father and it sufficeth us." This need is age-long and worldwide and is as constitutional in us as our hunger and thirst or as our social and affectional nature. The church and priest did not make it, but it made the church and priest. It is not at all a human invention or an artificial and manufactured article in our life, but it is born in us and begins to act when we begin to breathe and grows with all our growth. It acts with the spontaneity of an instinct. We do not begin its activity and we cannot stop it. It is true that we can feed and stimulate it and can also starve and wither it, but it is there and cannot be wholly suppressed or eradicated. Even those who come to deny it cannot wholly exterminate it and let surprising confessions escape from them. The most inveterate agnostic or sceptic is often discovered to be a sincere and even sad seeker after some kind of religious faith and hope. Reason did not create this constitutional need, and reason cannot kill it. It is deeper than the brain and is rooted in the heart.

Any movement of the spirit needs to be organized into an institution and implemented with means. It may be said, and some do say, that this religious nature will take care of itself and find food and expression anywhere and therefore we need no church and ordinances and that such things rather hinder true religion by incrusting and imprisoning it in forms that constrict it to death. There is danger in this direction, but the main truth lies the other way: that religion without organization and forms of worship evaporates into sentiment and leaves only a sediment of dust. The spirit cannot live without a body and cannot move and propagate itself without hands and feet, tongue and speech. Every idea must get such means of growth and expression. There may be and is some education going on outside the schools, but self-educated men usually show how unsymmetrical and incomplete their education is. Some education can be obtained out of books, but there is something in the school that cannot be found in books, the personality of the teacher and the contagious spirit of culture. The impact of mind upon mind and of spirit upon spirit is the most vital means of education, and so is it of growth in the religious life. Religion is the most social and contagious form of our social life and so it has ever assembled people together and kindled their religious nature and needs by common ideas and aspirations and compacted them into mass movements that have swept the community and country with Pentecostal wind and fire. The reason we should go to church is of the same order and necessity as the reason why we should go to school for education and to the bakery for bread, and to the factory and store for goods. We must go where these things are prepared in the best way and are to be obtained by the best means. When this is realized people will go to church out of the practical necessity and rich reward of having an orderly and fruitful religious life, supplied with its proper food and stimulated and set on fire by the contagious worship of the church where the Spirit of God is more fully shed abroad in their hearts.
